A STUPID COURSE.

The Telegraph with a stupidity that is amazing, apparently thinks that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway contract has still to pass parliament, instead of a few simple modifications which do not touch the main objects of the proposition. The government measure authorizing the construction of the new line, passed both branches of parliament last autumn by substantial majorities and is a law of the land, and the modifications to come before the House this session are merely amendments to the act.

The Telegraph perhaps will be able to recall the fact that with only one exception, every New Brunswick member of the House of Commons and Senate supporting the government, voted for the Grand Trunk Pacific bill, and there is nothing in the amendments that will prove objectionable to them.

The Telegraph in resisting the construction of the new transcontinental railway does not represent public feeling in this province, and its hysterical outbursts against the propositions are merely the opinions of its proprietor Mr. David Russell who resides and does business in Montreal.

NEW LIBERAL DAILY.

The Telegraph seeks to prejudice the people of St. John against the company being formed to start a new Liberal paper in that city, on the ground that the incorporators include a number of prominent New Brunswick Liberals residing in various parts of the province. The Telegraph's criticism however loses weight when it is remembered that its proprietor lives in Montreal.

The new publishing company is a very substantial concern and should be able to present a strong paper to the public, one that will fully and successfully advocate Liberal principles, furnish a good news service, and prove true to its party, not a renegade or a rib stabber of its friends. There is room for such a newspaper in St. John, and Liberals all over the province will wish the new daily all possible success.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, minister of railways, who recently made an official inspection of the Intercolonial, says the road is in excellent condition and doing a big business. The traffic, both passenger and freight, is steadily growing. There is a cry at many points for more station accommodation. The Drummond county portion of the road is sharing in this prosperity. "One of the first problems," says Mr. Emmerson, "that the government will have to meet, will be to add another through passenger train next summer from Montreal to Halifax and St. John."

It will be observed that a fair sprinkling of gentlemen who furnish supplies to the Intercolonial Railway are taking an interest in the new party organ.—Sun. [It is well also to remember that the gentleman who occupies the position of president of the Sun Publishing Co. and controls that newspaper, furnished very large quantities of supplies to the Intercolonial when the Tories were in power from 1878 to 1896, still has an eye on the hardware patronage of the road and would receive it if the Tories returned to power.]

In the dispute which has arisen respecting the alleged encroachment of the St. John Lumber Company, an American concern, on New Brunswick territory, the local government has taken all possible steps to protect this province, and may be counted upon to continue their

efforts in that direction until satisfied that all danger to provincial interests is past.

Parliament opened this afternoon, but Sir Hibbert Tupper, who lives at Vancouver and is supposed to represent Picton, is off to England on private business. Sir Hibbert has been in the pouts ever since Mr. Borden was elected Tory leader.

Mr. Tarte has secured a seat on the government side of the House of Commons, but not very near to Mr. Monk, who will continue to sit beside Mr. Borden.

Sincere sympathy will be felt for Mr. Alexander Gibson, sr, who had the misfortune to fall down stairs at his residence and fracture his collar bone.
