The June term of the Sanbury County Court was opened yesterday morning by Judge Wilson. The docket consisted of

one criminal case, that of the King vs. Roy Wasson, a thirteen year old boy, accused of stealing \$11 from James Miller of Northfield. The grand jury after taking the testimony of several witnesses returned a true bill against the prisoner. The trial commenced this morning, R. W. McLellan appearing for the crown, and H. F. McLeod for the defence.

STREET LIGHTING.

Ald. Farrell Has Promised That There Will Be No More Cause for Complaint.

Ald. Farrell, chairman of the light committee of the city council, had a conference this morning with Electrician McGinn and instructed him to see that the street lights are turned on in future whenever they are needed. He took occasion to impress upon the electrician the fact that no moonlight schedule is now recognized, especially in the midsummer months, when the foliage is thick and there is always more or less darkness on some of the streets. The street lighting service since the city took control has been an improvement over the old system and prior to Tuesday night, when the lights were turned off at a time when they were very badly needed, the citizens have had little cause for complaint.

Last evening the lights were turned off before the people had left the opera house, where a performance was being put on, but it is quite likely that in future the electric light station employees will not persist in keeping such good hours.

Ald. Farrell fully recognizes that the street lighting plant is now the property of the people and he is determined that it shall be operated in a manner that will leave no cause for complaint on their part.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Verdict for Plaintiff in Frederick vs. Gibson.

In the case of Ira Frederick vs. John and Wallace Gibson, administrator of the estate of the late William Gibson, taken up at the circuit court on Tuesday, the jury last evening after being out forty-five minutes returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$940, being the full amount of his claim. The action was one of trover for the conversion of goods taken under a distress warrant issued on the strength of an alleged bogus lease. The plaintiff resides at Canterbury and the defendant at Woodstock. The case for the plaintiff was ably conducted by R. W. McLellan, and A. B. Connell and J. R. Murphy, K. C's, looked after defendant's interests.

The case of Thomas Powers vs. Robert Winn was taken up this morning and is still before the court. This is an action of slander and arose over a statement alleged to have been made by the defendant that the plaintiff had appropriated school money to his own use. J. H. Barry, K. C, is counsel for the plaintiff and A. J. Gregory, K. C., represents the defendant.
