Read Interesting Paper on Cecil Rhodes,

BEFORE MEETING OF THE ROYAL COLONIAL INSTITUTE.

The Late South African Statesman Eulogized, and His Life Work Described.

At a meeting of the Royal Colonial Institute in London, on November 8th, with the Right Hon. Earl Grey in the chair, Dr. G. R. Parkin, C. M. G., read an interesting paper upon the Rhodes Scholarships.

With a prefatory comment upon the idealism and liberality of this scholarship scheme, the greatest ever devised, Dr. Parkin proceeded to a consideration of its results, eulogizing the imperial-minded man, to whom the Empire was indebted for it. Mr. Rhodes' individual greatness could only be comprehended by a study of his splendid achievements in South Africa.

First there was Rhodesia, commanding through its central position, the whole of South Africa and brought under the British flag by Rhodes' initiative, when the government shrank from the task. Then his wide plans for the development of agricultural Africa, well devised and richly endowed, his advancement of the "Cape to Cairo" route, his industrial organization of Kimberley. Finally there was the bequest of his entire accumulated wealth to found these scholarships and so carry out plans made in his earliest years. They were not mere monuments to himself, Dr. Parkin said, constructed as an after-thought by a man who did not know what to do with his vast wealth. "Admitting the grievous mistake into which Cecil Rhodes fell at one point of his career, his friends may claim that seldom or never has so noble an atonement been made for individual error. I know of nothing parallel to it in our history."

Opportunity of Oxford.

Whether or not Oxford saw at first the widening of opportunity for herself in this scheme is doubtful. A nervous tremor certainly ran through the common rooms of the University at the first announcement. The fact of two hundred young men being drawn to her from the ends of the earth, from field and prairie and Australian bush, brought visions rather trying to the imagination of scholars. But the feeling was temporary and limited. The points of difference of standard in the colleges represented in the scholarships presented a difficulty at first that was soon settled by careful arrangement. Other difficulties arose in the new standards, by which Mr. Rhodes desired the scholars to be selected. But in working out the plan, the trustees have aimed to secure the best advice in every community represented. The have come in touch with every educational man of weight in the British colonies and the United States.

Politics and denominationalism were found to be the chief stumbling block to impartiality, but Dr. Parkin was able to make one appeal to all who worked with him. In a materialistic age a man of great wealth had bequeathed his money for the higher purposes of life. Educational men so challenged were bound to make the bequest a success; to fall short of this would be to discourage giving on a large scale for a long time.

This scholarship scheme is recognized in every part of the colonies visited by Dr. Parkin as a mighty binding force within the Empire. It may be twenty

At noon not more than 400 delegates had arrived and the secretaries state that the attendance was not over 600.

The Liberal delegates paid their own fares and hotel expenses. The Conservatives are, it is said, travelling largely on passes.

FUTURE OF CANADA.

Anxiety Roused in Certain English Quarters.

ALL BASED ON NEW YORK DISPATCHES ABOUT RECIPROCITY WITH UNITED STATES.

Possibility of Closer Relations.

London, Nov. 25.—Despatches received in London from the United States since the presidential election have aroused considerable anxiety in some quarters with reference to the future relations of Canada and the mother country. It looks to many English statesmen as though there was serious danger of closer commercial relations between Canada and the United States of America, which would result immediately in great detriment to England's foreign trade and eventually perhaps in dissolution of the political ties that unite England and her American colony. It is realized that commercial reciprocity between the United States and Canada may be very far off, but about every press despatch from New York that touches the question represents the movement in that direction as extremely vigorous and speaks of the advocates of the scheme as decidedly hopeful of success. The understanding here is that the attitude of the United States of America toward the movement is likely to be determined by a comparison of the strength which President Roosevelt can command in the United States Senate with the strength of the ultra-Chinese wall protectionists.

There has been little public discussion on the subject in this country, but looking at the matter from a purely selfish viewpoint, Englishmen hope that out and out protectionists may be able to resist the demands of the reciprocity advocates. It is possible that one effect of the agitation in the United States of America may be to scare the Britishers who now oppose Mr. Chamberlain's tariff schemes into the support of them. Certainly the English people would regard the establishment of anything severing the commercial union between the two American countries as no direct menace to the British Empire. A mild form of reciprocity between the countries would not in itself so alarm England as to suggest that dismemberment of the empire had begun, but it is felt here that American reciprocity advocates do not mean to stop at mild reciprocity, but to get as near from trade as possible and free trade between the United States of America and Canada or anything approximating it, wise Englishmen think, would head up to relations between those countries that could not exist while Canada continued a part of the British Empire.

was filled this morning with the expectant class of Eugene Howard Babbitt, an instructor in German, who hates cats.

Just then the Maltese escaped into the classroom, and the result was a melee in which students piled one another up on desks in their wild pursuit. BRINGS \$15,000.

Major Delmar, Famous Horse, Sold at Big Figure.

New York, Nov. 25.—Major Delmar, the world's champion trotting gelding, with an unpaced trotting record of 2,014, and a paced trotting record of 1,594, was sold at the Old Glory sale at the Madison Square Garden today for \$15,000. The purchaser was C. K. G. Billings, owner of Lou Dillon. It was announced that Mr. Billings would race Major Delmar and Lou Dillon in an effort to break the world's record.

Major Delmar was consigned by E. E. Smathers, who bought him last year for \$40,000.

The record price thus far at the sale was paid for Sadie Mac, another of E. E. Smathers string, who was bought by Miss flate L. Wilks of Galt, Ont., for \$15,500. Miss Wilks is the owner of Ore Wilkes and of several horses that won blue ribbons at the horse show last week.

Prince Albert, the world's champion pacing gelding, with a racing record of 1,594, and a record of 1,57 with a wind shield, was sold to Edward Mitchell of New York for \$2,000. He was consigned by James Hanley of Providence, R. I.

Grace Bond, the champion 3-year-old trotter of 1904, consigned by James Y. Gathcomb, was sold to Alonzo G. Maynard of New York for \$13,000.

Among the other horses sold were: King Enoch, trotter, b. m., four years old, consigned by Lookout Farm, South Natick, Mass. Sold to C. C. Abbott, Keene, N. H., \$1,350. Melton, trotter, b. h., 6 years old, consigned by Lookout Farm, sold to Alonzo McDonald, Port Henry, N. Y., price \$1,275.

Brutality in an Asylum.

Chicago, Nov. 25.—Samuel P. Glosser, a patient in the County Insane Asylum at Dunning, was choked to death last night, and tomorrow the coroner will endeavor to ascertain whether he was killed by Alexander Harper, a colored patient, or by John Conway and Scott Hogan, two attendants.

Hogan and Conway asserted that Glosser was violent, and that Harper assisted them in placing him under restraint, and Harper declares that both the attendants killed Glosser and that Hogan choked him.

The trouble started with a fight between Glosser and Harper, in which the former was the aggressor. He was finally strapped to his bed by the attendants and Harper, but, working loose from the straps that held him, he again attacked Harper.

The two attendants came to the assistance of Harper, and a desperate struggle ensued. Glosser soon became unconscious, and one of the physicians was called, who pronounced Glosser dead. His windpipe had been broken in the severe choking he had received, and his body was terribly bruised, there being many marks of boot-heels in the flesh. Glosser formerly lived in Trinidad, Col.
