AT NORTH LAKE.

Characteristic Speeches by Messrs.
Thomas and Crockett.

Monmouth, Oct. 20.—The political pot boiled over here last night when Mr. Crockett the Tory candidate and his private secretary, Duncan Thomas, discussed the issues of the campaign in the presence of a large and enthusiastic audience of three people. Mr. Crockett spoke for three and one half hours most of his speech being devoted to a eulogy of Mr. Blair. In conclusion he said: "I have felt all along that the Conservatives would carry twelve seats in New Brunswick, and now we are to get the baker's dozen." (Cheers.) I have just been notified that Judson Manzer has been nominated to oppose Mr. Crockett. (Cheers and cries of "Hurrah for Judson.") Mr. Manzer is a great man and a patriot. I will, if elected, use my influence with my friend, Andrew Carnegie, to get him a hero medal." (Cheers.)

Mr. Thomas was so much overjoyed by the cheering news from Madawaska that it was several minutes before he was able to speak. He said in part: "I am here to tell you that Sir Charles Tupper was right when he said that a whale, a sorrowing whale, would destroy the industries of Canada under Grit rule. (Cheers.) The hash factories of the country have been obliged to close down as a result of the great tariff, but the hash traps are still open. (Hear, hear) The policy of the Grits is no good; they stole it from us. (Cheers) I feel the stagnation in my own business. Under the N. P. I was the only pebble on poor house hill, now there is a shoe factory near by, and a whole lot of new houses have risen as if by magic. (Groans and cheers) I am supporting Mr. Crockett because he stands for adequate protection to cow pastures. (Great cheering.) I am for Crockett and hot air." (Deafening cheers)

At the close of the meeting Mr. Thomas was obliged to decline two offers to go out west and stump for Parker.

Some Potatoes.

To the Editor of the Herald.

Sir:—Some days ago I noticed an article in one of the papers, of a farmer in York county, having dug fifty-seven potatoes in one hill. Now I can beat this, for a short time ago I took out of one hill sixty potatoes, and the reason I account for this hill being so prolific, is that the seed came from Ireland. About three years ago last May, Miss Ethel Rainsford, daughter of Mr. H. B. Rainsford, barrister, returned from Port Rush, Ireland, and brought with her, seven varieties of potatoes. Her father gave me some samples which I planted and all turned out well. One peculiarity of these potatoes are that the bug will not touch them.

I have picked out two varieties—the best—which I am cultivating regularly and they are really a very fine potato. The first year the imported potato does not do so well, as the growing season in Ireland is much longer than in Canada, and it takes time for them to naturalize here.

DRAGGED UNDER WATER.

A Medical Man Relates His Feelings During the Experience.

A medical man described in a recent issue of a Scotch medical journal his experiences when dragged under water with a foundered ship. He struck out to reach the surface, but only went further down. This exertion was a serious waste of breath, and after what appeared to be ten or fifteen seconds, the effort of inspiration could be no longer restrained, and pressure on the chest began to develop. The most striking thing to be remembered was the great pain in the chest, which was increased at every effort of expiration and inspiration. It seemed as if the sufferer were in a vise, which was gradually being screwed up tight, until it felt as if the breastbone and backbone would break. The "gulping" process became more frequent for about ten efforts, and hope was then extinguished. The pressure after these gulps seemed unbearable, but gradually the pain eased up, as carbonic acid accumulated in the blood, owing to the absence of air in the lungs. At the same time the efforts at inspiration with their accompanying gulps of water occurred at longer and longer intervals. The writer's mental condition then was such that he appeared to be in a pleasant dream, but still had enough will power to think of friends at home, etc. Before finally losing consciousness, the chest pain had completely disappeared, and sensation was actually pleasant. When consciousness returned, the surgeon found himself on the surface of the water, and he finally managed to reach the shore. The writer goes on to describe the very unpleasant effects of large gulps of sea water, and the tortures to be endured in the restoration of the circulation in the almost drowned, and concludes by hoping that death by drowning will not again be described as a pleasant form of death.
