

LAURIER CONFIDENT

That He Will Carry Every Province but One.

ONTARIO WILL RETURN TO THE LIBERAL FOLD.

Premier Had Three Great Receptions Yesterday.

SPEAKING TO ENTHUSIASTIC MEETINGS AT SHERBROOKE, FARNHAM AND MAGOG.

Montreal, Oct. 26.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier addressed three rousing meetings in the Eastern Townships yesterday at Sherbrooke, Magog and Farnham.

At Sherbrooke his reception was much more enthusiastic than accorded the Conservative leader on the occasion of his visit last week and this despite the fact that the constituency has not elected a Liberal since confederation.

The feeling is growing that a change will take place. Clement Theatre was crowded, although it was an afternoon meeting and the Premier's eloquent speech aroused the wildest enthusiasm.

At Farnham and Magog the receptions were equally demonstrative.

At Farnham Sir Wilfrid declared that he was confident of securing a majority in every province of the Dominion but one, and that was one of the smallest provinces.

He probably referred to the province of Manitoba, where the Liberals have an uphill fight owing to the manipulation of the voters' lists by the Roblin government.

Sir Wilfrid's confidence that the Liberals will have a majority in Ontario is very inspiring to workers in this district.

Sherbrooke, Que., Oct. 26.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was given a great reception on his arrival in Sherbrooke yesterday over the Grand Trunk. It was in marked contrast to that given to Mr. R. L. Borden last week. The streets from the Grand Central Hotel to the union station were packed with people, and as the premier's carriage moved slowly along through the dense crowd he was cheered again and again. He spoke in Clement Theatre yesterday afternoon to a very large and enthusiastic audience, and was heartily cheered.

THE FOOTBALL MATCH.

University and City Teams Played a Draw on the Gridiron.

At 4.30 yesterday afternoon R. U. N. B. had the kick off, while the City had the edge of the field. The wind which was blowing a regular hurricane was in the City's favor. From the kick-off the ball was returned to the U.

N. B. territory, but they gradually worked it back to the fifty yard line. At this time a kick into touch gained considerable ground for the City and the ball hovered along the U. N. B. five yard line for a few minutes. The work of the U. N. B. scrim, which out-tossed that of the city, now told and they gradually worked the ball back to the centre of the field. Finnemore here made three nice runs after the whistle had blown. The half ended with the ball in City's territory. Score—0 to 0.

The second half was a repetition of the first. City kicked off and the ball was quickly returned to their territory. U. N. B. forwards, by sharp following up, kept it on City's twenty-five yard line. After a series of scrims Nalder, by a beautiful run, carried it to the City's line. Scrims on the five yard line now ensued and the ball was worked toward the middle of the field. Finnemore, at this point, made a beautiful run but was brought to the earth by Dunphy. By scrims and short runs the play was brought back to City's twenty-five yard line. Dunphy got the pigskin and by clever dodging wiggled his way to the five yard line. Scrims after scrims here took place and play was at the City's five yard line when the whistle blew for time. Score—0 to 0.

BLAIR WILL NOT SPEAK.

He is still at his office, busy with the affairs of the Railway commission, and will be thus engaged until after the elections, when his connections with the commission will cease.

He may accept a banquet from Mr. Russell, but it will have no more political significance than that to Mr. Pagsley at Caledonia Springs, some time ago.

It is well known here that however Mr. Blair differs from the government on the Grand Trunk Pacific project, he differs from Mr. Borden as widely on all other parts of his policy.
