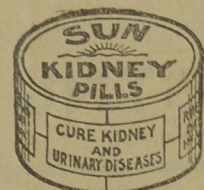

NATURE EXPOSES CRIME.

The Curious Circumstances About Indiana Murder.

A MUSKRAT, A HORSE AND A WOUNDED MAN

Combine to Disclose the Story of the Deed.

Hartford City, Ind., Nov. 29.—Has the hand of Providence, guiding the steps of a muskrat to a place of safety, filled the dumb animal with the fear of a remembered danger and directed the flight of a wounded bird, helped in the detection of the murderers of Edward P. Sanderson? This is a popular question in this country.

Edward P. Sanderson, a large property owner, lived on a farm ten miles from this city. He disappeared and for a week persistent search was made for him without result. A boy employed in a factory near here took his lunch basket a week after Sanderson's disappearance and went in the direction of an old gravel pit which had become filled with water. He sat down to eat his lunch and a muskrat ran past him. He followed it and it disappeared at the edge of the pond. He was about to turn away when he saw the hand of a man above the stagnant water. He called some of the men from the factory. After some difficulty the body was removed. It was found to have been weighted with a seventy-five pound stone, which was attached to it by a strap.

The body was that of the missing man, and examination showed that two bullets had been fired into the brain before it was placed into the pond.

To find out where the murder took place his horse was hitched to his buggy and a circuitous drive was made to the home of a neighbor. Then the road was followed that Sanderson travelled on the night of his disappearance. At an abrupt turn the horse showed signs of fear. He pricked up his ears, turned to the side of the road and showed unwillingness to proceed.

The spot was examined and in the dust at the side of the road was found several little balls of dust which are believed to have been made by drops of blood which flowed from Sanderson's wounds.

Four men were hunting later in the neighborhood of the Sanderson home, and one of them shot and wounded a quail. The wounded bird fell in the yard and when one of the hunters went in to get it it fluttered under the house. One of the men followed it, and as he crawled through an opening in the foundation he discovered two tin cans filled with dynamite. A fuse led them to another opening in the foundation wall. Each can contained about five pounds of the explosive and it was plain that it had been placed there with the intention of blowing up the house.

The authorities were notified and started an investigation to find where the explosive and cans were bought. They are resistent, but believe that the same man who murdered Sanderson placed the dynamite under his house.

How to Make a Home.

If it is true that every occupation has its masculine side and its feminine side, then it is true of the domestic occupations as well as of those belonging to the world of business; and it is evident that the home will suffer from an undue predominance of one element over the other. That our homes are not running smoothly,

And, if in addition to the training in regularity and method which a business career gives a woman, and the freedom which her own income gives her is added to the influence which an active interest in her own home gives a man, we may hope for better homes, less full of fussy details, better ordered, reflecting on a small scale that flexibility and at the same time definiteness of organization which characterize modern industrial concerns. We shall not only have wives and mothers in these homes, but husbands and fathers.

AN ESTIMATE OF DARWIN.

Famous Thinker Was a Sweet-Natured, Quiet Country Gentleman.

Sir Leslie Stephen, in the last instalment of his 'Reminiscences' in The Atlantic Monthly, expresses a high opinion of Darwin, whom he knew personally. He says:

"I had the privilege of seeing something of Darwin in his later years. To me, and my opinion was not exceptional, he appeared to be simply the most lovable person whom I ever encountered. A little party of us used at one time to take long Sunday tramps in the neighborhood of London. Those were days to be marked with a white stone when Darwin received us at the famous house at Down. It is in the quiet region of chalk downs, which had been left untouched in the gaps of the network of railways; and still looked as rural as it had a century earlier. One could expect to meet the old smugglers whose paths from the coast to London were laid through the unfrequented district. There Darwin found an admirable retreat for contemplating flowers and bees and worms, and for slowly elaborating the thoughts which had revolutionized science. He was as free from pretensions as if his investigations had no more claims to respect than those of a commonplace pigeon-fancier. The simplicity of the man was evident in the delightful easy terms in which he lived with a family which was worthy of his affection. I could sympathize with the young German who burst into tears on leaving the house, touched by the contrast between the famous thinker and the sweet-natured, quiet country gentleman, so free from the pedantry which sometimes haunts the professor's chair."
