EXPLANATION ACCEPTED.

The cheaper class of Tory newspapers and politicians will no doubt continue to accuse Sir Wilfrid Laurier of disloyalty to British institutions because in the heat of a debate in Parliament he used the word "foreigner" in referring to Lord Dundonald, immediately correcting himself and substituting the word "stranger," but honorable men of the party frankly accept the premier's statement that he never intended to apply the name foreigner to the ex-commander.

Mr. Borden, the Tory leader, who is an honorable man, has accepted Sir Wilfrid's explanation and has set an example for those who follow him as their party leader. The Toronto News, an independent paper, reports Mr. Borden's remarks as follows:

"With reference to the use of the expression 'foreigner,' as applied to Lord Dundonald, Mr. Borden fully and frankly accepted the premier's statement as to the word used and the intention of the premier in using it. 'I do not for one moment doubt the right hon. gentleman's assurance as to the sense in which he had used that word,' said Mr. Borden, amid Government applause. As an illustration of the manner in which the terms which had been the subject of controversy might be used in association, one with the other, Mr. Borden quoted from the source of purest English literature: 'Now, therefore, ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints.'"

There is already abundant evidence that the loyalty crusade which the Ottawa Citizen, Toronto Mail and Empire, the Montreal Star, St. John Sun and other Tory organs sought to start against Sir Wilfrid has petered out, and it must finally expire in the face of Mr. Borden's frank acceptance of the premier's explanation.

THEY WANT A CHANGE.

The people who reside at Nasonworth, in the Parish of Maryland, are rejoicing in the possession of a twice-a-week mail service inaugurated today in place of the weekly service which failed to meet the requirements of the district. The settlement is grateful to Mr. Gibson, M. P. through whose influence the improved service has been secured, but the people are not satisfied with the days selected for despatching the mails from this city. The service is performed on Mondays and Thursdays, but as the people of Nasonworth are diligent readers of the newspapers, and subscribe for the twice-a-week papers published in this city Tuesday and Friday, they are taking steps to secure the despatch of the mails on Wednesdays and Saturdays, which would be much more convenient and satisfactory to all concerned. A petition is being prepared asking for the change and no doubt as soon as it reaches Mr. Gibson, he will with his usual prompt attention to the wants of his constituents secure the desired change.

This is the glorious fourth, anniversary of the United States' birthday, and it is expected that the usual number of deaths will be reported as the result of the celebra-

tion. Last year the death list from the premature explosion of fire crackers etc., numbered some four thousand. It is 128 years since the declaration of Independence was signed at Philadelphia.

The Democratic National Convention sit this week at St. Louis, and nobody seems to be able to forecast the probable nominee for the presidency. A great boom has been put up for Judge Parker of New York, but it is believed an effort will be made to stampede the Convention to ex-President Cleveland.

A forward step occurred in the New Brunswick oil industry, when at Memramcook on Friday, the first sod of the first refinery in this province was turned. The work of constructing the refinery will be rapidly pushed.

Some Tory members of the Rideau Club, Ottawa, are to banquet Lord Dundonald tomorrow night, and will be very much disappointed if he does not make a political speech.

The Archbishop of Canterbury writes that he will be in Canada early in September, for a brief visit.

Steamship Grounded

Montreal, July 3.—The Dominion line steamer Vancouver, outward bound, for Liverpool, went ashore on a mud bank in Lake St. Peter on Saturday morning. Efforts made to float the vessel on Saturday with tugs were unsuccessful, and similar efforts made today met with no better success. It is likely that a portion of her cargo will have to be lightered in order to get the ship off. The vessel is not damaged in any way. She has two hundred second class passengers on board.

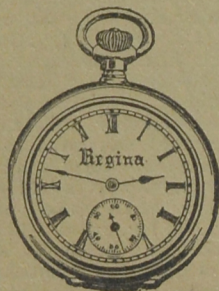
Twenty Killed.

St. Louis, July 4.—The Chicago limited on the Western R. R. due in St. Louis at 7 p. m. yesterday was wrecked at Litchfield, Mo. Among the dead is St. Pierre V. Bald of Montreal.

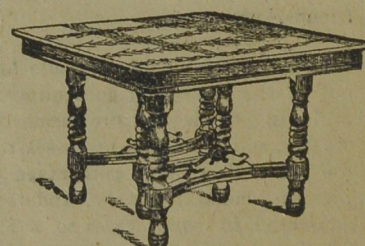
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
