TRYING TO SOW DISCORD.

The strong support which the St. John Globe is giving the Liberal cause in the pending bye-election is apparently very annoying to the Sun and its friends, and the Tory organ seeks to create trouble in the Liberal ranks by recalling the failure of Mr. O'Brien to receive the Liberal nomination.

The Sun knows that previous to the selection of the Liberal candidate the Globe of which Mr. O'Brien is the managing director, declared that whoever was selected as the party standard would receive the united support of the Liberals. Mr. McKeown and Mr. O'Brien at a personal meeting assured each other that the choice of the convention would end the rivalry of the two gentlemen for the candidature and the compact is being carried out. Mr. McKeown was selected and the news paper of his rival is standing squarely to the party, and this is the cause of the Sun's displeasure. The Tory organ knows that a united Liberal party in St. John can defeat the Tory candidate by a large majority, and present indications show that the seed of discord in the Liberal ranks cannot be sown by the Sun or any other opposing power.

The Tory party is not at all enthusiastic over Dr. Daniel's candidature. He was not the first or second or third or fourth choice of the machine, but was taken up because other gentlemen absolutely declined to face a hopeless contest. Discussing the situation the Globe says:

"The only hope felt by the Conservatives in St. John today is that they may reduce the Liberal majority in this constituency. They cannot expect to win the seat. That is absolutely out of the question, as is apparent to anybody who has made a study of the situation. If doubt remains in anybody's mind on this score it is only necessary to visit the Liberal ward meetings and observe the large and active committees that are hard at work. In every quarter of the city there is energy displayed in what is really the basis of victory—the work of intelligent men, carefully and systematically done. With such issues as are involved in this campaign and with so strong an organization as has been formed, the Liberal party will without doubt win at the polls."

A VALUABLE LEGACY.

Dr. C. F. Fraser the indefatigable and talented principal of the School for the Blind at Halifax, is to be congratulated on a recent windfall for that institution. A wealthy Haligonian, Mr. William Urquhart by his will left the residue of his estate, estimated at \$20,000, to the school, a legacy that will place the institution in a very easy financial position. Dr. Fraser and his associates are doing a splendid work for humanity, and interest in the success of the school is quite as general in New Brunswick as in the sister provinces of Nova Scotia. Our legislature gives the institution a large annual grant, and the blind children of the province attend it in large numbers.

Mr. William Wheten, who died yesterday at Moncton, of paralysis, is well remembered in this city as a former representative of Kent in the House of Assembly, having occupied a seat in that body from 1882 to 1887. He was afterwards sheriff of Kent, but for the past three years has been in the employ of the I. C. R. at Moncton. He leaves a widow and four children, one of them being a popular parish priest at Balmoral, Gloucester Co. Mr. Wheten was a kindly hearted man, and his death will be

sincerely mourned in a large circle of friends.

Mr. Chas. S. Hyman, M. P., for London, Ont., who has entered the cabinet without portfolio, has been a member of the House of Commons since 1891, and is a very energetic and capable man, who in the near future will no doubt be given charge of an important department. He is a manufacturer largely interested in the tannery business in various places in Canada, his enterprises including one at Benton, in the County of Carleton. Sir Wilfrid Laurier displays his usual excellent judgment in calling Mr. Hyman to the cabinet.

The Sun publishes a very indifferent picture of Dr. Daniel, the Tory candidate, at the head of its editorial columns. Dr. Daniel is a very much better looking man than the picture shows him to be, and he should protest against the caricature of him. Why should not the Tory candidate have himself taken in the elaborate civic costume in which he appeared as mayor at the reception to the Duke and Duchesses of York. The long robe and gold chain were very becoming to Dr. Daniel, and as the Tories love pomp and show, their leader should agree to this suggestion.

In the Imperial House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Robson, who moved an amendment to the address attacking the government for mismanagement of the South African war, made an attack on Mr. Chamberlain who declined to accept individual responsibility for the war or its conduct and declared that peace was made impossible because Kruger hoped for foreign assistance and was misled by the attitude of the British parliamentary opposition into believing that Great Britain was not in earnest.

After a fortnight's debate in the Ontario legislature on the address in reply to the Governor's speech opening the session, a division was reached last night on a vote of confidence motion proposed by the opposition, resulting in the government being sustained by a majority of three in a full House. Mr. Whitney and his Tory friends are still quite a distance from the treasury benches.

War is imminent between Japan and Russia, and the actual outbreak of hostilities may come at any moment. The belief at European capitals is that all diplomatic efforts to prevent a clash will prove unavailing.

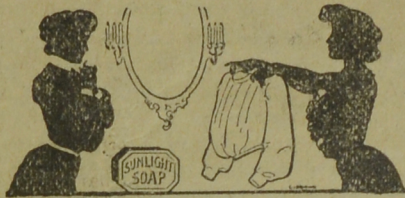
