FRIGHTENED TO DEATH.

Old Woman Met Terrible Fate in a Lonely Field.

Montreal, June 16.—Coroner McMahon was called to St. Dorothee yesterday to hold an inquest into the death of Hortense Cotee, sixty-four years of age, whose body was found in a field near her home in an advanced state of decomposition.

The evidence brought out the fact that on June 7 she was driven from Montreal to the other end of this farm by a young man, who left her there, as she intended to take a short cut home across the fields. She never reached her home, but as she lived alone and her neighbours knew she had gone to Montreal, it was supposed she had remained there. On Sunday the young man inquired at church concerning the old lady and was greatly surprised to find that she had never been seen. A search party was organized and the body was found in a field, with no clothing on but shoes and stockings. Traces of where she had dragged herself over the fence from the adjoining field could be seen and scattered through this field was was found her clothing torn into shreds. Her purse was picked up also with her money inside. In the field was a two-year-old horse, which, while not at all vicious, was very playful. It would attempt to play with any one who entered the field, snapping at their clothes with his teeth.

It is supposed that while trying to pass through the field the lady encountered the horse and fainted with fright. The animal then tore her clothing into shreds, seemingly galloping around the field with them, as they were scattered through all parts of it. Apparently she recovered enough to crawl over the fence into the field in which she died. The verdict rendered was death caused by heart failure, due to fear of the horse when crossing the field.

Crackers' Noise Kills Baby.

St. Louis, June 15.—The noise of firecrackers exploded by boys in the street near by so terrified Stane Kosak, aged five months, that he died in the arms of his mother, Mrs. Celia Kosak, 310 Summit Avenue, East St. Louis, a few minutes after going into convulsions.

The mother had laid the baby down on a quilt on the front porch of the Kosak home, and left it for a moment. Boys began shooting off firecrackers in the street a few feet from the porch.

After several cannon crackers had been discharged the mother rushed out to find her infant in the throes of convulsions.

Bolt Kills Army Officer.

Leavenworth, Kan., June 15.—A bolt of lightning immediately following a heavy shower of rain killed Lieut. Nathaniel E. Bower, Corps of Engineers, near the target range at Fort Leavenworth, this afternoon. Lieut. Bower was carrying an army

rifle. The bolt ran down the rifle barrel and entered the right side of his chest.

Lieut. Hannum, who was with Bower, felt a slight tingle, and immediately threw away his rifle and tore his cartridge belt off.

SYDNEY DROWNING.

Prominent Young Lady went Boating and Lost her Life.

Sydney, June 15.—A sad drowning accident occurred at Sydney River, three miles above this city yesterday afternoon, as a result of which Miss Annie Townsend, a prominent young lady of this city, lost her life and three other persons narrowly escaped meeting a similar fate. Miss Townsend was the seventeen year old daughter of Stipendiary Magistrate John C. Townsend of this city.

With her at the time of the accident were Misses Sadie and Alice Woodill, sisters, 15 and 17 years old respectively, and F. J. Hardison, a well known druggist, who conducts a business on Charlotte Street. The cause of the accident was the upsetting of a pleasure boat of which the four persons named were the occupants.

They left the city at about three o'clock in the afternoon and rowed up the river as far as the Steel Works dam, where they rested on shore for some time. About five o'clock they started for home and had gone less than a hundred yards when the boat was upset by one of the young ladies shifting her position, and all were thrown into the water.

None of the party were able to swim but Mr. Hardison managed to retain his presence of mind and succeeded in keeping the boat on an even keel in order that the young ladies might cling to it until rescued. He also shouted for assistance to a number of other boats, which were near by and the occupants of these as well as a number of people who witnessed the accident from shore hurried to the scene.

They succeeded in rescuing all but Miss Townsend after considerable difficulty. The latter went down just as the younger Miss Woodill was hauled ashore.

The news of the accident was at once telephoned to the city and hundreds of people hurried to the scene to search for Miss Townsend's body which was recovered after a two hours' search. Those who were rescued were almost exhausted when taken ashore and medical aid had to be summoned for the young ladies. The accident has cast a gloom over the city, as the young lady who was drowned was well known and popular.

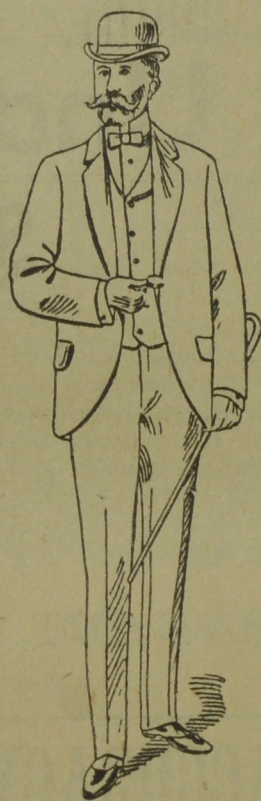
The Destruction of Romance.

Most of England's moated houses had their secret hiding-places. In the long gallery of Parham Hall a sliding panel in a window-seat exposed a narrow passage leading to a hole beneath the floor, wherein a prescribed priest might take temporary refuge from a too zealous officer of the Commonwealth, says Oscar Parker in The April Booklovers Magazine. In Birtsmorton Court, in Gloucestershire, a secret passage once ran from a concealed chamber in the oak-panelled dining-room to a tunnel beneath the moat, and so on to an exit beyond. Sir John Oldcastle is said to have been secreted here during the wars of the Roses. The hidden chamber now harbors nothing more romantic than the family provender. A secret room, with a sleeping apartment, was constructed over the kitchen of Moreton Hall, and access to the moat was feasible down a narrow shaft in the wall. Alas! the secret chamber has been modernized into a storeroom for cheese! It is a miracle that romance has any breath left in its emaciated body. The moat was the family fishpond in the good old days, and it was usually kept stocked with carp, pike and perch. From a convenient window a line could be dropped into the placid waters, and the larder replenished at no cost and with little delay. Monster pike of hoary age still survive, it is said, in some of these old moats.
