Regular October Term Opened by Judge Wilson.

INDICTMENT IN THE CASE OF THE ALLEGED PICK- POCKETS

Presented to the Grand Jury--The Civil Docket.

True Bill Returned Against Grant, Williams and Howard.

The October term of the York County Court opened here at eleven o'clock this morning, His Honor Judge Wilson presiding. The barristers in attendance were Hon. H. A. McDeown, K. C., Alex. W. Baird and Fred R. Taylor, St. John; J. H. Barry, K. C., J. D. Phinney, K. C., H. F. McLeod, H. G. Fenety, R. W. McLellan, H. B. Rainsford, W. P. Taylor, Walter Limerick, J. T. Sharkey, R. B. The Pickpockets Case

An indictment was presented in one criminal case, that of the King vs. Charles J. Grant, John Williams and James Grant, the alleged pickpockets arrested at McAdam Junction in June last. His Honor in his address briefly went over the facts of the case as disclosed by the depositions taken at the preliminary examination of the accused. The complainant he said was Mr. D. Russell Jack of St. John, who was secretary of the Champlain celebration committee. Mr. Jack, while purchasing his ticket in the depot on the date mentioned, noticed a suspicious character lurking about near the ticket office, and afterwards the same man tried to block his entrance to the car. Shortly after the train left St. John it was discovered that Mr. Baxter, Mayor of Portland, and Baron de Halewyn, secretary to the French consular general, had been robbed of their pocket books. Suspicion was aroused against Williams, Grant and Howard, and when the train reached McAdam, they were arrested on the complaint of Mr. Jack and brought to Fredericton. Prof. Ami of Ottawa, who was a passenger on the train, swore that an unsuccessful attempt was made to pick his pockets before the train left St. John, and he noticed one of the accused standing near him at the time. Mrs. Sadler, another passenger on the train, identified one of the accused as one of three men whom she had noticed counting money on the train. On the day of the robbery Baron de Halewyn had cashed a check for \$60 at the Bank of Montreal and had placed the proceeds in his pocket book. On the following day the pocket book rifled of its contents was found on the railway track near St. John.

His Honor in conclusion reminded the jurors that they were not trying the case, but it was their duty only to determine if the facts were sufficient to justify placing the accused on trial.

The grand jurors then retired in charge of a constable to deliberate upon the case. The witnesses sworn and sent before them were D. Russell Jack and Jeremiah Shea of St. John.

The case for the crown is being looked after by J. H. Barry, K. C., and Hon. H. A. McDeown and H. F. McLeod are counsel for the accused. Mr. Fred R. Taylor is watching the case in the interests of the C. P. R.

After hearing the story of the two witnesses the grand jurors separated until 2.30 o'clock.

At four o'clock this afternoon the grand jury returned a true bill against the alleged pickpockets.

The trial will commence tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

WESTMORLAND.

Powell Not Anxious to Sac- rifice Himself.

MINISTER OF RAILWAYS WILL BEAT ALL COMERS OUT OF SIGHT.

Conservatives Concede Him a Majority of 800.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Moncton, Oct. 4.—The Conservative party locally did not need much to discourage them and Casgrain's and Clarke's departure from the province, cancelling all meetings here and elsewhere this week, virtually discouraged all local Conservative efforts.

The Liberal party is quietly organizing and a nominating convention will be held at the Opera House Saturday afternoon. One Liberal candidate is mentioned, there is no dissension and no rivalries, and the convention is only a matter of form.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, minister of railways, will be the unanimous choice, and a strong party of Liberal workers will be at his back, putting up a good campaign fight.

There are some doubts as to the Conservative candidate. The Conservative convention will be held Thursday at Sackville, during the exhibition, but it would not be surprising if no final choice is made then.

It is understood that Mr. Powell is not particularly anxious to run nor are his supporters bubbling over with confidence.

Several possible names of candidates are rumored in the event of Powell declining. F. W. Sumner and W. F. Humphrey, Moncton, being among the number. As the Tory candidature is necessarily hopeless, one even suggested that Lionel Hannington, the young son of Judge Hannington would be sacrificed.

Conservative estimates place the Liberal majority at eight hundred with the strongest Conservative candidate running. What it would be with a weaker candidate, the results only will show.

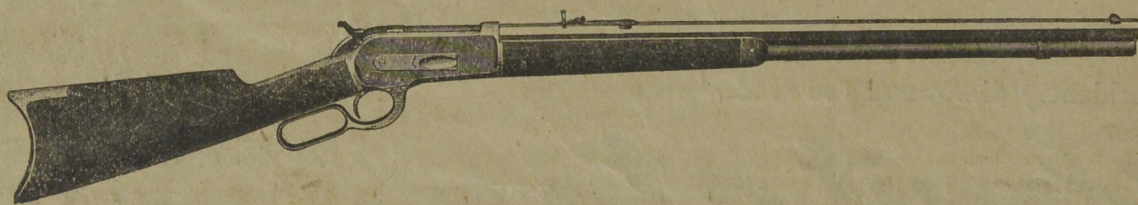
