The Budget Speech.

Premier Tweedie is confined to his room at the Queen Hotel by illness, and on that account the budget speech which was to have been given in the House this afternoon will be delivered on Monday. If the Premier is not then able to be in his place, Attorney General Pugsley will deliver the budget, an announcement to this effect having been made in the House this afternoon.

The Bank Bill.

The St. John bank bill was sharply discussed for an hour in the House yesterday,

and when six o'clock came the committee decided to report progress. Mr. Hazen, who is opposed to the bill, tried to force a division, but did not succeed. A number of the members favorable to the bill had left the House, and had a division been brought on the chances are the measure would have been thrown out.

COMMITTEE WORK.

Miramichi Log Driving Company's Bill Under Discussion.

The corporation committee of the legislature had under consideration today the bill to amend the act relating to the Upper Southwest River Log Driving Company. The bill asked authority to increase the rates for driving from Hayesbar to the boom limits from 30 to 40 cents per thousand feet. Mr. E. Hutchinson, who lingers on the river affected by the bill, but is not a member of the company, strongly opposed the proposed increase. Messrs. M. Welsh, Timothy Lynch, Harry Beckwith and J. H. Barry, K. C., appeared in support of the bill. Messrs. Welsh, Lynch and Barry addressed the committee and made out a strong case in favor of the passage of the bill, and favorably impressed a majority of the members. At the suggestion of Chairman King, the bill was stood over to give the parties a chance to confer, and if possible settle their differences.

A delegation headed by Arthur Gould of Pictou, was heard on behalf of a bill to amend the Maine and New Brunswick Electrical Power Company. The concern which acquired a franchise at a previous session to supply light and power to the towns of Perth, Andover, Fort Fairfield and Pictou, is seeking authority to increase its capital stock to \$200,000, and also to issue bonds to the extent of \$250,000. It is likely that the bill will be recommended.

The agricultural committee met this morning and were addressed by Dairy Superintendents J. F. Tilley and Harvey Mitchell on the importance of keeping the dairying industry distinct from the beef raising industry. The majority of members all expressed the opinion that the selection of breeds should be left with the agricultural societies.

A resolution was passed on motion of Mr. Borden, recommending the government to make a grant of seed to assist farmers in certain districts of Carleton, Gloucester and Restigouche counties, who had their crops totally destroyed by hail storms. The resolution was strongly supported by Messrs Farris, LaBillette, Flemming and Goggin.

MR. BURGOYNE'S DEATH.

Passed Away at an Early Hour This Morning.

The death occurred here at an early hour this morning, of Mr. Tobias Burgoyne, proprietor of the Lorne Hotel, Regent street. He had been ill since last November from consumption, and his death was not a matter of surprise to his family and friends. He was a native of Kingsclear, but had been a resident of this city for seven years. For a time he conducted the Albion Hotel, on Queen street, but has had charge of the Lorne Hotel for five years.

Mr. Burgoyne was sixty three years of age and leaves a widow and family of six daughters and six sons, all except two of the latter being by his first wife. Two of his sons, Frank and John, are in Montana, and four of the daughters live in Boston and vicinity. The remaining children are at home. One brother, Peter Burgoyne, resides at Kingsclear.

The funeral service will be conducted at St. Dunstan's church tomorrow morning at 8.30, after which the remains will be taken to Kingsclear for burial.

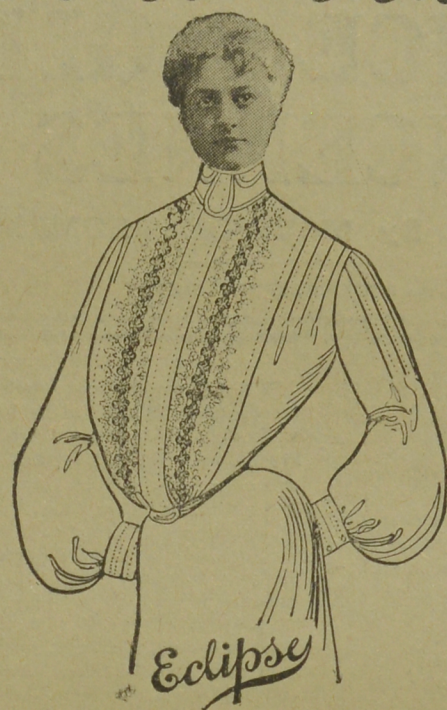
