## CHURCH UNION WILL COME.

Leading Representatives of  
Four Churches Declare  
Themselves

IN SUPPORT OF THE MOVEMENT.

Two strong declarations in favor of a union of the Christian churches in Canada were made at the convocation of Victoria University, Toronto, Wednesday night by Principal Caven of Knox College, Presbyterian, and T. B. Hyde, pastor of the Northern Congregational Church. Rev. Chancellor Burwash, Methodist, also endorsed the movement, while Professor William Clarke, of Trinity University stated that he was personally a supporter of union, although he recognized that there would be peculiar difficulties as regards the Anglican Church.

### Time is Ripe.

Chancellor Burwash, in an introductory address, said that for more than a quarter of a century the advisability of the union of the evangelical churches of Canada had been before his mind. Now the time was ripe, he thought, for such union. There was no doubt but that it was urgently needed, and laymen as well as ministers seemed to unite in its favor.

Rev. T. B. Hyde, in opening, spoke of the great importance of the movement. Congregationalists were deeply indebted to the great conference for its action last month in the matter. They were fully committed to the movement; in fact the Congregational Church has been urging the advisability of union for forty years. They had hitherto stood out for independence as a matter of necessity rather than of choice. In this lay their weakness as well as their strength.

the Methodists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists should be united and why they were already practically united was that their differences were not great enough to keep them apart. Another reason was its utility, the power of organization. There should be but one watchword for them, "Canada for Christ."

### Principal Caven.

Rev. Dr. Caven, who was given an enthusiastic reception, began by referring to the meeting held fifteen years ago for the purpose of promoting church union. The movement started then fell through for some reason, but it accomplished real good in encouraging a more friendly feeling among the different branches of the Christian Church. It would be greatly to be deplored if the present movement was resultless. Protestantism, though one at heart, was divided into far too many denominations. He thought it was scandalous that villages of perhaps five or six hundred people should have five or six churches. Denominational friction was sin. True, there was no more of this in Canada than in other countries, but there was a little, and it should be removed.

### Spiritual Unity.

Spiritual unity, continued Dr. Caven, was not in dispute in discussing the question of church union. The church that Christ loved and for which he gave His life was one. Why then, if spiritual oneness was complete, would it not work itself out in visible unity?

In the work of constructing a unified church there was much that required most careful consideration. The most difficult thing would be doctrine. He hinted that the churches had been covering the dogmatic ground in their standard books just a little too fully and had got too far afield in deductions. But he did not despair of seeing the wise and good men of the churches drawing up a statement of Christian doctrine which could be subscribed to by all.

### Union in the Air.

Prof. Clark, of Trinity University, was also called upon and said that no one desired more earnestly to see Christian unity than himself. He recognized that the difficulties were more considerable in the Church of England than in the other communions, but in spite of all this he recognized that church union was in the air. If they could do anything tangible they could preserve that spirit of brotherhood which reminded them that they were children of the same Father and had the same work to do.

### GRAND PICTURE.

How Togo's Last Attack on Port Arthur  
Was Frustrated

Port Arthur, May 4.—The Japanese attempt to block Port Arthur was begun a few minutes before one o'clock, when the first shots were fired, awakening the town with their thunderous noise. The gunboats lying in the mouth of the harbor joined in the cannonade, the firing gradually increased in volume, until there was a continuous crash of great guns.

Some of the enemy's torpedo boats were discovered, but they were finally swallowed up in the darkness, and the batteries and war ships after forty minutes' activity were again shrouded in gloom, though the flashing searchlights showed that the military were alive to the warning conveyed of the approach of Japanese ships.

Shortly before 2 o'clock searchlights played from the sea directly upon the entrance of the harbor, lighting it up to show the way for the fire-ships. The projector moved to the right from Liaotshan to Golden Hill. For a quarter of an hour the light was watched with curiosity, and then a second cannonade began, the heaviest fire being directed to the left of Golden Hill, where the fire-ships were located.

At about four o'clock the batteries ceased firing, save for an occasional shot. Just about dawn the bark of the rapid fire guns and the cracking of the mitrailleuse were heard from Golden Hill. Occasionally there were sounds of explosions as of mines going off. It was the enemy's ships striking on Russian torpedoes.

At this hour a magnificent sea picture was formed by the soft light of the waning moon, the orange flashes of the guns, the signal rockets, and the purple fires on the steel colored sea which were alternately lighting up and going out.

The fire-ships were ten in number, and of about 3,000 tons each.

It is reported that two Japanese torpedo boats were sunk, the remainder withdrawing in a damaged condition.

Eight of the fire ships were sunk, and very few of their crews were saved. Most of them were killed.

In the morning many dead bodies were seen floating about outside the harbor. These were collected by the Russians, who brought them ashore and buried them.

The vigilance of the men in the watch-towers and on the gunboats was astonishing. To their keen eyes was due the prompt sighting of the enemy.

The Japanese attacked brilliantly without seeming to notice the murderous fire directed on them.

The Russians captured two officers and thirty men.

It is stated that the crews of the fire-ships included a number of Japanese cadets, who showed extraordinary bravery, especially when the ships were sinking. Several of the crew stood at the mastheads firing revolvers, and then plunged into the sea. It is supposed that none of the cadets was saved.

The attempt to close the mouth of the harbor failed.

### CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS.

One to be Established at Riverside, Albert  
County—The Macdonald School  
at Kingston.

