

THREE LIVES LOST

In a Fire that Destroyed a Montreal Tenement.

INMATES WERE CAUGHT WHILE SLEEPING.

Four Other Persons Seriously Injured.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Feb. 5.—Three sleeping inmates of a dwelling at 778 Cadieux street, were suffocated early this morning and four others were badly burned and injured. Two of these will probably die.

The dead are Edward Crawford, 40 years of age, Willie Crawford, 15, his son; James Hogan, 24, a son-in-law. The injured are Mrs. Ethel Hogan, 22 years, burned on hands, face and arms; Jas. E. Hogan, eight months, infant son of Mrs. Hogan, badly burned, will die; Thomas Hare, 35 years of age, face and hands burned. Three of the inmates, Mrs. Hogan with her infant and Thomas Hare jumped from the second storey of the burning house.

STOLE CATTLE.

London, Ont., Feb. 5.—F. J. Chantler, wholesale butcher of West Minister, was committed for trial on two charges, on account of receiving stolen cattle. W. A. Patterson, who was recently sentenced to three years at Kingston for stealing cattle, testified that he had been employed by Chantler to steal the cattle.

STRONG GALES AT SEA.

New York, N. Y., Feb. 5.—Steamer Blucher, which arrived here this morning reports having encountered a succession high westerly gales and very rough seas with hurricane squalls of hail and rain. One seaman was washed overboard, another fell and broke his leg, and a boy was injured.

ANOTHER COLLISION.

Winnipeg, Feb. 5.—Yesterday's express from the east was delayed owing to a collision near Rat Portage, between a freight and mixed train. Three or four foreigners in the rear coach of the mixed train were injured, but to what extent is unknown.

DESTRUCTIVE VOLCANO.

Amsterdam, Holland, Feb. 5.—Advices received here say that an entire town on the island of Java, Dutch East Indies, is reported to have been swallowed up by volcanic eruption and a hundred persons were killed.

DISASTROUS FIRE.

Buckingham, Que., Feb.—A fire broke out here at an early hour this morning, destroying several business blocks, and causing a loss aggregating one hundred thousand dollars.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Mahonay City, Feb. 5.—Six persons, all foreigners, were burned to death in a fire which destroyed six dwellings at Trenton, near here, early this morning. The fire started from an overheated stove.

DIED OF BURNS.

Halifax, Feb. 5.—The little son of G. Herbert Colwell, died this afternoon from the effects of burns, his clothing having caught fire while he was standing near a stove.

ARRESTED FOR FORGERY.

He is alleged to have forged the name of F. D. Proctor, to a fraudulent order to P. W. Ellis & Co., and on one of these orders he is said to have obtained \$475.00 worth of jewelry.

THE BURNS STATUE.

St. John Society of St. Andrew will Co-operate With Fredericton.

Last night at their quarterly meeting, says the St. John Sun, the St. Andrew's Society received a delegation from the Fredericton society of St. Andrew, consisting of O. S. Crockett, president, and L. W. Johnston and A. S. Murray. These men laid before the Scotsmen of St. John the plan adopted in Fredericton of erecting a statue of Robert Burns in that city. Mr. Crockett, the president, presented a sketch of the proposed memorial, consisting of a granite pedestal surmounted by a bronze statue of Burns, and gave a narrative of the steps taken by the Fredericton society and read the resolution passed by the members pledging themselves to raise \$2,000 towards the cost of the memorial. Mr. Crockett stated that the amount which the society had agreed to raise was already in sight, the responses to all personal appeals heretofore made being most cordial and appreciative of the object in view, and expressed the hope that the St. John society would arrange to appoint a committee to co-operate with the Scotsmen of Fredericton in carrying out a project that so strongly appealed to the national pride.

Mr. Johnston, who followed, dwelt upon the need of placing a memorial of Burns in the educational, political and judicial centre of the province as an emblem of a national poet whose poems, songs and ballads make cheerfulness and contentment, and dignity dwell in a multitude of humble homes.

After A. S. Murray had supported his associates in a few appropriate remarks, Judge Forbes moved a resolution that a committee be named to co-operate with the Fredericton society of St. Andrews in carrying out the project, so admirably conceived and carried forward by that body.

The resolution was unanimously adopted. The committee consists of Thos. A. Rankine, Judge Forbes, Dr. Inches, Jas. F. Robertson, B. R. Macaulay, Dr. MacLaren, James Jack, J. P. McIntyre and A. Gordon Leavitt.
