A Wireless Message.

What is probably the first marconigram which ever came to Fredericton was received this morning by Mr. W. T. Chestnut of Chestnut & Sons. The message was received at the Marconi station near New York, and forwarded by the Western Union wires to Mr. Chestnut. It merely stated that Mr. Lloyd and a friend would arrive here on Monday, ready to start for the woods.
