TOMORROW'S BYE-ELECTIONS.

There is quite a stir in the Canadian
political world over the eight federal bye-
elections to occur tomorrow.

Of the eight contests, one is at St. John,
one in West Queen's, P. E. I., two in On-
tario, East Bruce, and East Lambton, and
four in the Quebec constituencies of St.
James Division of Montreal, Hochelaga St.
Hyacinthe and Montmagny.

The Ontario seats were previously held
by Conservatives and the other six by
Liberals.

The majorities in the last general elec-
tions were as follows: East Lambton,
Con., 221; East Bruce, Con., 43; St. John
City, Lib., 997; West Queen's, Lib., 735,
(reduced in bye-election to 500), Mont-
magny, Lib., 213; Hochelaga, Lib., 635.
St. James division, Lib. 1641, (reduced
in bye election to 700), St. Hyacinth,
Lib. 1111.

The candidates in tomorrow's contests
are as follows:

St. John city, McKeown, Lib. David,

West Queens, Hazard Lib., McLean,
Con.

East Bruce, Dodd, Lib., Donnelly, Con.

East Lambton, Jenkins, Lib., Ar-

St. Hyacinthe, Blanchet, Lib., Tache,
Con.

Montmagny, Lavergne, Lib., Roseau,
Con.

St. James division, Gervais, Lib., Ber-
geron, Con.

Mr. Borden has been giving his Con-
servative friends all the aid he could in
the Ontario contests, and Mr. Tarte has
been the director general in St. James
and Hochelaga, while Hon. Mr. Pri-
fontaine has led the campaign for the
government in the two latter constitu-
encies. In St. John the Liberals have
had the assistance of Hon. Mr. Emerson.

Next to St. John interest in this pro-
vince centres in the Quebec contests
where Mr. Tarte has been making such
desperate efforts to prove that Sir Wilfrid
Laurier's strength has declined in his
native province.

It is never safe to predict the result of
an election, but Liberals will be some-
what disappointed if they do not hold all
the seats which they won in the last
general election, and redeem one and
perhaps both of the Ontario seats.

Premier Tweedie has communicated
by telephone with the Chief Superinter-
dent of Education in regard to the dis-
turbance at the Normal School on Friday
last as reported in the newspapers. The
Premier is indignant at the conduct of
the students who caused the trouble, and
desires that the guilty parties shall be
rigorously punished for their inexcusable
misbehavior.

MME. TUSSAUD'S.

London's Wax Show One Hundred Years
Old—Romance of Founder—Once in
Danger of the Guillotine.

The centenary of the foundation of
Mme. Tussaud's Waxwork Exhibi-
tion in London was celebrated by a
dinner at Baker street, on Dec. 17.

Like many other of London's
"show" places, Tussaud's is even
more famous throughout the country
than it is in the metropolis. Just as
visits to St. Paul's, the Abbey, and
the Tower are inseparably associated
with our country cousin's sojourn in
London, so is a visit to Tussaud's
regarded as equally indispensable.

Although the centenary of Tus-
saud's was celebrated in the last
month of 1903, the exhibition was,
in reality, started by Mme. Tussaud
in 1802. It may seem strange, in
view of this fact, to say that many
who are no longer in their first youth
must have a recollection of the neat
little figure of Mme. Tussaud herself,
seated near the vestibule of her
palace of celebrities in wax; but such
is the case, and it is explained by
the circumstance that Mme. Tussaud
died at the great age of ninety in
1850.

She had a singular and varied life.
She was a contemporary of, and lived
among, the historic men and wo-
men of the French Revolution, and
framed their portraits in wax from
direct observation.

One day she would model the hor-
rible features of the assassinated
Marat, for whom she had no love;
and on another day she would imi-
tate the countenance of his beautiful
assassin, Charlotte Corday, for
whom she had unbounded admira-
tion. Now it was a Princess Lam-
balle, next Robespierre himself who
was the object of her artistic at-
tention.

Mme. Tussaud was for a time the
inmate of a prison, and was in dan-
ger of the guillotine. She escaped
from France and went through a
period of adversity, which she faced
with a stout heart. Once she was
shipwrecked on a voyage to Ireland,
and lost the whole of her stock; but
she survived that calamity, and after
a time was able to set up her models
in London.

They had their first home at the
Lyceum, Strand. In 1855 the collec-
tion was settled in Baker street, and
the present great building was erect-
ed to contain it in 1884.

From the moment when Mme.
Tussaud settled in London fortune
smiled upon the plucky and ingenious
little lady. She had nearly fifty
years of constant prosperity, and
she left to her numerous descend-
ants the finest waxworks show in the
world and a considerable fortune.

The present director and artist-
modeler is Mr. John Theodore Tus-
saud, great grandson of the founder
of the exhibition. Through four
generations the popularity of Tus-
saud's has steadily increased.

Neither time, trouble, nor money is
spared to obtain anything that may
prove an attraction to the exhibi-
tion. Remarkable stories are told
of the sleuth-like hunts of the Tus-
saud directorate for articles render-
ed famous by their association with
notable crimes, criminals, famous
personages, and the astonishing prices
that have been paid for them.

Not a notable crime of the century
has occurred that is not recorded by
an exhibit in the Chamber of Hor-
rors, and no world celebrity has es-
caped commemoration in wax for a
hundred years.

The present exhibition numbers 11,
000 figures, and its contents are val-
ued at nearly half a million sterling.
Over 250,000 people pass through
the turnstiles in a year.

There is a regular army of dress-
makers constantly employed on the
premises, and the greatest attention
is given to completeness and accu-
racy of costume. The most expensive
dress ever made for use there is per-
haps that for the model of the Em-
press Eugenie, which cost £650.

The exhibition is now the property
of a small limited company, but Mr.
J. T. Tussaud has absolute control
of the artistic arrangements.—Lon-
don Express.
