

ELECTION PROTESTS

Quite a Crop of Them Filed
in Various Provinces.

NOVA SCOTIA TORIES PRESENT
THE LARGEST NUMBER.

All Conservatives in Northwest and
E. Island Protested.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Winnipeg, Dec. 14.—Protests have been filed at Regina against the election of Conservatives in the Territories, viz., McCarthy, Calgary; Her- rin, Alberta; and Lake, QuAppelle.

Montreal, Dec. 14.—Election protests have been filed against seven members in Quebec province exclusive of Montreal, as follows:—Desjardins in Terrebonne, Lemieux in Nicolet, Rousseau in Champlain, Mayrand in Maskinonge, Lowell in Stanstead, Hunt in Compton, and Worthington in Sherbrooke.

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 14.—Election petitions have been filed here against the return of many Liberal members in Nova Scotia. These petitions were all prepared and printed in Halifax. T. R. Robertson, partner of R. L. Borden, late leader of the opposition and ex-member for Halifax, is attorney for all petitions.

The petitions are against Hon. W. S. Fielding, E. M. MacDonald, J. R. Black, member-elect of Hants, Fred A. Laurence, member-elect for Colchester, Hance J. Logan, member-elect of Cumberland, Sir Frederick Borden, member-elect for Kings, Wm. Roche and Michael Carney, of Halifax, and S. W. W. Pickup, of Annapolis.

The petitions are printed and follow the usual form, alleging generally every corrupt practice described in the election act, but not specifically mentioning a single one.

In the petitions against Hon. W. S. Fielding and Sir Frederick Borden a general allegation is included, alleging that the Liberal government entered into a corrupt and collusive bargain with Hon. Geo. A. Cox and C. M. Hays whereby in consideration of passing the Grand Trunk Pacific contract the said Hays and Cox had contributed large sums of money to the Liberal campaign fund, which in turn was paid to Liberal committees in various sections of the province and by them distributed.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Dec. 14.—Petitions have been filed against the three Conservatives returned in the federal election—Martin and McLean in Queens and Lefurgey in Prince.

Montreal, Dec. 14.—The elections of Dan Galloway, Liberal M. P. for St. Ann's Montreal, and H. B. Ames, Conservative for St. Antoine, are protested. Galloway's petitioners ask that he be disqualified for seven years. A protest was entered against Mr. Monk in Jacques Cartier, but it was afterwards withdrawn, a saw-off being arranged with Solicitor General Lemieux in Gaspe.

Sherbrooke, Dec. 14.—The election of Mr. Hunt, the Liberal who beat Rufus Pope in Compton, has been protested.

Toronto, Dec. 14.—Two election protests were filed at Osgoode Hall today. In North Grey the return of Wm. P. Telford, Liberal, is protested on the usual charges. In Norfolk Col. Tisdale is protested. The election of Mr. Smith, Tory, is South Wentworth is also protested.
