Fraser are loading another steamer from their mill at Cabana with deals for the Old Country.

Boy Drowned.

A despatch from Bath, Carleton County of 20th says: About 6 o'clock last evening, at Upper Kent, about nine miles from here, Sydney Armour, seventeen years old, while in bathing with a companion, Lee Shaw, was drowned. Shaw and Armour were on a log jam. Shaw jumped off first and Armour followed. Dr. Cummins was summoned and declared an inquest unnecessary.

SAW MANY CHANGES.

Former Resident Visited Fredericton After a Long Absence.

Among the passengers to St. John last evening were Mr. Samuel E. Farrin and his three daughters, Misses Mattie, Mayme and Miriam, of Philadelphia, who have been visiting friends in this city for the past few days. Mr. Farrin was a former resident of this city, having been employed here in his early days by Mr. Andrew Duncan, one of Fredericton's best known tinsmiths at that time. Mr. Farrin removed to Philadelphia 44 years ago where he entered the tinsmith business and has enjoyed considerable success. His recent visit to the city was the first in that long period of years, and to say the least he was greatly surprised and delighted with the many changes in Fredericton, although regretting that he saw so few of his old friends. Mr. Farrin will visit his brother in St. John before returning home.

Miss Dunphy was not hurt but considerably shaken up. Mr. Dunphy was rendered unconscious for a short time and while no serious injuries were sustained he is still suffering from some bruises. Miss Dunphy was able to leave on the train last evening to visit her brother at Winnipeg.

FOR FIRE PROTECTION.

Ratepayers of Gibson Will Erect a Reservoir at a Cost of \$15,000.

A largely attended and enthusiastic meeting of the ratepayers of Gibson was held at that place last evening for the purpose of considering an improved fire protection for the village. After different schemes were proposed and discussed it was finally decided by an almost unanimous vote that a reservoir be erected on the Neill lot near the rifle range, the cost to be in the vicinity of \$15,000.

A Board of commissioners were appointed consisting of Messrs. Jas. Ruel, C. E.; T. D. Babbitt, H. H. Pickard, William Minus and A. B. Neill.

The ratepayers of the village of St. Mary's were invited to attend the meeting and cooperate with the residents of Gibson but they have not taken much interest thus far. It is understood that a number of St. Mary's property holders having in mind the serious fires which have from time to time visited their village, are contemplating joining with the Gibson people in their efforts for better fire protection, and it is to be hoped that they will see their way clear to do so.

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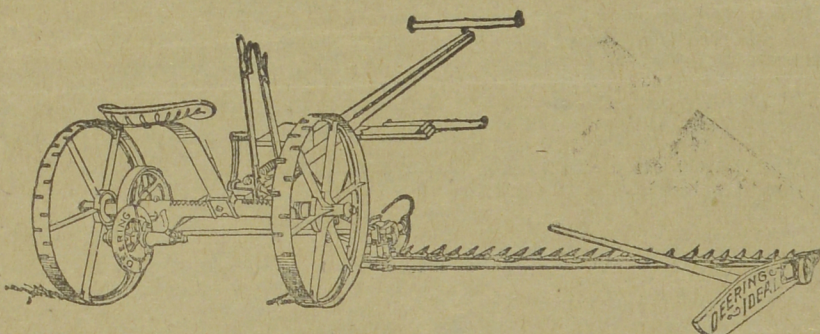
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
