A young woman of easy virtue named Edith Elliott, who enjoys quite a reputation as a street walker, was arrested by Policeman Rideout last evening on a charge of vagrancy, and lodged in the police court. She was given a lecture by Col. Marsh, and on promising to leave the city, was allowed her liberty.

Court Martial.

A district court martial composed of Lt. Col. Loggie, Capt. Lister and Lieut. 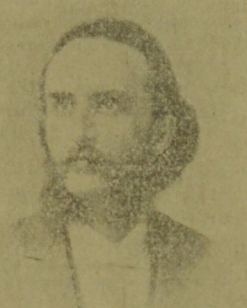
