Warships of Three Nations there for the Celebration.

FINE WEATHER AND OTHER FAVORABLE CONDITIONS

Prominent Men to Address Public Meeting.

MAN-O'-WARSMEN BEAT FISHERMEN CREW.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. John, June 23.—The city is crowded with visitors and the streets and stores are beautifully decorated. One American, one French and one English man-of-war arrived this morning, also two Canadian cruisers.

Early this morning the American warships Detroit and Topeka entered this port and were followed later by H. M. S. Ariadne, with Admiral Douglas, and the Ariadne in turn was followed by the French warship Troude, which steamed up and anchored at the head of the harbor.

M. Kleczkowski and Baron De Holroyd, representing the French Republic, came here in the Troude.

Lieut.-Governor Snowball and staff officially called upon Admiral Douglas shortly after the Ariadne's arrival.

At noon Governor Snowball held a levee at the court house.

The chief events this morning were the boat races on the harbor, which consisted of single and double sculls, dingy, canoe and skiff contests.

Three crews from the Ariadne took part in the races.

The event that attracted the most attention was the race between two crews from the Ariadne and a fisherman's crew from St. John. The warship's boats were used and fourteen men and coxswain occupied each of the boats.

It was a splendid race, and although the fishermen pulled with all their might, it was quite evident they were out of place in such a boat. Both of the warship's crews beat them. The fishermen did not finish.

The afternoon programme consisted of a meeting of the Royal Society and base ball games.

Tonight a literary entertainment will be held at St. Andrew's Church, when addresses will be delivered by Rev. W. C. Gaynor, president of the N. B. Historical Society, Dr. A. A. Stockton, vice president of the N.B. Loyalist Society, M. K. Leczkowski, consul general for France in Canada, Benjamin Sulte, vice president of the Royal Society, James P. Baxter, M. D., president of the Maine Historical Society, Hon. P. A. Landry, Judge of the Supreme Court of N. B., Col. Dennison, president of the Royal Society, Reme Benoit, president and Cor. Secretary of the L'Assomption Society, Lowell Mass., and Hon. J. W. Longley, president N. S. Historical Society. Poems will be recited by Charles Campbell, and J. Fred. Herbin.

THE LATE MR. MILES.

Montana Paper's Appreciative Sketch of Former Sunbury Resident.

A recent Butte, Mont., paper referring to the death of Mr. T. Clowes Miles, brother of Mr. A. R. Miles of Mangerville, Sunbury Co., already reported in the Herald, says:

"In the death of Thaddeus Clowes Miles

at his ranch, about three miles from Silver Bow, early yesterday morning, Montana has lost not only a pioneer, but one of its best known and loyal citizens. The end came after an illness of only five days and was due to pneumonia. Mr. Miles was 63 years of age and is survived by his widow, two children, five brothers and a sister, all well known. The children are Charles Le B. Miles and Augusta Amanda Miles. The brothers include Thomas O. Miles, who lives on the ranch near Silver Bow; Frank Miles, a stock raiser and mining man, near Kalispell; Murray Miles of North Yakima, Wash., and two others who live at New Brunswick, Canada. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon. Services will be conducted at the Miles ranch and the interment will be at Mt. Moriah cemetery.

Despite his advanced years, Mr. Miles has been robust and particularly active. He made frequent visits to Butte, and was always apparently in the best of health. But a short while ago he was at the Thornton Hotel and transacted business. He was engaged in raising Angora goats and was the largest producer of Angora wool in Montana. In addition, he raised cattle and was engaged to some extent in mining. It was natural, therefore, that he would have considerable business to transact on the occasion of a visit to Butte. About a week ago Mr. Miles contracted a cold and complained of severe pain in his chest. All that medical aid and loving care could do for him did not prevail, and after having been confined to his bed for five days by what was diagnosed as pneumonia, he passed away.

Clowes Miles, as he was generally known, was born in New Brunswick, Canada, in 1831. He came west in 1843, when only twelve years of age and in 1870 he successfully engaged in placer mining and turned his attention toward stock raising and ranching only when the placer mines at Silver Bow played out and the camp passed. His untiring energy, unqualified integrity and business ability soon made his new business more than a success, and at the time of his death he was considered one of the most prominent and successful men in his part of the state. Mr. Miles was of a modest and retiring disposition and though often asked to accept public office declined such honor, preferring his home life. He was devoted to his family and was known as a man who never forgets a friend. He was a member of the Montana Pioneers' Association and was proud of the fact that he was a "trail blazer" for many who are today prominent citizens of the state. Many friends mourn the loss of a distinguished and upright citizen.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Flag Incident Discussed—The Dundonald Matter.

Ottawa, June 23.—When the orders of the day were called in the House yesterday, Mr. Kaulbach (Con.) referred to the hauling down of the Canadian flag by the British consul at a port in Argentina. The captain who made the complaint was Captain Taylor, of the schooner J. M. Taylor, Nova Scotia. Mr. Kaulbach pointed out that the captain had a perfect right to float the Canadian flag. It should not have been pulled down by the British consul. It was a flag that we all respected. It was a flag of meaning to Canadians, and they hoped to see it floated on ships sailing every sea. Unless this was done we would feel ourselves in an ignominious position. He would like to see the flag floating from all schools in the country.

"I would therefore ask the minister of marine and fisheries," said Mr. Kaulbach, "and the government as well, to take the matter up with the imperial authorities and see why the flag should have been pulled down. The man who had insulted the nation, for he called Canada a nation, should be punished."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that the matter had been engaging the attention of the government for the past two days, and as soon as a reply was received he would communicate the same to the honorable gentleman. Mr. Fisher brought down a memorandum that was omitted in the correspondence of Colonel Smart to minister of agriculture. He said that there were two letters from Col. Whitley, one marked "private" and the other "strictly private," and these he would not produce. If the member for Jacques Cartier (Monk) would say he wanted the originals of two of the letters, he would have them produced, although it was not customary.

Mr. Monk, referring to the production of private letters, said that in a matter of this kind all the correspondence, whether private or otherwise, should be produced.

Mr. Fisher produced the two originals asked for, although he added that it was not usual to do so.

Mr. Borden said that if it would be convenient to the government to move the House into committee of supply today, he would like to discuss the question.

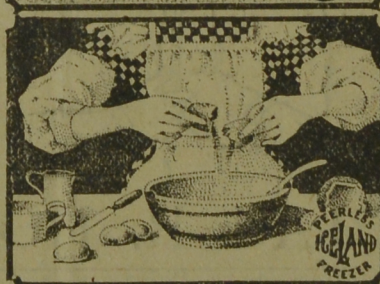
