A JAP SUCCESS.

Mikado's Men Cap-
tured Important
Defence.

OPENING THE WAY TO RE-
DUCTION OF PORT
ARTHUR.

Russians Claim Satisfac-
tion with Campaign.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Aug. 9.—Reviewing General Kuropatkin's movements, the Army Official Gazette says that the retreat is in accordance with a plan laid down for the first period of the campaign, which is to weaken forces of the enemy by contesting strongly defensive positions, thus impeding Japanese progress, and compelling the enemy to waste large numbers of men and much war material in advances.

The results have been that in three and a half months the Japanese have only covered a few score versts.

The Russians estimate that Japanese losses thus far as a result of the siege of Port Arthur aggregate 23,000, and says that the Mikado's instruction not to waste lives must have been ironical.

General Stoessel in his despatches to the government admits that the Japanese have captured Wolfe's Hill.

This hill is one of the most important outer defences of Port Arthur.
