Today's Market.

There was a large number of country teams in the market today, due no doubt to the good sledding which is reported excellent in all the surrounding districts. Although the number of teams was large there was not much of a variety in the way of produce. Masts were the principal article offered for sale. Beef brought four and five cents, pork five and six cents, and by the quarter six and seven cents. Geese sold at 75¢ to \$1, while some very nice chickens went at 50 to 60¢; other market prices were about as follows: butter 18 to 20¢ per pound, eggs per dozen 30 cents, potatoes per bbl. \$1, turnips 50¢, apples \$1.50.

Canadian Schooner Seized.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 26.—A private cable from Montevideo announces that the sealing schooner Agnes G. Donohoe, of this city, has been seized by the Uruguayan authorities. The Donohoe is a new vessel, built at Lunenburg for the Balcombe Company, and she left here last year. She is commanded by Captain Matthew Ryan. There are several Halifax men on board. The last letter received from those on board the Donohoe was at Port Stanley about Sept. 10, on which date she was leaving for the sealing grounds. The sealing season closes the last of January. The agents have wired for particulars of the seizure.

Death at Lakeville Corner.

The death took place last evening at Lakeville Corner of G. Herbert Briggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Briggs, in the second year of his age. He had been ill with congestion of the brain for about two weeks. Mr. Briggs is a brother of Mrs. C. W. Weddall of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Briggs are receiving much sympathy on the death of their little boy. The funeral will take place Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. After services by Rev. Harry Harrison the remains will be interred at Lakeville Corner. R. B. Adams is looking after the undertaking arrangements.

Fire Whistle Tested.

The new fire whistle to be erected on the Electric Light Station was tested at two o'clock this afternoon and gave perfect satisfaction. Parties were stationed at different parts of the city, and could easily hear the whistle. The whistle was tested twice, the first time at a 60 pound pressure and the second time at a ninety-five pound test. The whistle will be placed in permanent position next week.
