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THE SAME OLD FIGHT.

A Montreal despatch to the Sun says that at a Tory banquet there last night, at which the principal speaker was Mr. Borden, the mention of Mr. Fisher's name in connection with the Dundonald incident was hissed. The offence of the minister of agriculture was in defence of the principles of responsible government in Canada wrung from the Imperial government by Liberals who desire to perpetuate their dearly bought victory. For this they were insulted, tried in the courts of law and some of them for excessive zeal were executed, but the victory remained and Canada is today reaping the fruits.

In the long and wearying struggle, the Tories fought on the side of the family compact in all the provinces and they are still there, if we are to judge by their attitude on the Dundonald incident.

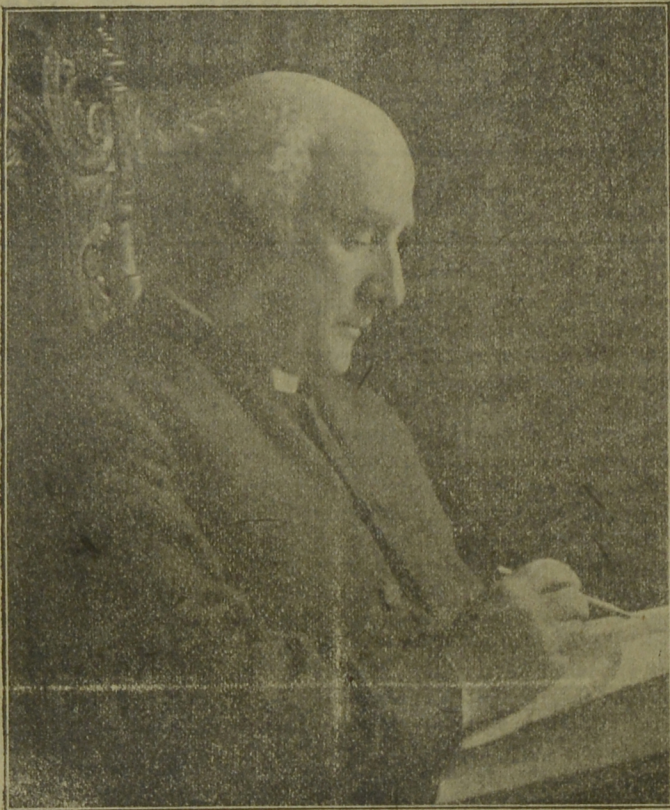
Mr. Fisher dared stand up against making the civil authority of the country subservient to its military ruler and the Tories hissed at the mention of his name at a public banquet. Let them sneer and hiss, the great masses of the Canadian people are with him and will speak when the proper time arrives. They were Tories who tried Joseph Howe for libel when he attacked the old family compact at Halifax, they were Tories who fought him when he resisted a governor who sought to rule in the Nova Scotia capital without regard to popular government, and they were Tories too who rotten egged a governor general and burned the parliament buildings at Montreal.

The Tory party has ever been opposed to the people's rights and liberties, and in the present instance they are found on the side of Lord Dundonald who, although a servant of the government thought himself more powerful than the ministry which employed him, but speedily discovered that there is a power in Canada above and beyond the military autocrat—a government as Lincoln said "of the people, by the people and for the people."

Rev. Dr. Sutherland, the general secretary of the Methodist Missionary Society in Canada, who spoke last night, at the Conference meeting on missions, is of Scottish parentage and a native of Guelph, Ont. In early life he was a printer, but entered the Methodist ministry in 1859, and has occupied his present position since 1874. He was offered and declined the principalship of Mount Allison University in 1891, and is seventy years old.

The Tory papers make the announcement with a great flourish of trumpets that Dr. Pickell, who was turned down by Mr. Fisher because he was not qualified to command a squadron of cavalry, has joined the corps as a private. Glad to hear it, and if he is a good boy and learns his drill, he will find no Liberal opposition to his procuring a commission some day.

The celebrated Methodist preacher, of London, G. B., at present the guest of Mr. Alexander Gibson, sr., at Marysville and attending the Methodist Conference in Fredericton.

Mr. Pearse will preach at the morning service in the Methodist church this city on Sunday next, and at Marysville the same evening. He will also lecture here Monday evening and at Marysville Tuesday evening.

The various wings of the Liberal party in Northumberland got together in meeting last night and apparently settled their differences. Mr. George Watt was elected president and Mr. Robert Murray, secretary, and both gentlemen, who have hitherto represented different factions, spoke strongly in favor of unity.

The Tories are seeking to make the Dundonald incident an issue before the people of Canada, but the same party were themselves forced to get rid of Middleton and Luard, two army officers who were commanders-in-chief of the Canadian militia, but whose acts became distasteful to the people of this country.

General Miles, commander-in-chief of the United States army, publicly criticized the government which he served and was promptly dismissed, ditto General Buller, so that Lord Dundonald is in distinguished company.

The government, whose wishes in military appointments Lord Dundonald sought to override, in the last test vote in the House of Commons, had a majority of 58 of the people's representatives at their back.

Our Peace and War Footing.

Under the new military establishments which have just been approved, our total forces on a peace footing will be 48,043 men, and this will be capable of expansion in war time to 100,000 men. The peace training establishments will include all the officers and non-commissioned officers and a certain percentage of the rank and file. The 100,000 men will be Canada's first line of defence.

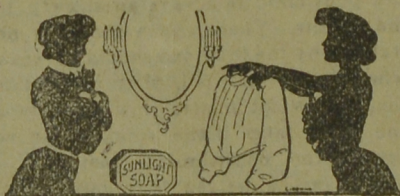
In addition to this important first line, these establishments further provide sufficient officers and non-commissioned officers to form the basis of a second line. For example, each regiment of infantry will have a field officer and each company a captain, a subaltern, a sergeant, a corporal and two men as their nuclei for this purpose, the intention being that as soon as the first line has been mobilized for active service these nuclei will at once set about training duplicates of the corps which have gone to the front, so that in a very short time after hostilities have commenced another line of 100,000 men can be put into the field.

All of the officers and non-commissioned officers of the first line will be available for both peace training and war service, and the men will be divided into two classes, as follows: (a) Those engaged for both peace and war service, who will be paid and be liable for training in peace; (b) those engaged for war service only. The officers and non-commissioned officers who form the nuclei of the second line will be required to do training in time of peace.
