AT A RIPE OLD AGE.

Mr. G. H. Vanwart, Formerly of Queensbury, Called to His Reward.

Mr. George H. Vanwart, one of the oldest and best known residents of York county, passed away at his home on Northumberland street on Sunday afternoon after a brief illness. He had been in the enjoyment of good health up to last fall, when he had the misfortune to fall down a flight of stairs and sustain serious injuries. Although he practically recovered from the effects of the accident, his general health has been failing of late, though he was able to be out up to a week ago. His death was due to the infirmities of age and he retained consciousness right up to the last.

The deceased gentleman was born at Wickham, Queen's county in July, 1819, and was therefore in his eighty-fifth year. His father was the late Isaac Vanwart, a united empire loyalist of Dutch extraction who came from New York state at the close of the revolutionary war and located at Wickham. Fifty-nine years ago the subject of this sketch removed to Lower Queensbury, York county, where he carried on extensive farming operations up to two years ago, when he became a resident of this city. He was a man of a most kindly disposition, who lived a consistent Christian life and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his neighbors. In religion he was a Free Baptist and in politics a Conservative.

A family of four sons and two daughters survive the deceased. They are Hon. James A. Vanwart, ex-judge of the New Brunswick Supreme Court, William H. Vanwart, Hedley V. Vanwart, Dr. G. Clowes Vanwart, Mrs. W. G. Dykeman and Mrs. Sarah Peppers, all except the first named being residents of this city. The late Wesley Vanwart, a former mayor of the city, was a son of the deceased.

The funeral will take place from the residence of Hedley Vanwart, Northumberland street, at two p. m. tomorrow (Tuesday). Services will be conducted by Rev. F. C. Hartley, and interment will be made at Forest Hill Cemetery.

FIFTY YEARS MARRIED.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mitchell Have Enjoyed Half a Century of Wedded Life.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mitchell completed fifty years of married life yesterday, and are being heartily congratulated over the event. They were married at Christ Church Cathedral on February 14th, 1854. Rev. Charles Coester being the officiating clergyman. They immediately began housekeeping on Regent street and have never made a change of residence during their whole married life. Mrs. Mitchell was formerly a Miss Lee, daughter of the late Thomas Lee of this city. Mr. Mitchell is a native of Scotland, but has resided in New Brunswick since he was four years of age, most of the time in this city. The late Hon. James Mitchell, premier of New Brunswick, was a nephew of Mr. Mitchell; Mr. John A. Campbell, M. P. P., of Kingsclear, is a nephew, and Mr. John Anderson, ex-M. P. P. of the Barony, is a brother-in-law. The Herald has pleasure in extending its congratulations to the worthy couple, and hope that they have still before them many years of wedded life.

A Large Funeral.

The funeral of the late Alexander Wisely took place from his late residence at two o'clock Sunday afternoon and was attended by a large number of sorrowing friends and relatives. An impressive service was conducted at the house by Rev. J. H. MacDonald assisted by Rev. W. R. Robinson of Gibbon. Members of the Baptist choir rendered the beautiful hymns, "Nearer My God To Thee" and "Asleep In Jesus." The chief mourners included Mr. Frederick Wisely of Lincoln, Mr. J. A. Wisely, of Halifax, Mr. Robert Wisely, director of public safety, St. John, Mr. Alfred Wisely, of Boston, and Mr. and Mrs. R. A. McFadgon, of Maurerville. Interment was made at Forest Hill. George W. Adams was funeral director.
