Sir Wilfrid Will Speak at Leading Points in Ontario.

DISASTER INVESTIGATED.

Try to Place the Blame on the Grand Trunk Wreck.

Woodstock, Ont., Oct. 4.—After sitting nearly all night investigating the wreck of the G. T. Railway at Eastwood, where five trainmen were killed, a verdict was returned which mentioned no names as being responsible. The jury, however, commented on the fact that the lights were shining false and asked that the Grand Trunk be compelled to see that its employees took more rest.

The evidence of the surviving trainmen was to the effect that the dead brakeman, Benedic and the dead conductor, Fallis, of the way freight, were responsible for having left the switch open and caused the collision. Two men who reached the scene of the wreck early, testified that the switch forks containing the lamp was loose, and caused the lights to show a clear track even when the switch was open. The brakemen on the way freight said they had been on duty for 26 hours, although of their own choice.

POSTMASTER'S DEATH.

Mr. Beausoleil of Montreal, Passed Away Today.

Montreal, Oct. 4.—Word was received from St. Gabriel De Brando this morning of the death there of Mr. Cleophas Beausoleil, post master of Montreal. Mr. Beausoleil has been confined to his home for some months and while it was generally known that his chances of recovery were slight, the announcement of his death caused much gloom over the whole city, where he was much esteemed. Mr. Beausoleil was born at St. Felix de Valois and was 58 years of age.

He was a Liberal member of the House of Commons from 1887 to 1897.

DR. MOWATT'S SON.

Will Lead a Bride to the Altar This Evening.

Montreal, Oct. 4.—Miss Amanda Stevenson is to be married this evening at 6.30 to Rev. Joseph A. Mowatt, son of Rev. Dr. Mowatt, pastor of Erskine Presbyterian church in this city, and formerly of Fredericton, N. B.

The ceremony will be performed by Dr. Mowatt, assisted by Rev. Dr. Scott.

After the marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Mowatt leave for Winnipeg and North Dakota, en route to Vancouver, whence they will sail on October 31st for Honan, China, where they will reside.

WIPED OUT BY FIRE.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 4.—The Village of Glouk, in Southern Russia, has been wiped out by fire.

Five hundred families are without shelter or food, and an appeal has been made to St. Petersburg for immediate help.

MONTREAL WEDDING.

Montreal, Oct. 4.—Miss Kathleen Stephen, niece of Lord Mount Stephen, and F. W. Moore, of the Bank of Montreal, formerly of Halifax, were married here this morning.

LIBERAL MINISTERS.

Had Very Cordial Reception at Amherst—Emmerson and Fielding Spoke.

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 4.—The Liberal campaign in Nova Scotia was opened here last night by a mass meeting addressed by H. J. Logan, the Liberal candidate for Cumberland. Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. H. R. Emmerson and Chas. Marcell, M. P. for Bonaventure.

There were more than 2,000 people at the meeting and all the speakers were given a most cordial reception.

The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock, Mr. Logan and Mr. Fielding, who spoke first, left for Springhill to address a meeting there, leaving Mr. Emmerson and Mr. Marcell to close the Amherst meeting, and Mr. Marcell made a speech of great elo-

quence which has seldom been surpassed on an Amherst platform.

Mr. Fielding dealt with the tariff and the G. T. P. contract. He defined the policy of the Liberal party on the tariff question, declaring that the government was ready to change the tariff to meet the needs of the changing conditions of trade.

Mr. Emmerson pointed out that the policy of the Opposition on the I. C. R. meant increased freight rates, lower wages and poorer service on the I. C. R., that the I. C. R. was a benefit to the wholesale houses of Quebec and Ontario as the Intercolonial was the connecting link between the upper provinces and the provinces by the sea.

Mr. Marcell predicted that Laurier would have a solid Quebec because the premier commanded the respect and admiration of the people of that province.

The opening meetings in Amherst and Springhill were a great success.

GOVERNMENT MEETING.

Lease to be Issued to Baker Brook Manufacturing Company.

The local government held a meeting here last evening, Attorney General Pugsley presiding in the absence of Premier Tweedie. They had under consideration letters from C. A. Duff Miller, agent general in London, and W. Reed Lewis, in reference to a visit of Mrs. Close to Canada. Mrs. Close is promoting a scheme for settling pauper children from London on Canadian farms. She is now in the upper provinces and will shortly visit New Brunswick.

An order was passed providing for payment of a per capita allowance to the school for the deaf and dumb at Lancaster Heights and also for the payment of the exhibition grant.

Another order was passed directing the acting surveyor general to execute a lease to the Baker Brook Manufacturing Company of the water power sight on Baker Brook. The company was organized by Donald Fraser & Sons, who will establish a large industry at Baker Brook and employ several hundred men. A large quantity of lumber will be manufactured which would otherwise have been sawn on the American side. The company is to pay an annual rental equivalent to the interest on the cost of the water rights. The lease was granted pursuant to legislation adopted last session.

The Government held another meeting this morning with Messrs. Pugsley, LaBille and Sweeney in attendance. Quite a lot of business was transacted, but it was chiefly of a routine nature. The members of the Government will leave for St. John by this evening's train.

NORTHUMBERLAND LIBERALS.

Met and Buried Their Differences and Will Unite on a Candidate for the Commons.

Chatham, N. B., Oct. 4.—Hon. Mr. Emmerson, accompanied by Hon. Mr. Fielding and Charles Marcell, M. P., and Premier Murray of Nova Scotia, arrived yesterday morning and were met by the officers of the Liberal association and W. B. Snowball, M. S. Hocien, Warren C. Winslow, W. S. Logie, M. P. P., and others. John Morrissey, M. P. P., Dr. Desmond, P. Henneey, and M. Bannan of Newcastle, came from Newcastle in the official car, and all drove to the town hall where an enthusiastic and harmonious meeting was held.

Addressees were made by Messrs. Emmerson, Fielding, Marcell and Premier Murray. It was decided that a convention of the party be held at once to nominate a candidate, each one present pledged himself to assist to secure the election of the convention choice.

YOUNG MAN'S DEATH.

Charles Caney Succumbs From the Effects of an Accident.

Mr. Charles Caney of St. Mary's, who was operated upon at the Victoria Hospital yesterday for a fracture of the skull died at an early hour this morning. He was twenty-seven years of age and unmarried. The deceased recently returned from New Hampshire, suffering from the effects of a severe accident. It appears that he was passing a saloon one day, while a number of Italians were engaged in a row, and a beer bottle thrown at one of the belligerents missed its mark and struck Caney on the forehead. The wound partly healed, but lately has been troubling him a great deal, and yesterday an operation was performed, but he failed to rally from its effects. The deceased is survived by three brothers and two sisters.

The funeral will take place from the residence of John McGilvary, King street, on Thursday morning at 8.30. The remains will be taken to St. Mary's, where services will be held in St. Anthony's church at nine o'clock. Interment will be made at Sunnybank.
