DELIVERED PATRIOTIC ADDRESS BEFORE BOSTON'S CANADIAN CLUB.

The Position of Canada With Respect to Her Neighbor the United States.

Boston, Nov. 29.—The sixth annual banquet of the Canadian Club of Boston at the Hotel Vendome, last night resolved itself into an international debate on the question of reciprocal trade relations between the United States and Canada. Hon. G. E. Foster, M. P., from North Toronto, one of the leaders of the Conservative party of Canada, opposing the doctrine championed by Eugene N. Foss and others.

The toasts and those who responded to them were as follows: "The President," responded to by the National Anthem; "The King," Capt. William Wyndham, British consul general.

"The Commonwealth," Representative Louisa Frothingham, speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives.

"Canada, her position and aspirations," Hon. Geo. E. Foster, M. P., of Toronto.

"Trade relations between the United States and Canada," Eugene N. Foss of Boston.

After expressing his gratitude and appreciation at the welcome bestowed upon him, Mr. Foster said that those who lived in the United States could not understand the temper and progress of the Canadian people. He said in part:

"There is not a great gulf between the Canada of forty years ago and the Canada of today, but during the past thirty years great progress has been made in the country north of your borders. The first and great thing was the political confederation when four provinces made a paper agreement of consolidation, which has developed into a perfect political unity and entity. In the second place we have acquired additional territory by gaining the rights to the immense areas formerly controlled by the Hudson Bay Trading Co., whereby 200,000 acres were added to the original Dominion. It is not too much to prophesy that within the present century the population of Canada will aggregate 100,000,000 people.

"In Canada we started with only the beginnings of an industrial life. Our people were farmers, fishermen and lumbermen. Our manufactured articles we obtained from abroad. With confederation we began to build up our manufactures by giving such a degree of protection as would make it feasible for capital to engage in industrial undertaking.

"This principle of protection was fostered by the Conservative party and when we went out of power our principles continued to rule, and the Liberal party has found out that the people are stronger than the doctrines and that to remain in power they must practice the principle of protection—which they are doing."

The speaker then said that before he came to the banquet he was told that he would be expected to speak on reciprocity. Continuing he said: "What is an absolutely dead question with us is very much alive with you."

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the Conservative party and while a member of the Canadian government I made two or three pilgrimages to Washington and begged your senators and representatives to grant us reciprocal trade relations. I failed in my mission every time. And now that the question is dead with us it has been raised from its grave by some of you Americans.

"We Canadians approve your great power and mighty progress as well as the progress you are yet to make. The question of reciprocity would be better understood by the people on this side of the baundary if they understand what is taking place in Canada today. In Canada we believe that we have the foundation for the making of a great people, and by God's grace we are going to be a great people.

"To become a great people you had to take hold of your inexhaustible resources and develop them your selves by your own labor.

"We have immense resources in Canada. Our lumber supply is inexhaustible. Between the Rocky Mountains and the western side of the great lakes we have an area of between 200,000,000 and 300,000,000 acres of tillable land. In the past year 55,000 farmers grew 65,000,000 bushels of wheat on 4,000,000 acres of land. Inside of ten years that 4,000,000 acres will be increased to 25,000,000 acres and at that rate will produce 500,000,000 bushels of wheat. Therefore, within ten years we should raise enough wheat to supply the market of Great Britain, our own markets, and have considerable left for export to foreign countries."

The speaker then asked what would be the wheat production when 150,000,000 acres of land are under cultivation. Continuing he stated that within ten years four great parallel Canadian transcontinental railway lines will connect the seaports on the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. Where these railways will cross is in the narrowest part of the American continent north of Mexico, and, therefore, will offer the most direct route for trade. With such transportation facilities Canada may be trusted to work out her own salvation without the aid of a reciprocal treaty with the United States.

Mr. Foster then discussed the reciprocity that formerly existed between the two countries and which, he said was abrogated by the Americans. Now Canada does not want reciprocity.

"Canada," said the speaker in conclusion, "has passed from the provincial to the national stage, and from the national to the imperialistic. At present Canada is a great part in the world-wide empire and we intend to give the mother coun-

try and the colonies the benefit of our products and our trade, rather than negotiate a treaty that will give us a 'favored nation' preference to our own kindred."

The applause following Mr. Foster's address was prolonged.

Eugene N. Foss, who was then introduced, made a plea for reciprocal trade relations with the Dominion.

Three Brothers Drowned.

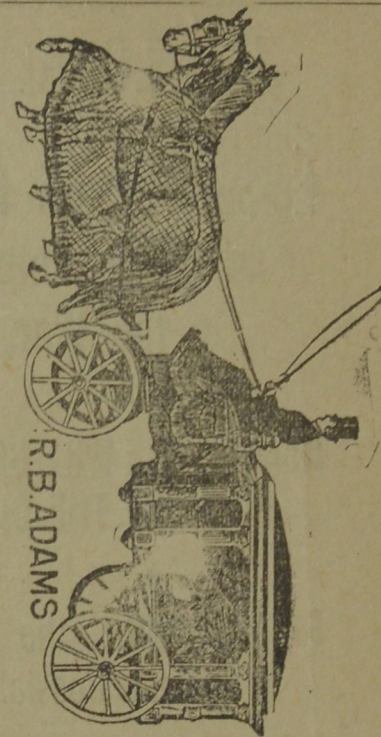
