

MR. GUY C. DUNN

Will Have Charge of
G. T. P. Survey in
New Brunswick.

WILL BE ON THE GROUND
NEXT WEEK.

St. John Valley Route to
be Surveyed.

Ottawa, Sept. 17.—Guy C. Dunn, C. E., has been appointed by the national transcontinental railway commission acting district engineer for district "A," which covers the province of New Brunswick from Moncton to the Quebec boundary line. He will leave on Monday for New Brunswick.

The engineers in charge, transitmen, levellers, rodmen and chainmen of the ten parties he will control in New Brunswick, have all been selected and they will proceed to their different sections and commence work as soon as their supplies and outfits can be got there, which will probably be the latter part of next week.

The surveys made will be preliminary lines and the commission will thereby investigate the relative merits of the two routes from Grand Falls to Chipman, namely one via the St. John River Valley and the other across country, via Plaster Rock and Boiestown, in order that the best selection of route may be made.

Supplies for the different crews are being purchased in Montreal, Quebec, St. John, Halifax and elsewhere.

A BRISK MARKET.

Country Produce Plentiful and Good Prices Realized.

There was a very large market this morning and Phoenix Square presented a very animated appearance between the hours of eight and ten o'clock. The variety of country produce offered for sale was large, the quality was excellent and good prices were realized.

Chickens were more plentiful than on last Saturday, but the demand exceeded the supply. A few exceptionally large birds sold for \$1 per pair, and the general run brought from 45 to 60 cents a pair.

Apples appear to be somewhat of a drag on the market this season. They were plentiful in the market this morning, but the demand was rather slow. New Brunswick apples were sold principally to grocers at \$1 per barrel, and a few other varieties, such as Wolf River, brought \$1.25 and \$1.50. Lombard plums of fair quality sold for \$1 per peck.

This is an off year for hay, and it is likely that a good many farmers will winter less stock than last season. The selling price in the market is now \$12 per ton.

Potatoes are a good crop this season, and the quality is better than usual. They are now selling in the market for \$1 per barrel.

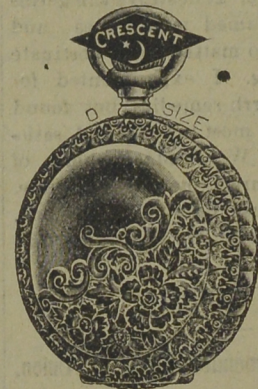

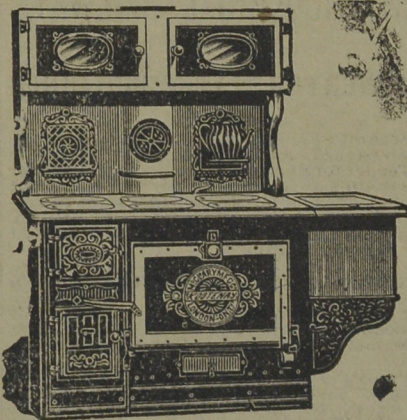
