

MORE TROOPS.

Czar Orders the Reserves to Join the Colors.

A LARGE NUMBER HAVE BEEN CALLED OUT.

RUSSIAN WARSHIPS BOTTLED UP AT PORT ARTHUR

Will Make a Bold Dash for Liberty When the City Falls.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Tokio, Aug. 20.—The Japanese occupied Anshan yesterday, and the Russians have retreated towards Mukden.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 20.—The Emperor has issued a ukase summoning to the colors all the reserved officers throughout the Empire.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 20.—The official messenger today announces the mobilization of the reserves in four districts of the Poltava government, two in the Kursk government, two in the Tver government, one in the Samara government, four in the Saratoff government, two in the Astrakhan government, one in the Ufa government, five in the Simbirsk government, one in the Perm government, two in the St. Petersburg government, three in the Novgorod government, three in the Fskov government, one in the Lhynia government, seven in the Archalget government, and seven in the Olonetz government.

London, Aug. 20.—A despatch to a news agency from St. Petersburg, says that news has reached the admiralty there of the fact that the Russian cruiser Novik, has arrived at Korsakovsk, a port of the Island of Sakhalin, and that the Russian cruiser Diana, concerning which fate there has been considerable anxiety, has been off Hong Kong.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 20.—Acute anxiety prevails regarding the situation at Port Arthur on account of the desperate character of the fighting reported there, although the war office does not seem to believe that the danger of the fall of the fortress is so imminent as generally asserted.

According to advices received by the war office there is still ample supply of ammunition and provisions there. While it is realized that the Japanese probably outnumber the defenders six or seven fold, the great strength of the fortifications, it is believed, will do much to make up for the disparity in numbers.

Upon one point there absolutely is unanimity, namely, that if the fortress falls the fleet will not fall into the hands of the Japanese. On this point the admiralty's instructions are of the most imperative character.

Vice Admiral Prince Ouktomsky has been ordered should the worst come, to sail forth for a death struggle and there is no question here that these instructions will be carried out, both in letter and spirit; but if for any reason a final sortie proved to be impossible, the admiral to destroy his ships and to make certain that the wreckage shall be absolutely irreparable.

In the meantime Vice Admiral Rojestvensk's Baltic squadron, including the new battleship Orel, is standing off Cronstadt with steam up.

Russians in Last Ditch.

Che Foo, Aug. 19, 7 p. m.—Chinese who embarked from Liaoti promontory at 11 o'clock yesterday morning report the continuance of heavy fighting. They say the Japanese have occupied Pigeon Bay and are within striking distance of the Liaoti forts which, however, are still occupied by the Russians.

The impression here is that the seizures took place within the Chinese territorial waters. The incident is regarded as an evidence of the determination of the Japanese naval officers to attack and cut out any Russian ships that lie in Che Foo harbor provided they are not dismantled to the absolute satisfaction of the Chinese naval officers.

Some apprehension has been expressed in other capitals that these apparent breaches of Chinese neutrality by Japanese may extend to the land operations of the hostile army. This feeling is not shared in Washington and although the officials will not make public the sources of their information on this point there is reason to believe that they have been assured by both Japan and Russia that there will be no extension of the war field beyond Manchuria and Chinese Mongolia which would naturally be the place where General Kuropatkin would seek to make his escape with his army in the event that the Japanese under Kuroki succeeded in executing the plan which is now afoot of surrounding him on the north, east and south thus cutting him off from the Siberian railroad and his line of communication. Apprehensive of this movement Yuanshi Kai and Ma, the famous Chinese generals, with their foreign drilled troops, have concentrated a force of about 40,000 men in Mongolia near the border, and it is feared that there may be a clash between these men and the Russian troops in the event of retreat of the latter across the line.

According to the Chinese the Russians at Port Arthur are making their final stand.

Washington, Aug. 19.—Consul-General Goodnow cabled the state department from Shanghai that the Chinese Taotai there has reported against the claim of the Russian consul-general and decided that the torpedo boat destroyer now at that port must go out or disarm by the 20th inst., and that the cruiser must do likewise by the 21st inst.

London, Aug. 19.—A despatch to the Japanese legation from Tokio says:

"According to a report from our watch tower near Port Arthur, a Russian gunboat of the Otvaeni type struck a mine and sank in Liaoti promontory at 7.25 p. m., yesterday."

Gloom at St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 19.—The hope of accomplishing the cherished plan of the admiralty of uniting the two Russian far eastern squadrons to await the coming of the Baltic fleet seems now almost hopeless. Nevertheless the admiralty expects that the battleships if they return to Port Arthur to sail forth again even to certain destruction. But the whereabouts of the battleship division and of the protected cruisers Diana and Pallada are not considered to be absolutely established. The weight of opinion continues to correspond with the foreign reports that the battleships are back at Port Arthur, but some of the officials at the admiralty cling to the hope that they escaped. Che Foo reports today, which apparently leave no doubt on this point. The authorities here are without information in regard to the reported torpedoing of a Russian cruiser of the Pallada type, which they say, must mean the Diana. Both the officials Russian agree as the main details of the engagement and the manner in which the big ironclads "in the form of a gridiron, tacked and countertacked" as they delivered their broadsides. But a veil is drawn when the cruiser division escaped and newspapers here received the official the Czarvitch was disabled. The advices this morning too late for comment. The spirits of the people may be judged from the fact that although this is a holiday there are no crowds on the streets, but the churches were thronged by whole families mourning for the loss of loved ones with the fleets.

Washington, Aug. 19.—The state department has received a cablegram from Che Foo, dated today, the substance of which is as follows:

She Foo, Aug. 19.—"This morning seven Japanese destroyers entered the harbor of Che Foo. Opposite the entrance they met an unknown steamer and took possession of her. There are two cruisers outside."

St. Petersburg, Aug. 19, 2.30 p. m.—Late in the day the admiralty received official information that Vice-Admiral Prince Ouktomsky's five battleships and the protected cruiser Pallada are at Port Arthur. A telegram received here from the Russian consul at Che Foo does not mention whether the vessels are damaged and makes no reference to the report from Tokio that a gunboat of the type of the Tavajni had been sunk off the Liaoti promontory owing to having collided with a mine.

MAY RUN FOR OTTAWA.

DOUBLE FATALITY.

Two Ladies Killed on an Ontario Railway.

Hamilton, Aug. 20.—A double fatality occurred on the Toronto and Hamilton Railway, near Jerseyville, yesterday afternoon, when Mrs. Thos Knox, of Lynden, Ont., and Mrs. Leonard Dodge, of Saginaw, Mich., were killed instantly by an express train. The ladies were driving in a covered buggy and tried to cross the track in front of the train when the engine struck the outfit and tossed the buggy and horse up in the air. The two women were thrown about one hundred feet away and were dead when picked up. The horse was also killed and the buggy was broken into small pieces.

FATAL MOSQUITO BITE.
