

AWFUL CARNAGE

Deck of Captured Japanese Transport

RAN RED WITH BLOOD.

English Master Jumped Overboard.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Tokio, June 17.—The details in connection with the sinking of the Japanese transport Hitachi by a Russian warship are being furnished by the survivors.

The Russian ships were sighted at 8 o'clock in the morning, and in response to the signal Hitachi was stopped, but later got under way and attempted to escape.

The Russians followed and overtook her and heavy fire was directed about her water line. The fire was terrific and in a few minutes the decks were covered with corpses, and a wash with blood.

One shell struck the engine and killed two firemen.

The ship began to sink gradually at the stern, and by 6 o'clock was completely submerged.

Captain Campbell, the English master of the transport jumped overboard and is among the missing.

The commander of the troops ordered the flag burned and then killed himself, and the second mate committed suicide.

Many of the crew escaped in boats.

Japs Report Victory.

Washington, June 16.—The Japanese legation has received the following cablegram from Tokio, dated today:

General Oku reports that on June 14 our main body advanced northward in two columns along the railway expelling the enemy from the east of Wafangtien. At five p. m., the enemy made a stand on the railway line between Lung Wang Miao and Tafangshen, and after two hours' cannonading we occupied at nightfall the line between Pangchiaton and Yohoton. Another column, for menacing the enemy's right and covering our flank and rear, marched eastward of Foo Chow and advanced upon the line between Tengchiak and Nachialing. The enemy near Lung Wang Miao was reinforced. On June 15 the enemy near Telissu consisted of two and a half divisions occupying the position between Tafangshen and Chengtsushan. At dawn we opened attack and our main body advanced along the railway, one column marching from Tsouchiaton. At 9 a. m. the left wing of the column was joined by the forces from Tungtungkow and at noon by cavalry from Chiachialun. Thus the enemy was surrounded by our forces near Telissu and after severe fighting they were routed and fled northward at 3 p. m. Our losses are estimated under 1,000. So far as known we captured colors, fourteen quickfiring, about 300 of the enemy, including the commander of the fourth Infantry Regiment of sharpshooters. Over 500 of the enemy's killed and wounded were left on the battlefield. Our scouts saw the enemy marching with the Japanese flag in this engagement by which our artillery was misled and suspended fire."

Russians Admit Defeat.

St. Petersburg, June 16.—Emperor Nicholas has received the following telegram, dated June 16, from General Kuropatkin:

"I have received the following despatch from Lieut. Gen. Baron Stakelberg, dated June 16, 1.20 a. m. "Yesterday I had intended to attack the enemy's right flank, but just as our troops had been assigned for the purpose and were beginning to successfully envelop the enemy's right flank, the Japanese in their turn attacked my right flank with a superior force, and I was compelled to retreat by three roads to the north.

"Our losses are heavy, but they are not yet completely known.

"During the engagement the third and fourth batteries of the first artillery brigade were literally cut to pieces by the Japanese shells.

"Of sixteen guns, thirteen were rendered completely useless and were abandoned.

"The conduct of the troops was excellent, a large proportion of them refusing to retire until after they

had been repeatedly ordered to do so."

Tokio, June 16.—The Russian hope of relieving the pressure on Port Arthur by threatening the rear of General Oku, the commander of the Japanese forces investing the Russian stronghold, came to an end yesterday at Telissu, a point on the railway fifty miles north of Kin Chou and 25 miles north of Vafangow, when the Russians were out-maneuvred, enveloped and sweepingly defeated. They left more than 500 dead on the field and the Japanese captured 300 prisoners and 14 quick-firing guns. The Russians retreated hastily to the northward.

The Japanese charge that the Russians violated the Japanese flag. Certain officers aver that during the fighting a body of Russian soldiers appeared carrying a Japanese flag, and that the Japanese artillery, deceived by this flag, ceased firing on that particular body of Russians. Official despatches from the Japanese commanders made specific charges of this flag violation.

Early estimates of the Japanese losses at Telissu say that 1,000 men were killed or wounded.

NO MORE G. O. C'S.

BORN TO BE PAUPERS.

Whole Family Living in an English Workhouse Together.

A family with a remarkable experience of workhouse life is at present enjoying the hospitality of the Marylebone Poor Law Guardians, says the Daily Mail.

At the end of July, 1891, the grandfather, Patrick Downs, at that time about 60 years of age, who lived in Lisson street west, sought the shelter of the workhouse, to be followed a few months later by his wife, Catharine. He was a day laborer, and for the non-payment of rent was turned out of his home. The couple are still in the workhouse, and there they will doubtless remain.

A daughter, Kate, made periodic visits to the institution, taking her discharge when well enough to leave. She is now about 30 years of age. Three of her children, born in the workhouse, are dead, and were buried by the parish. Another, a boy, is now in the Shaftesbury training ship, where he is maintained at the expense of the guardians.

Another daughter, Elizabeth, married a man named Lawes, who has been an inmate, but is not now in residence. The wife died in the institution, and her four children are being maintained and educated at the Guardians' Schools at Southall. A third daughter, Johanna Cooling, who has no children, is now out of the "house," but she has been an inmate.

London, June 17.—The News says the dismissal of Sir Percy Girouard, the Canadian officer who has been director of railways of the South African colonies, has followed promptly upon the thinly veiled vote of censure by the Intercolonial Council. Lord Milner is the person to whom the vote is directed, and Sir Percy Girouard, who is the instrument of his grandiose designs, is merely the scapegoat who happened to be handiest.

Girouard's resignation will give relief to Lord Milner, who has been embarrassed by the situation.
