I. C. R.'S FINE SERVICE.

Two Luxurious Trains Between Montreal and Halifax.

"The Intercolonial Railway will have the finest passenger service this summer it has ever had," said Mr. E. Tiffin, traffic manager of the Government road, at the Windsor Montreal Tuesday. "Commencing July 1 we will have two de luxe trains leaving Montreal for Sydney and Halifax every day but Saturday.

"The time of the Maritime Express which now leaves at noon, will be changed, and she will leave in the morning about eight o'clock. The Ocean Limited, a new train, will be put on at night, leaving Montreal at eight o'clock and making the trip to Halifax in twenty-four hours. Her time will be a little faster than the Maritime's, for she will not have as many stops to make. The particular advantage of the new train for tourists, however, will be that the trip through the beautiful New Brunswick and Nova Scotia scenery will be made in the daytime, which should prove an attractive plan for lovers of scenery.

As to the tourist outlook in the Maritime Provinces, Mr. Tiffin said he expected a fair season, though not as good as last year because of the St. Louis fair and the presidential elections in the United States. The I. C. R., however, expected the usual rush of travel during the summer.

Mr. Tiffin had nothing to communicate as to the purchase of the Canada Eastern Railway by the I. C. R. As to the proposed change in the system of paying I. C. R. officials, Mr. Tiffin said he thought it would meet with considerable opposition. At present the men are paid

in cash, but it is proposed that they be paid by cheque instead. Mr. Tiffin said he did not know whether the plan would be adopted, but he did believe that the I. C. R. officials would sooner have the present system remain in vogue.

Artillery for an Outlaw.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 15.—Geo. Loth, Deputy Sheriff of Hennepin County, has volunteered to capture an outlaw named Dietz, who is holding officers at bay near Hayward, Wis.

Loth's offer has been accepted by the Wisconsin authorities, and he will go at once. He expects to get artillery from Madison and dislodge the outlaw without loss of life other than that possibly of Dietz himself.

A dispatch from Chippewa falls says that all the men employed by the Chippewa Lumber and Boom Company at the Cameron Dam on the Thornapple River, which Dietz is holding up, returned to-day, the drive being abandoned.

Over 10,000,000 feet of logs are lying high and dry, the dam being kept open by Dietz. Operations of the mills may be delayed should the present trouble long continued. Sixty armed men started out to-day from Cameron Junction with orders to capture Dietz or kill him.

Pulled Ex-Governor's Hair.

Memphis, Tenn., May 17.—Hair was pulled and more serious trouble was narrowly averted between prominent State politicians this morning in the lobby of the Tulane Hotel, ex-Governor McMillin and W. R. Romaine, the latter editor of the Pulaski Citizen, met for the first time since editorial comments on Gov. McMillin's position on the whisky interests of Tennessee appeared in The Citizen.

An explanation was requested by Gov. McMillin, and bystanders state that the editor replied in facetious language, informing the governor that the paper was widely read, and that his request was the first received for an explanation of simple language.

In the excitement that followed no one was found who could state how the row started, but a bunch of hair discovered on the floor of the lobby blended in color with that of the ex-governor. Friends separated the men.

Saved Son, Didn't Know It.

Morristown, N. J., May 17.—William Burns of Rockaway is a hero in that neighborhood to-day. He saved a youngster from drowning, and when he got the boy to the bank he discovered it was his own son.

The little fellow, who is only five years old, was sailing a play boat on the canal near his home in company with half a dozen other children. Suddenly they set up a wild scream. Mr. Burns happened to be passing on his way home to dinner, and hearing the children scream, he hurried to the place, plunged into the canal, and grasped the child. When he reached the bank and learned whom he had saved, he set about the matter of resuscitation with such vigor that the child recovered consciousness very soon.

Secretely Weds at Eighty.

Middletown, N. Y., May 17.—Friends and relatives of Col. Samuel H. Wood and Miss Jeannette Nelson, both of this city, were greatly surprised to-day when it was announced that they were married about three months ago at Warwick, Orange County. Col. Wood is eighty years old and well-to-do and has a married grandson. He was for many years a well-known dry street commission merchant in New York City and comes from an old Orange County family. His wife is about forty years old and has taught school at Campbell Hall, this county, for some time. She is the daughter of the late Rev. Mr. Nelson, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at South Centerville.

It is stated that the reason the marriage was kept secret was that Mrs. Wood did not want to give up her school until the end of the term, but relatives discovered their secret.

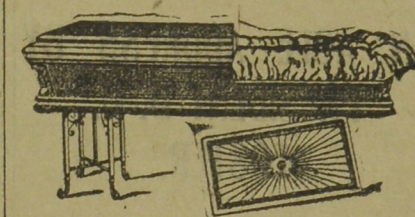
