

WAR SITUATION.

Japs Want to Capture Port Arthur

BEFORE RUSSIA'S BALTIC FLEET ARRIVES.

A Japanese Repulse.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Mukden, Nov. 26.—The Japanese on Nov. 25, made a desperate attack on Lone Tree Hill, but were repulsed with heavy loss.

Other encounters are reported, but they were slight.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 26.—There is an entire lack of news from the front. The report that the Japanese are concentrating their energies for a desperate assault on Port Arthur, in view of the approach of the Baltic squadron, is quite generally credited in official quarters. Such a move has been expected to transpire as soon as the Japanese learned that the squadron's trip was an actual fact and no mere demonstration. The authorities are prepared to hear terrible reports of the projected assault. While not hazarding a guess whether the fortress can be carried if the besiegers are utterly regardless of human life, they are confident that General Stoessel will be able to make the attack one of the costliest operations in history.

Suez, Nov. 25.—Two Russian battle ships, three cruisers, seven torpedo boat destroyers and nine transports from Port Said have arrived safely at the Bitter Lakes, in the canal, where they anchored for the night.

Under instructions the destroyers left the remainder of the squadron and came on to Suez, where they anchored, preceding the transports, which will come through under electric lights, arriving here at 2 p. m.

While the destroyers were passing through the canals men were stationed at their guns and torpedo tubes. The cruisers and battleships will leave the Bitter Lake at daylight.

While the warships were traversing the canals both banks were strongly patrolled by Egyptian soldiers and coast guards.

The Russian admiral's intention is said to be to go to Diego Suarez, Bay of Madagascar.
