MR. POTTINGER, C. I. S. O.

Among the Canadians who received honor at the hand of His Majesty, the King, last week for long and distinguished service in the civil administration of Canada, was Mr. David Pottinger, of Moncton, general manager of the government railways who was made a Companion of the Imperial Service Order.

Mr. Pottinger has been a railway man for forty-one years, and rose from a humble place in the service to his present responsible position, by the exercise of industry, intelligence and faithful adherence to duty.

He is a native of Pictou, N. S., where he was born Oct. 1843, was educated at the celebrated Pictou Academy, which has given so many distinguished men to the country, when twenty years old in July 1863, entered the service of the Nova Scotia railway at Halifax, as a clerk, and has been in the railway service continuously from that date. He was appointed cashier of the Nova Scotia railway, May 1871, and on the consolidation of that line with the Intercolonial railway, Nov. 9, 1872, he was given the position of station master at Halifax. In Aug. 1874 he was promoted to be general storekeeper of the Intercolonial with an office at Moncton, in Feb. 1879 he was appointed chief superintendent of the road, and in Dec. 1892, he received his present position of general manager of the government railway system which includes the P. E. I. railway as well as the Intercolonial.

Mr. Pottinger has shown great devotion to duty, and personally is a very pleasant gentleman, well informed, not only in railway matters, but on many other lines of thought. He is unmarried, and occupies a handsome residence at Moncton, where he is very highly esteemed.

The Herald has a great deal of pleasure and satisfaction in uniting with Mr. Pottinger's numerous friends throughout the country in hearty congratulations on the recognition of his long and faithful service by His Majesty, and also in the hope that he may long be spared to enjoy the well merited honor.

Recommendations to the King for the bestowal of Imperial honors are made by the Dominion cabinet, through the governor general, and the two gentlemen, Senator Drummond and Mr. Hugh Montague Allan, of Montreal, who have just received the honor of knighthood, are both Conservatives. Our Tory friends, therefore, will see from this fact that there is a liberal mindedness and generosity in the Liberal cabinet which was not present in any great quantity in the Tory cabinet from 1878 to 1896. Can anybody recall the name of any Liberal senator or other public man of that faith who was recommended for Imperial honors by the Tory cabinet?

The local opposition convention at St. John Friday night, nominated Miles E. Agar for St. John County's vacant seat in the legislature, after the meeting had voted on his and Mr. Dean's names for the candidature. Mr. Agar was a candidate in the last election, was beaten by some 500 votes and should be an easy proposition for the government on this occasion.

The people of St. John have reason for gratification at the success which attended their celebration of the Champlain ter-centenary, and the biggest day of all the week was Friday. No such crowds ever before attended a public event in that city, and on the whole the programme was very attractive and satisfactory to the spectators. The firemen, always to the front when public spirited effort is called for, made a splendid display Friday night in the torch-light procession, and were ably assisted by outside brigades, notably the Fredericton men, who with the Fredericton Brass Band, were given the post of honor, and were heartily cheered all along the route.

The efforts of the Tory party to censure Mr. Fisher and the government for their action towards Lord Dundonald, met the fate in parliament well deserved, the House voting down Mr. Borden's resolution by a majority of forty-two at a slimly attended sitting. Features of the closing hours of the debate were the speeches of Dr. Russell, who made mince meat of Col. Sam Hughes and his military record, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier's splendid speech.

La Patrie, Mr. Tarte's paper, says: "With the sincere esteem that we have for Lord Dundonald, we think that, instead of censuring the conduct of a Minister at a banquet, he would have done better to have addressed himself to the Prime Minister, who would not have failed to hear him, and take his complaints into consideration."

The Liberal government in the early days of their power were worried by an adverse majority in the Senate, but that time has passed. The Grand Trunk Pacific bill carried by a majority of thirteen.

The last of the ter-centenary celebration was held at the Border Saturday, a tablet of DeMonts being unveiled on St. Croix island. Premier Tweedie was among the distinguished speakers.

The Anglican Synod of Nova Scotia at Saturday afternoon's session elected Rev. Dr. Cody of Toronto, Bishop of the diocese, but he declined the honor, and another man is being sought.

When Lord Dundonald declared that Canada is in a defenceless condition he evidently forgot about Col. Sam Hughes and Mr. Seymour E. Gourley M. P.

Banquets are talked of for Lord Dundonald, but they will be Tory affairs, with an eye to making political capital.

The Principal was a little late starting, but he finally drew one of the best matrimonial prizes in Fredericton. The good wishes of very many friends accompany him and his charming bride on their voyage of life.

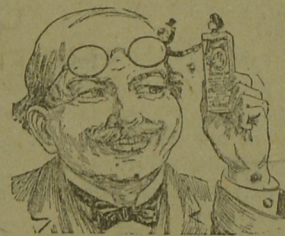
