

NEW BRUNSWICK CLAIMS.

Premier and Attorney General Urged Them at Ottawa.

LATTER GOING TO ENGLAND.

Attorney General Pugsley will go to London to argue before the privy council on behalf of New Brunswick the question of the right of the dominion parliament to reduce the representation of this province in the House of Commons.

Premier Tweedie and the attorney-general returned home yesterday from Ottawa. Last evening Dr. Pugsley said to a Telegraph reporter that the premier and he and a conference with Sir Wilfred Laurier, Hon. Mr. Emmerson and other members of the government on various matters of importance to the province, including the readjustment of the provincial subsidies in accordance with the request of the governments of the various provinces as agreed to at the Quebec conference; also the settlement of the fisheries question.

Premier Peters and Mr. Williams, on behalf of the P. E. Island government were also in Ottawa and considerable time was devoted endeavoring to settle the case which it has been agreed shall be referred to the supreme court to determine the right of the provinces to the amount of the Halifax award. The attorney-general said satisfactory progress was being made in both these matters.

He had also conferred with the department of justice with the view of fixing the date for argument of the question of the right of the Dominion parliament to reduce the representation of New Brunswick.

Dr. Pugsley said the record had gone forward to London and it had been agreed that the case would be argued in the early part of July. The deputy minister of justice will argue both the New Brunswick and P. E. Island cases on behalf of the Dominion government while Attorney General Peters and A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., of Toronto, will argue on behalf of P. E. Island, and Attorney General Pugsley will argue the New Brunswick case on behalf of this province.

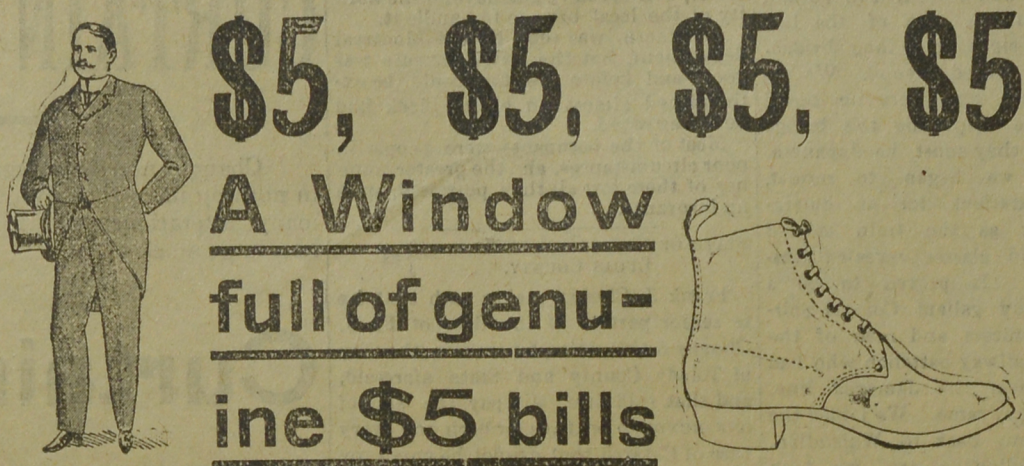
Dr. Pugsley said he had not arranged when he would sail for the old country.

Attorney-General Pugsley having made a request to the chief justice of the Supreme Court of Canada that there should be a reasonable time given between the closing of the arguments of the cases from Nova Scotia and P. E. Island and those from this province, so that the lawyers engaged would not be kept waiting, last evening received a telegram from the registrar of the court stating that the New Brunswick cases would not be taken up before Thursday next.

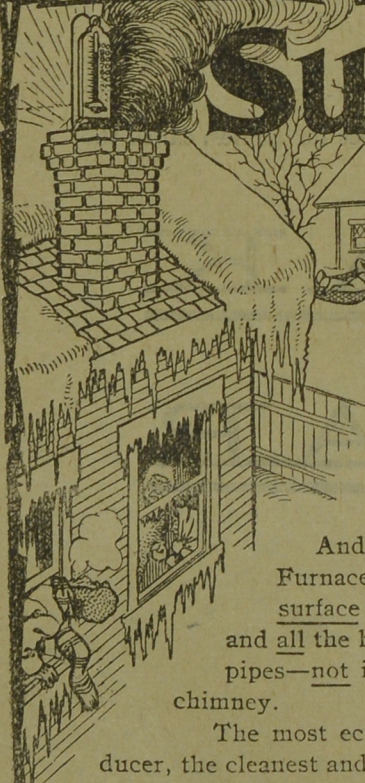
