ATTACK ON PORT ARTHUR

Japs Operated from Land and Sea.

NEW FORTS ARMED WITH GUNS FROM RUSSIAN SHIPS.

Chee Foo, June 23.—It is reported here that the Japanese made a determined attack upon Port Arthur from land and sea yesterday, and also during the night.

Accounts received from Chinese sources indicate that attempts to free the passage of Port Arthur have not been attended with success. They say that the Novik's recent passage out was accomplished with the help of tugs. Destroyers alone are able to leave the harbor and are occupied removing mines.

Thirty new forts, armed with guns from the ships have been erected in order to strengthen the land defences.

There is nothing to indicate the intention of the Russians to make a sortie with their squadron. Apparently General Stossels sets everything on the ability to resist Japanese assault, and if all else fails will blow up the remainder of the squadron.

ARREST MADE THEM WED.

"No Kissing" Was a Park Rule and Engaged Pair Didn't Know It.

Baltimore, June 23.—Because it was the only way to gain release from the Northern Police Station, Thomas Higgins, twenty-one years old, and Dorothy Minnes, nineteen years old, were married under a big oak tree in the station yard, a Catholic priest officiating, with several policemen and the matron as witnesses.

It is a rule of Druid Park that kissing and other demonstrations of love shall not exist. Higgins and Miss Minnes, were ignorant of the rule. Not so a big policeman, who discovered them and promptly took them to the station house, where they were locked up.

Here they explained that they were engaged to be married, but the explanation, accompanied by earnest entreaty on the part of the young man and by tears by the girl, were of no avail.

At last they decided to become wedded if that would free them. This point settled, they paid a fine for kissing in the Park and were allowed to go.

The young man said that they had been engaged for a year, but his sweetheart would not consent to be married until she had a suitable trousseau.

A CHATHAM SUICIDE.

Unknown Man Walked Deliberately off a Ferry Boat.

Chatham, N. B., June 23.—A stranger committed suicide here last evening by jumping off the ferry steamer as she was at her slip near the Town Hall. He was apparently a French Canadian, hailing from Banger, about forty-five or fifty years of age, rather tall, stout, of dark complexion, and with a large black mustache. His name is supposed to be Ambrose. He had boarded at the River View hotel here for about a fortnight and was said to have acted as if suffering from some mental trouble or as recovering from a protracted spree. It is reported that he spoke as if he thought he was being pursued by officers of the law, and otherwise acted in a rather peculiar manner. His suicide was marked by deliberation, as he walked on board the steamer, passing on to the outer end, where he threw his hat down on the deck, stepped over the chain which guarded the open end of the boat, and jumped over. He was quickly drawn from the water and gave indications of life, but owing to lack of judicious treatment life was extinct before the doctors arrived.
