THE CANADIAN PRESS.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Gives His Impressions of Its Conduct and Influence at the French Journalists' Banquet.

At the recent banquet of French journalists in Canada, held at Montreal, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada, said:

"My first duty is to congratulate you upon this magnificent banquet, and to thank you for your kind invitation. In this banquet you have given a stimulus to your profession and a new evidence of the truth of that axiom which says that in union there is strength. Some years ago I was a journalist myself, but I know a better profession than that—the profession of law. Mr. Dansereau, I feel, will not appreciate such a declaration from my lips, but it is not in the power of all to be either a lawyer or a journalist. In the profession of law a practitioner is ever walking in the eyes of an opponent; the journalist is ever walking in the eyes of the public. There is no honest labor that is not dignified, and the journalist, believe me, is not less worthy than the lawyer.

"As Mr. Tarte says, the mason who does his work honestly is entitled to the highest appreciation. I am of the opinion that a man who belongs to the legal profession and does not qualify himself fully to pursue that vocation, is just as much to be condemned as would be the mason under similar circumstances. Not otherwise is it with the journalist. But it must be remembered that the journalist possesses a greater and a wider influence than any other member of society. Especially so is this in a country such as ours, possessing representative institutions. Our constitution's power is fittingly represented by the Parliament and press.

"Aesop tells of that man who, asked to provide the best thing in the world for a banquet, brought forth a tongue, and the appropriateness of the selection is not far to seek. Tongues can build reputations, diffuse happiness and create goodness. The next day, being asked to supply a second banquet, where the worst thing in the world should be represented, again there were tongues. And that also was true. Tongues can blast reputations; tongues are the mother of all difficulties, the organ of calumny. The press has not only one tongue, it has a thousand. The press can do good, but it can also work mischief.

"Happy is the journalist whose efforts are directed towards the best results. The London Times is possibly the highest exemplification of what a great journal may really do. The Times has both made and unmade Governments. Though I am not prepared to endorse all his opin-

A bright, smiling face, an accommodating manner, an apparent desire to do things pleasantly and to do them well, made him a favorite. He carried his message to Garcia, and carried it with a smile.
