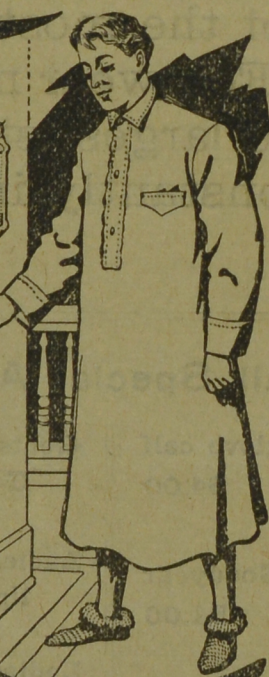
MARYSVILLE NEWS.
