RODE TO HIS DEATH.

Some Further Details of the Shocking Accident at Springfield.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald)
July 16.—On July 13th in Springfield, Tyler Gordon, aged 13 years, met death by a horrible accident. The loved son and brother's early removal from earth came as a terrible shock to relatives and friends afar and near. The feeling of sadness and regret was intensified by the horrible nature of the accident.

He had taken a four year old stallion to go after the cattle in the pasture about one mile and a half from home on the evening of the 13th. He placed a bridle over the halter and went down the lane through the woods, singing his favorite hymn, "Lord plant my feet on higher ground."

The mother watched her dear, young son, so full of happiness, leaving to perform one of his chores, little dreaming that the dear, sweet voice would never be heard again, nor these loving, bright, cheerful eyes would never look, nor the gentle voice speak the word "mother" again.

They brought him home a mangled corpse. Oh, the sorrow that fell on that home a short hour after their darling boy had left it!

The father, who had been doing some carpentering around the house, being a little anxious as to his son's long absence, went out to look for Tyler, and seeing the cattle coming home through the long lane came back to the house. When the cattle arrived he sent his two smaller boys to let down the bars. They came running back frightened, exclaiming, "The cows are here, papa, but Tyler is nowhere to be seen." Mr. Gordon hastened out to the lane and on looking towards the woods saw the horse bawling and running to where it stood only to meet the horribly mangled remains of his poor boy with the halter rope tied in a slip-knot around his waist. His heart was breaking as he untied the rope, crying, "My boy, my boy." Tenderly lifting his son in his arms he hastened to the house which was soon to be stricken with grief at the knowledge of Tyler's death.

It will never be known just what caused the accident, but from observation of the road over which he went to his death it is supposed that Tyler had tied the rope which had been dragging around his waist and that he had dismounted to fix the bridle which had become unfastened and, the horse becoming frightened, had jumped ahead. Marks found clearly showed that he had braced himself to hold the horse, but his puny strength was not equal to that of the frightened stallion that kept going faster, causing Tyler to lose his balance. Who can ever describe the wild gallop over logs, rocks, stumps, through the brushwood for over a mile, that the fear-maddened horse had gone with the mangled remains of the poor boy fastened to the rope. Terrible!

God give the family strength to bear their great sorrow.

Tyler was one of the brightest boys in the settlement, and a general favorite possessing as he did many winning ways. The esteem in which he was held was shown by the large attendance at the funeral, which was held at his father's house on July 15th at 11 a. m. and conducted by Rev. Mr. Rutledge, who afterwards preached a very impressive funeral sermon at the Baptist church, "Behold Life is but a vapor which appeareth for a time and vanisheth away."

His schoolmates did honor to his memory, the flag at the schoolhouse being raised at half-mast.

For Mr. and Mrs. Gordon and family much sympathy is entertained. As Christians let us all weep with them that weep and pray God to give them his own sufficient comfort.

SECOND WIND.

It Comes When All the Lung Cells Are in Full Play.

The following is a popular explanation of what is known as second wind. In ordinary breathing we use only a portion of our lungs, the cells at the extremity not being brought into play. THE GROUSE.

Clever Bird Which Has a Hundred Tricks of Defence With Which to Fool Its Foes.

The grouse has a hundred tricks of defence. It will sometimes lie still until the hunter is within a yard of it, then soar straight upward in his front, towering like a woodcock. Again it will rise forty

yards away, and the sound of its wings is his only notice of its presence. It will cower upon a branch under which he passes, and his cap will not be more than a foot below it as he goes, and, though it has seen him approaching, it will remain quiescent in frightful fear until his back is turned. It will flush then, and when he has slowed himself hurriedly around he will catch only a glimpse of a broad brown wing far away. Wounded and falling in the open, it will be found—if it is found at all—with the telltale speckles of its breast against the trunk of some brown tree, against which its feathers are indistinguishable, and the black ruff about the neck of the male will be laid against the darkest part of the bark. Often it will double like a fox. Often as man draws near it will spring noiselessly into some spruce and hide until he passes, dropping then to the ground and continuing its feeding. Often, too, it will decline to take wing, though unhurt, and will run fast for a half mile—so fast that the most expert woodsman will be unable to keep pace with it. This it will do only on leafy ground and never when snow would betray its tracks.—Outing.

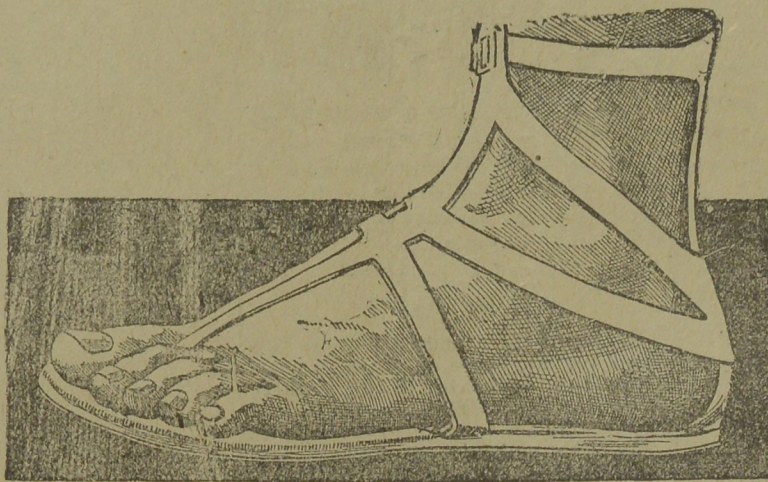
