Suggestive Incident of the Campaign.

TORY SENATOR, DO HIS BEST IN ELECTION FORECASTING.

Figured Out a Majority for Laurier.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Oct. 29.—A very amusing and suggestive incident occurred yesterday, when the estimate of the result of the election published in the Toronto News was known here.

A reporter of the Star waited upon Senator L. K. Forget, one of the most active and leading Conservatives in the province, and asked his opinion of the News estimates.

"Oh," said the Senator, "that is altogether wrong. Here is an estimate which you may find to be correct when the result is known."

The Star reporter proceeded to very carefully study each province, placing the Senator's estimate for each party opposite the name of the various provinces.

"There," said Senator Forget, when he had finished the estimate and handed it to the reporter, without having added up the result, "is my estimate of the next Parliament."

When the reporter reached his office the two columns were added up, and it was found that Senator Forget had given the Laurier government a majority of ten in all Canada.

BRITISH PUBLIC.

Calmly Awaits Verdict of Enquiry—Russian Losses.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 29.—The general staff issued a statement that the number killed, wounded and missing in the fighting which began October 9 and ended October 18, totalled 800 officers and 45,000 men.

London, Oct. 29.—Profound satisfaction at the fact that an arrangement is reached, and the entire certainty that the result of the commission of inquiry will be to discredit Vice-Admiral Rijestvensky's statements anent the presence of torpedo boats in the North Sea fishing fleet, mark the comments of the London afternoon newspapers almost universally.

The Admiral's story, it is pointed out, has the great advantage that it is capable of proof or disproof.

The Russian Admiral can only make good his case by producing a vessel whose presence he alleges was among the trawlers, says the Westminster Gazette. The feeling that Great Britain will be upheld prevails among all classes and disposes the public to calmly await the verdict.

DIVORCE COURT.

Decree Granted Plaintiff in Case of Quinn vs. Quinn.

In the divorce court this morning Mr. Justice Gregory delivered judgment in the case of Herbert L. Quinn vs. Mary E. Quinn, granting a decree of divorce to the husband. The parties belonged to Sagetown, Queens Co., and separated some time ago. The husband sued for divorce on the ground of adultery and general unfaithfulness to marriage vows. The case was undefended and at the trial it was proven that the defendant was an inmate of a well known house on the Woodstock road.

His Honor decided that a case had been made out declaring the marriage null and void.

Many Homes Saddened in City and Country.

CERTAIN VICTORY.

Laurier Tells to Cheering Montreal Audience

THAT GOVERNMENT WILL BE SUSTAINED AND G. T. PACIFIC BUILT.

A Record Breaking Demonstration.

Montreal, Oct. 29.—There was a terrible rush of humanity at Windsor Hall last night, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier made his last appearance in Montreal during the present campaign.

Every available space was taken before speech making commenced, and hundreds at the back of the hall seemed determined to force their way in, even if they had to climb over the heads of those in front.

This state of affairs lasted for some time and the first speakers were heard with difficulty.

When the Premier rose at eight o'clock, the whole audience rose to its feet and cheered several minutes.

The Premier was listened to with close attention and there were frequent outbreaks of applause.

He scored the opposition to the Transcontinental and tariff policy.

The Premier's declaration that the government would be returned to power and that the Grand Trunk Pacific would be built, was greeted with the wildest outburst of applause of the evening.

The Premier spoke three hours.

Sir Richard Cartwright also addressed the gathering and shared in the Premier's great triumph.

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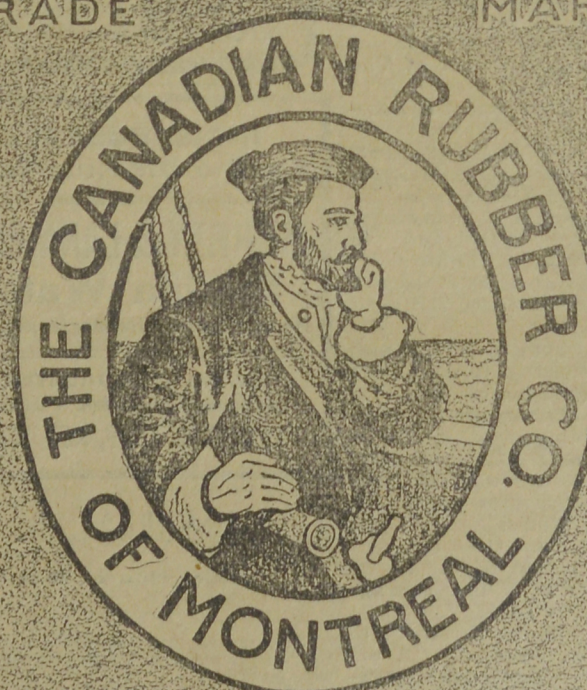
