Canada Eastern Railway Now Under Government Control.

CHANGE WENT INTO EFFECT THIS MORNING.

New Time Table Will go Into Force Monday Morning.

The Canada Eastern railway is now part of the Intercolonial system, the long looked for change having gone into effect this morning. The trains are being run today on the old Canada Eastern time table, but on Monday the new time table, of which notice has already appeared in these columns, will go into force.

The first I. C. R. train to leave the Fredericton station was the Marysville suburban, No. 318, which pulled out at 6.15 o'clock. Conductor Charles Sterling was in charge, with Driver Herbert Belyea at the throttle. The first train to arrive was No. 319, also a suburban from Marysville, which pulled into the depot at 8.15 o'clock. Conductor Sterling was also in charge, so he will enjoy the distinction of having run the first I. C. R. train in and out of Fredericton.

At the I. C. R. depot Station Master Odbur White and his assistant, Kenneth White, have been busy today getting things set to rights and adapting themselves to the new order of things. A number of printed notices, giving information to the travelling public, and also the rules of the road, have been posted in the waiting rooms. They bear the signature of D. Pottinger, General Manager of Government Railways, and were issued from the head office at Moncton.

The new time table will go into effect on Monday morning. From now on there will be two regular trains out of Fredericton each day, Sundays excepted, apart from the suburban service.

A mixed train from Loggieville will leave here at 6.30, and the afternoon express will pull out at 16.30, the same hour as at present. A mixed train from Loggieville will arrive daily at 14.40, and the express from the North is due at 12.05 instead of 16.30, as at present.

Conductors John Yerxa and Albert Logan will have charge of the express trains, and Conductors Andrew Crookshank and Robert Henry, the mixed trains.

The passenger rates on the road are now three cents per mile for first class tickets, and two cents for second class, which means quite a reduction. Local freight rates have also been reduced.

The first I. C. R. ticket was sold here this morning to a lady bound for Marysville. She paid 14 cents for the round trip. As far as known no extra charge is to be made for crossing the bridge, which is practically owned by the government.

Mr. Fred. S. Whittaker of this city, has been appointed track clerk, and Mr. John Cochrane of Gibson, will act as clerk to mechanical foreman, P. A. Logan.

Mr. Thomas E. Hoben, who has filled the position of superintendent of the Canada Eastern, is now assistant superintendent of the Moncton and St. Flavie district. Mr. J. A. Hendery, formerly station agent at Gibson, becomes train despatcher for the new branch.

BELONGS TO WOODSTOCK.

A Runaway Wife Captured by the Police This Morning.

A middle aged man named James Andrews, hailing from Woodstock, reported to the police last night that his wife left his bed and board on Monday last and was supposed to be in Fredericton. From the description he gave the police inferred that the missing wife was one of the young women given shelter at the police station Thursday night. They related the circumstance to Mr. Andrews, who was inclined to concur in their view. He was surprised, however, to learn that his wife was doing the vagrancy act about the city, and before leaving the police station intimated that it made little difference whether he found her or not.

This morning the runaway wife was arrested by Policeman Phillips and lodged in the police station. When taken before the police magistrate she gave her name as Agnes Connors but afterwards admitted that she was the wife of Andrews. She stated that she had left him because he had not used her right. She stated that she was without money or friends in the city, but was willing to work.

Col. Marsh remanded her to jail until Monday, and will likely make application to the alms house authorities to have her sent back to Woodstock. The woman's husband cannot be found today and it is supposed that he returned home.

MONTHLY STATISTICS.

Imports to Fredericton Show a Substantial Increase.

The value of goods entered for consumption at the port of Fredericton during September was \$33,797, of which \$19,990 represented free goods. The duty collected amounted to \$3,784.04. For the corresponding period last year the imports amounted to \$17,058, of which but \$1,535 represented free goods. The amount paid in duties was \$4,455.40. The imports for the quarter ending Sept. 30th was \$110,658, of which \$67,636 was for free goods, and \$43,022 for goods dutiable. The duty collected amounted to \$11,858.45. For the corresponding quarter of last year there was entered for consumption free goods amounting to \$22,350, and dutiable goods to the value of \$42,751, making a total of \$65,101. The duty collected was \$11,613.75.

The amount deposited in the government savings bank during Sept. was \$12,578, and the withdrawals totalled \$17,039.28. On Sept 30th there was due depositors the substantial sum of \$1,060,850.98.

The amount collected in fines at the police court during September was \$150. There was one Scott Act fine paid during the month, the balance being collected for ordinary offences.

Grant Still at Large.

Mr. J. B. Hawthorn left here last evening to drive to Harvey with the object of continuing the search for Grant, the escaped pickpocket. Mr. Hawthorn is leaving no stone unturned to discover the whereabouts of Grant, and it will be no fault of his if he is not recaptured. Although four days have elapsed since Grant took French leave from the jail, not the slightest trace of him has been found. A sharp watch has been kept on all trains going towards Vanceboro, and it is not believed that he has gone in that direction. A good many believe that when the prisoner left the jail, he scampered off in the direction of the tall timbers, and is still hiding somewhere in the vicinity of the city, waiting for people to forget about him.

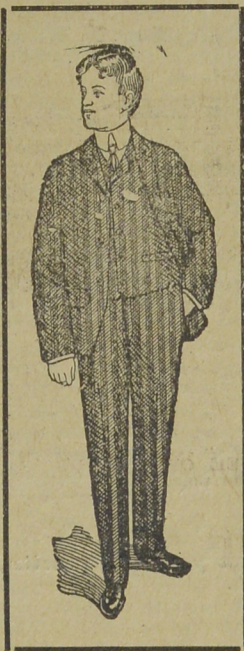
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
