Sovereign Told he Must not Exceed Prerogatives.

IRELAND THE CAUSE.

His Majesty's Attitude Towards Home Rule Wor-rying the Unionists.

London, May 12.—King Edward has returned from Ireland immensely enthusiastic over his visit. He was received with respect and cordiality everywhere, the manifestations being spontaneous.

The Times has actually lectured him severely for his sympathetic speeches which, it fears, will inspire hopes of concession to the Nationalist demands, which are impossible. It reminds him moreover, of his limitations as a constitutional sovereign, and of the danger of overstepping his prerogatives.

The secret of this astonishing outburst is that the ascendancy party in Ireland has become aware that the King has been privately discussing Home Rule with prominent Irish Unionists, indicating that at least he has an open mind on the question. In addition they consider that he neglects the Orange Loyalist section of Ireland to cultivate the good will of the Nationalist population.

The King is determined to work for the pacification of Ireland, and now is in constant communication with the Irish Secretary, Mr. Wyndham, as to measures to be adopted to stem the tide of emigration which is draining the life blood of the country.

The Irish Unionists, at the outside one sixth of the population, fear that if it becomes known that the King is not afraid of Home Rule its passage would be swift and certain.

NEW TOURIST CARS.

Order for Twenty-Five Placed by the C. P. R.

The first eight of an order for twenty-five of a new type of tourist cars, have been placed by the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., on the runs between Boston, Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver. They are the handsomest tourist sleepers ever built, and are highly creditable to the C. P. R. Company's shops, Montreal, at which they were constructed. These magnificent cars are 72 feet long, and contain fourteen compartments, seating fifty-six passengers. They have complete kitchen and toilet arrangements, and spacious smoking rooms. In fact, with the exception of being upholstered in leather instead of plush or velvet, and with interior fittings of birch instead of mahogany, they might easily be taken for first-class sleepers. A noticeable improvement over similar cars which have been previously turned out, is the arrangement of the seats, which are so constructed as to leave ample room beneath them for hand baggage. Tourist cars have always been a great feature of the C. P. R. equipment, and these new ones will make them more popular than ever amongst those who wish to combine economy with all the comfort that is possible to get while on the road.

LEPERS IN INDIA.

Quarter of a Million of Them in That Country.

"I travelled over 7,000 miles through India recently to investigate the conditions in the leper districts of that country. The sights I saw were pitiable, one can hardly realize the loathsomeness of the fell disease that is working such havoc among the natives of that country."

These were the words of Mr. John Jackson, of London, England, a fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, to a Montreal Star representative at the Bath Hotel Thursday. Not only has Mr. Jackson an interesting personality, but he is filled with enthusiasm for the alleviation of some of the suffering, of the homeless, hopeless, helpless thousands who are bound in the chains of the terrible disease—leprosy.

Continuing, Mr. Jackson said:

"There are over a quarter of a million lepers in India. They are scattered all over the country. Bengal is the most leprosy province, but Bengal is only a very small section of what might be termed a country rotten with leprosy. The civil authorities are trying to cope with the dread disease. Civil authorities, however, have their hands tied to a certain extent, and it remains for the philanthropic to care for the suffering and tend to the leprosy."

"Is the disease on the increase?" asked the reporter.

"I'm glad to say that the census showed that the number of lepers in India were decreasing. The civil and religious authorities are working to the end of the complete segregation of the lepers in India. Whether this is a feasible plan remains to be seen, but segregation is the goal of every man and

woman who has the welfare of the poor hopeless people at heart."

"Is leprosy hereditary?" was asked. "Now you are getting into deep waters of discussion," was the reply of Mr. Jackson. "Personally I do not think it is. Children are born of leprosy parents that never show a trace of the disease. It is, in my opinion, contagious. There has never been a remedy found for leprosy."

Mr. Jackson outlined the work that was done by various agencies in India for the alleviation of the suffering of these poor creatures. He spoke of the asylums that had been built and the efforts that were being put forth to make the life of the leper one worth living, to a certain degree. The main thing was to save the children. That was the chief object. Bengal and the other districts, with their teeming thousands of poor helpless creatures, were crying out for a land to lift the dark veil of disease.

He served in the Boer war with distinction, and afterwards went to Canada where he purchased a fine farm. After the wedding the bride and groom will visit many points of interest and then go home to North-West.

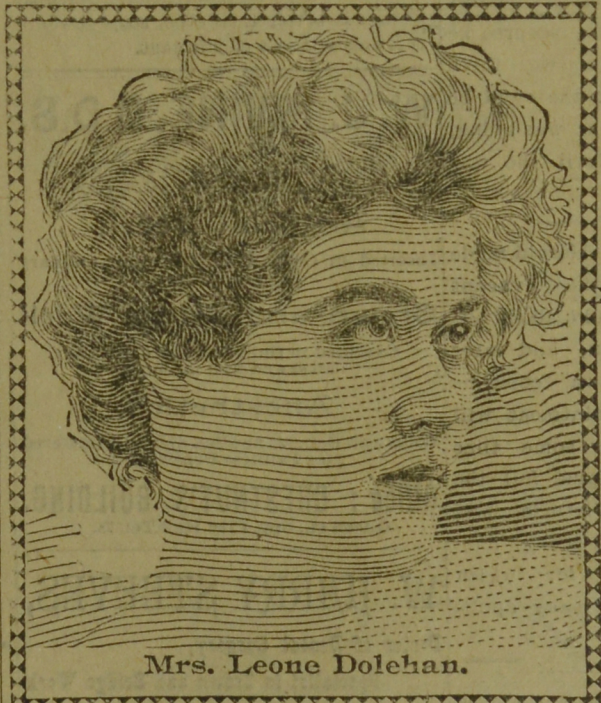
