Will be Made
Tomorrow.

The number of qualified voters is 7602 against 7664 in the last contest.

In former years there were only two polling divisions in the parish of Douglas, one at Hamtown, and the other at Bartt's Corner, now there are three. The polls will now be held at Bartt's Corner, Nashwaakeis and Tay Settlement.

A big meeting in the interests of Alex. Gibson, Jr., the Liberal candidate, was held at Stanley last evening. The speakers were Mr. Gibson, Senator Thompson and Mr. George W. Allen, M. P. P. The speakers were frequently applauded as they scored point after point in favor of the government. While Stanley is generally looked upon as a Conservative stronghold, the indications are that Mr. Gibson will poll a much better vote than in the last contest.

At Scotch Lake last evening a large and enthusiastic Liberal meeting was addressed by Messrs. W. J. Osborne and E. A. McKay.

Messrs. N. W. Brown and R. W. McLellan addressed a large and enthusiastic political meeting in Mr. Gibson's inter-

ests at Temperance Vale last evening. Both dealt with the issues of the campaign in a very able manner and were heartily applauded.

The Liberal candidate and Mr. George W. Allen, M. P. P., are to speak at Williamsburg this evening.

A Cool Reception.

Hawshaw, Oct. 25.—Mr. O. S. Crockett, the Conservative candidate, addressed a meeting at the hall here tonight. The audience consisted chiefly of ladies, there being less than fifty voters, and it is a fact that more than three quarters of these were Liberals. Mr. Crockett's chief effort was abuse of Mr. Gibson. The residents of this locality who have been waiting for a railway for years did not take kindly to Mr. Crockett's remarks and the meeting must have had a very chilling effect on his friends here.

NOVA SCOTIA OUTLOOK.

Liberals will Sweep that Province as Never Before.

Halifax, N. S. Oct. 26.—The confident prediction is made that Nova Scotia will return at least fifteen Liberal members in the pending elections. There is today not one sure Conservative seat in this province, and some considerable bets have been placed that even Kaulbach will be defeated in Lunenburg which many have hitherto looked upon as a Conservative stronghold.

It will occasion no surprise to either party if R. L. Borden were defeated in Halifax, as the Conservatives admit that he has only a fair fighting chance of election. All sorts of silly prophecies are appearing in outside Tory papers regarding the result in Nova Scotia, but the people of the province, regardless of their political faith realize it is only a question of the size of Liberal majorities in most of the constituencies.

In Cape Breton Island, where irresponsible papers like the Halifax Herald are claiming everything in sight not a single Tory will be elected. A. C. Bell will be beaten in Pictou, and the erratic Gourley is hustling harder than he will ever be able to get into the trenches in the face of a foreign foe. Gourley is considered a political joke, and one which has been worn threadbare by repeated use. He will be relegated on November 3rd to the oblivion of worn out jokes.

J. J. Ritchie an Annapolis lawyer, is making a desperate attempt in Shelburne-Queens to defeat the Minister of Finance. His efforts, however, are not considered sufficiently serious to even keep Hon. Mr. Fielding within his constituency, as he is stumping the entire province in his effective way.

In Antigonish, Guysboro, Inverness, Digby, Yarmouth, Annapolis, Hants and Cumberland Liberal victory is assured, while in Kings Sir Frederick Borden has a walk-over and has been lending his aid to the campaign in New Brunswick.

Altogether the outlook in Nova Scotia is for a larger Liberal majority than 1900.

Want a Dry Election.

At a regular meeting of Tay Council, No. 14, R. CALLED RUSSELL'S BLUFF.

Emmerson's Private Secretary Backed
Davy Down.

The St. John Sun of Tuesday says: While coming from Moncton to St. John on Saturday David Russell made a bet with J. L. Payne, Hon. H. R. Emmerson's private secretary, at odds of 2 to 1 on every hundred of the minister's expected majority. That is, Mr. Russell bet \$100 to \$50 that he will not poll 100 of a majority and soon up to \$800. After the bet had been recorded Mr. Russell then offered to bet \$2,000 that Emmerson would be defeated. This bet Mr. Payne said he would accept, and named Harry Doherty of the Royal Hotel as stake-holder. Mr. Russell agreed to this, and said that he would put up the money, but it has not been put up yet. Those who know Mr. Russell, however, have no doubt that it will be. Mr. Payne says he will cover it just as soon as it is put up, and would take any amount up to \$20,000. He is representing people who have unlimited funds to support their convictions.

The bet was a bluff; the wild talk of an ostentatious and reckless plunger, for the edification of the crowd. But David Russell, has now crawled into his hole; as the following telegram explains:
To J. T. Hawke, Moncton.

St. John, N. B. Oct. 24.—David Russell refuses to put up the money on his Westmorland wager, and says it was a mere bluff. I have challenged him to make it twenty thousand. J. L. PAYNE.