Dr. J. R. Inch, chief superintendent of education, who is in St. John, told a Telegraph reporter that the proposed consolidated school building at Riverside, Albert county, is now an assured fact.

The matter is in the hands of a temporary board of seven trustees, who will soon call for plans. The following five districts will participate in the benefits of the new institution: Albert, Riverside, Midway, Ridge and Beaver Brook, as well as portions of Harvey and Hopewell Hill. It is also probable that a consolidated school building will be erected at Beaver Brook, Charlotte county.

Speaking of the Macdonald school at Kingston, Dr. Inch said that everything would be in readiness for the opening in September. The principal of the school is now on the spot superintending the grading of the grounds, etc.

It is the policy of the department to encourage the erection of consolidated schools, and very liberal aid is given to that end. While he admitted there were some districts in which the scheme was impracticable, yet it would be found that the system would in the end tend toward cheapening education and materially increasing the salaries of teachers.

### CRUISE ACROSS ATLANTIC.

Formidable Fleet of U. S. Ships Leaving  
Pensacola for the Mediterranean.

Washington May 6.—A representative fleet of United States warships left Pensacola today for a cruise across the Atlantic and into the Mediterranean. It includes four battleships of the north Atlantic fleet, and the newly organized European squadron. The joint squadron are under the command of Rear Admiral Barker, commander-in-chief of the north Atlantic fleet. The European squadron is com-

manded by Rear Admiral Theodore F. K. Jewell.

The fleet is composed of the battleships Kearsage, Iowa, Alabama and Maine, and the cruisers Olympia, Cleveland and Baltimore. The itinerary of the cruise is left to the discretion of Admiral Barker, and the tentative plan contemplates proceeding from Pensacola to Guantanamo, thence across the Atlantic.

Secretary Moody and his congressional party are now on their way to Guantanamo on the dispatch boat Dolphin, and they may await the arrival there of the joint squadrons.

From Guantanamo the fleet will proceed direct to the Azores, thence to Lisbon. Visits will be made at Villefranche, France, and Trieste, Austria, and perhaps as far as Piræus, the port of Athens, Greece. At the conclusion of the cruise, which will probably occupy two months, the battleship squadron will return to the Atlantic station, while the cruiser squadron will visit English and German ports.

The departure of these vessels will preclude the navy from participation in the proposed manoeuvres of the army on the Atlantic coast this summer.

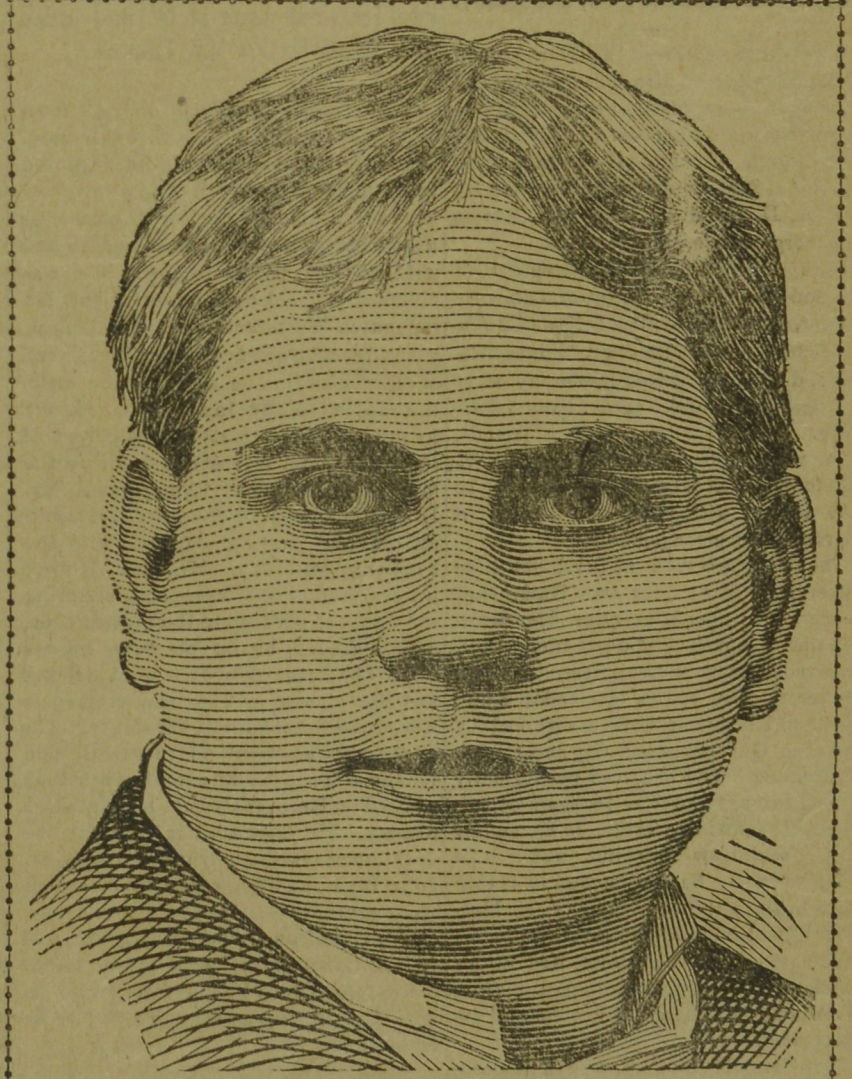
