

CANADIAN LITERATURE.

Rev. Frank Baird Delighted a Large Audience.

The Y. M. C. A. hall was completely filled last evening with a large and appreciative audience, assembled to hear the lecture by Rev. Frank Baird of Sussex, on Canadian Literature. Prof. Clawson, of the U. N. B., occupied the chair, and in introducing the speaker of the evening spoke of him in felicitous terms.

Rev. Mr. Baird spoke for upwards of an hour, and was listened to with the greatest interest by the large audience. He is an easy and graceful speaker and dealt with his subject in a masterly manner. He paid a graceful tribute to the members of the Roberts family, whom, he said, had taken a prominent place in Canadian literature. He entertainingly sketched the career of Prof. Charles G. D. Roberts, and made numerous quotations from his writings in prose and poetry and commented favorably upon the same. He regarded Prof. Roberts as easily the most cultured of Canadian poets. The promotion of a national sentiment in Canada, especially during the last two decades, was in a measure due to the poetical contributions of Prof. Roberts to Canadian literature. Prof. Roberts, he said, held an exalted and enviable place in Canadian literature, and was deserving of the thanks of his countrymen for what he had done.

In closing the speaker paid an earnest tribute to the U. N. B., of which he is a graduate, and referred to it as the Oxford of Canada.

The lecture was followed by a discussion taken part in by Prof. Clawson, Rev. Dean Partridge and Rev. J. W. Nicholson of St. John. All complimented Rev. Mr. Baird very highly on his admirable lecture.

A hearty vote of thanks, moved by A. H. Barker and seconded by John McNaughton, students of the U. N. B., was presented to Rev. Mr. Baird and gracefully acknowledged.

SOLID FOR LAURIER.

Quebec East Electors Refused to Hear Premier's Opponent.

Quebec, Oct. 26.—Political meetings were held in every centre of the different constituencies of the Quebec district Monday, and were overwhelmingly in favor of the government candidates.

Dr. M. Fiset, ex-alderman of St. Saver, Conservative candidate in Quebec East against Sir Wilfrid Laurier, held a meeting at Pelleville. The moment he attempted to address the electors he was told they did not want him, and he could not be heard. G. F. Delage, Liberal local member for Quebec City, arrived on the scene and was enthusiastically received. He spoke in favor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier amid enthusiastic cheering. He begged the electors to allow Dr. Fiset to speak, saying he could do no harm. The request was granted, and the doctor spoke for a short period amidst silence. Meetings held in the County of Montmorency conclusively showed that T. C. Casgrain has lost the confidence of the electors. His defeat is a foregone conclusion.

MAJOR FORRESTER'S WILL.

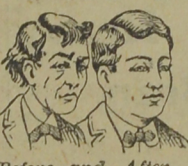
Estate all Left to Relatives in England.

The estate of the late Major William Forester, of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, at Toronto, who died last June, is being administered by the Toronto General Trusts Corporation. It consists of property to the extent of \$24,000, of which \$20,000, the estimated value of the unadministered estate of his wife, forms the chief part. A sum of \$2,600 represents the Major's life insurance. The relatives interested in the estate are two brothers, two sisters, and a nephew and niece, all of whom live in the old country.

TO THE Electors of the County of York.

GENTLEMEN:

The late Parliament of Canada, having been dissolved by proclamation of His Excellency, the Governor General, writs having been issued for the election of a new parliament, you will be called upon on the third day of November next to elect a member for this county, to represent you in the House of Commons.

At a very large attended and representative convention of the Liberal party, held at the City of Fredericton on the eighth instant, I was unanimously nominated and chosen as a candidate to contest this constituency at the forthcoming election in the interest of the Government of the day, and having accepted the honor thus tendered me, I am now before you, asking for your suffrages and support.

On three previous occasions I appeared with success to the electors of this county: once as a candidate for the Legislative Assembly of the Province, and twice as a candidate for the House of Commons; it is, therefore, with some considerable degree of confidence, that I am again asking for your support, for I am unaware of anything having occurred, since you last did me the honor of electing me as your representative, by a splendid majority that would warrant me in inferring that I have forfeited in the smallest degree, the confidence that was then reposed in me.

I am not asking for your support upon any special merit of my own, although I have in all things, and to the best of my ability, endeavored to serve your interests, but rather upon the record of the Government, so ably led by the Right Honorable Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Since 1896 the commanding statesmanship of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his government, and the many administrative acts of such supreme importance to the people of Canada, have been so prominently brought to your attention through the press of the day and by the utterances of public men, that it would be of little value, even did time or occasion permit, to recount them here.

Referring to matters that more closely concern this constituency, your attention is called to the manner in which the public works and buildings of the county have been looked after; to the acquisition by the government of the Canada Eastern Railway and its operation as part of the Intercolonial system, an event which, in commercial importance to the business men of Central New Brunswick has not been surpassed by any other single event that has occurred during the last quarter of a century; to the proposed Grand Trunk Pacific Transcontinental railway, the preliminary surveys for which are now being vigorously pushed in our own Province, and the main line of which it is believed by those competent to form a judgment upon the subject, is almost certain, on account of the engineering difficulties that would beset a more northern route, to traverse the valley of the river Saint John. All these are matters upon which the electors will be expected to pronounce on the third proximo.

It is submitted to you as a most reasonable proposition, that a government that has reduced the rate of taxation by thirteen per cent., at the same time keeping the national debt stationary; that has during seven years increased the trade of Canada, from \$239,000,000 to \$467,000,000; that a government under whose seven years of rule the bank circulation has been increased from \$21,000,000 to \$47,000,000 and the bank assets increased by \$325,000,000; a government that has turned a post office deficit of \$780,000, into a surplus of \$240,000, at the same time reducing the rate of postage from three to two cents, increasing the number of post offices and the pay of the country postmasters; a government under which the people have been prosperous and contented, and the tide of immigration has increased by leaps and bounds, deserves well of the electors of Canada; and I feel that I can with assurance and confidence in the result, ask your support as a candidate supporting such a government.

Owing to the short time intervening between now and election day, it will be impossible for me to visit all of you in your own districts, I intend, however, to call upon as many of you as I can. Thanking you for the generous support heretofore accorded me, and desiring to give expression in this public way, of my appreciation of the high honor conferred upon me by your electing me your representative in the past, I respectfully ask you for a continuance of your confidence, and your active support on the third of November next.
