

SYDNEY STRIKE.

Additional Signs that it has Spent its Strength.

QUEBEC REGULARS TAKE PLACE OF MILITIA.

Company Resuming Operations.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Sydney, N. S., July 12.—When your correspondent strolled around the Dominion Iron and Steel Companies gates at an early hour this morning, he found everything quiet and orderly. The gates were wide open, extending an invitation to any and every workmen. Some hundreds entered with lunch pails in hand, but the majority were old guards, who refused to strike. The strikers' picket, grim, taciturn and gloomy, viewed matters at a distance.

Early this morning the Quebec soldiers under Col. MacDonald arrived and immediately marched to the grounds and bivouacked amid peaceful scenes of cold billets, silent shops and silent mills. The Quebec men have one maxim gun.

The Halifax men left for home this morning. Col. Irving, D. O. C., will remain for a few days in command.

It is reported that tomorrow night the strikers will hold an immense mass meeting, and a street procession will commence proceedings.

The strikers claim that only forty men went to work at the plant yesterday while those previously there are never less than sixty.

The Steel Company express satisfaction with the situation and say they do not contemplate any trouble in getting the men back. At present they are trying to rehire moulders, and today will decide whether they will return to work. There is discontent among some men who did not strike. They claim that the company is offering strikers if they will go back to work higher wages for the same work as they have been doing and are doing.

Today the Steel Co. will try to open two of its open hearth furnaces, and in this connection it is said that the moment the company commences to operate the plant and the Dominion Coal Co. furnishes coal the miners will go out on strike.

SERIOUSLY INJURED.

Ex-Warden of Cemberland Badly Used up by his Horse.

Amherst, N. S., July 12.—Ex-Warden Oxley of Tidnish, received serious injuries last night.

His horse became frightened by a passing automobile and he took the animal by the head, when he reared up, throwing Mr. Oxley violently down and then jumping upon him.

Three ribs were broken from the spinal column and he was internally injured. As he is considerably advanced in years fears are entertained for his recovery.

CONSERVATIVE M. P. DEAD.

Hon. John McIntosh of Sherbrooke, Passed Away this Morning.

Sherbrooke, Quebec, July 12.—Hon. John McIntosh, Conservative M. P. for Sherbrooke, died at 9 o'clock this morning.

He has been suffering the past six

years with lung and bowel trouble, and during the past few weeks had been gradually failing, though the end was not thought to be so near. He was able to sit on the piazza of his residence yesterday, but passed a very bad night.

(Mr. McIntosh was for many years sheriff of Sherbrooke, and entered parliament on the death of Hon. W. B. Ives, in 1897, carrying the bye election after a sharp fight. He took very little part in the affairs of parliament. Personally he was very highly esteemed.)

MISS TAYLOR'S DEATH.
