

JAP VICTORY.

Stormed and Captured Town of Kin Chou.

THEIR FORCES SAID TO BE WITHIN TEN MILES OF PORT ARTHUR.

Chee Foo Resourceful in Starting Rumors.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London, May 26.—A despatch to the Central News from Tokio, says the Japanese have stormed and captured the town of Kin Chou, about 32 miles north of Port Arthur.

Che Foo, May 26.—A Junk which left Dalny on the night of the 23rd and which arrived here today, reports that the Japanese army had reached Sansuripo, which is north of Nan Galien.

Russians offered stubborn resistance to the advance of the Japanese and a battle was fought at noon on the 22nd, the result of which was not known.

From the best information obtainable it is learned that the Japanese have landed near Kin Chou, and are advancing to Port Arthur.

There is a rumor current among the Chinese that the Japanese are now within ten miles of Port Arthur.

This Mornings Despatches.

Che Foo, May 26.—A portion of the Japanese fleet bombarded Port Arthur at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. The attack was witnessed by a Frenchman, who left Dalny on the night of the 22nd, arriving here last night. He says that eight large warships circled before the entrance to Port Arthur harbor for one hour, firing broadsides at intervals of ten minutes.

Up to the time this Frenchman left Dalny everything was quiet there but an attack on the part of the Japanese was expected hourly. The military and civil officials of Dalny were ready to leave. Only a few civilians remain there.

St. Petersburg, May 26.—Emperor Nicholas today received the following telegram from Gen. Kuropatkin, dated May 24:

"There has been no change in the general situation in the direction of Feng Wang Cheng or the Gulf of Liao Tung with regard to the position of the enemy. It is established that forty thousand Japanese troops have concentrated at Feng Wang Cheng and that there are four lines regiments and 50 guns at Pian Min.

London, May 26.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Shimoneseki Japan, under date of May 25, says that only minor operations are now proceeding on the peninsula of Lia Tung and that the main attack will probably be postponed some time. At present the dispositions of the Japanese on peninsula seem to be as follows:

The first, third and fourth divisions of the second army have already been landed and the fifth and eleventh divisions are now on the way. The third army will consist of the ninth and thirteenth divisions and one brigade of artillery, but these have not yet left Japan.

DREW THEIR KNIVES.

Italians Made Serious Assault at Peterboro.

Peterboro, Ont., May 26.—While a party of half a dozen Italians were passing along George Street, Tuesday night, a young man exploded a squib among them.

The Italians undertook to chastize the young man, and others interfered and the Italians drew knives.

Two persons were somewhat seriously stabbed. Three arrests were made by the police and the prisoners yesterday were remanded.

DIABOLICAL ACT.

Fiends Disfigured Young Man by Throwing Vitrol in His Face.

Toronto, May 26.—Frank Harris, a young man employed as a salesman by Gordon McKay & Co., Ltd., was attacked on Sunday night by

three men, one of whom threw vitrol in his face.

The left side of Harris' face is badly burned, and the young man may be disfigured for life.

Harris does not know the men who assaulted him, and so far no clue to their identity has been found.

FISHERMEN LOST.

Had Left Their Dory to Attend Their Trawls When Befogged

North Sydney, N. S., May 26.—Having left in their dory on Monday evening to attend their trawls, two French fishermen of the schooner, Cousins Reims, lost their way in the dense fog which sprang up, and were unable to find their vessel. Having rowed all night in a vain effort to find the missing schooner, they decided to wait till the fog lifted, but when it did so not a sign of a sail was to be seen.

All day Tuesday they remained without a drop of water, and only a few biscuits in the dory. On Wednesday a gale sprang up, and the danger of a death by drowning was added to the chance of dying of hunger. Wednesday evening the men, overwhelmed with cold, hunger and thirst lay down to wait their death.

Thursday morning, when they had been adrift for four days, help came in the shape of the schooner, St. Martin, Capt. Peirier. The men being unable to stand were tenderly carried aboard, and realizing their condition, Capt. Poirier ran for this port, where the men were landed and are receiving every attention.

LAST SAD RITES.

Business Practically Suspended at St. John to Pay Tribute to Memory of Dead Citizens.

St. John, May 26.—The funeral of the late John H. Thompson took place this afternoon with services at the house at 3.15, and afterwards at St. Andrew's church, and was one of the largest ever seen in St. John.

Business was practically suspended. The Thistle curling club, Union club, St. Andrew's society and Longshoremens' association walked in a body, interment was at Fernhill.

The funeral of Robert P. Foster took place at 2.30, from No. 12 Germain, to Trinity church where impressive services were held. Interment was at Fernhill.

There was also a large concourse of people to pay the last tribute of respect to the late Mr. Foster, among them several Frederictonians, including Mr. W. E. Smith, Mr. G. Y. Dibblee and Mr. J. A. Winslow.

FATAL EXPLOSION.

Twelve Persons Killed and Eighteen Injured on American Steamer.

Louisville, Ky., May 26.—Twelve persons were killed and eighteen injured by an explosion this morning on the steamer Fred Wilson, plying between Pittsburg and Louisville.

The disaster occurred two miles below the city.

The dead are all from Pittsburg and Middle Port, Ohio, and include Captain Braddeck.

DIED AT MONTREAL.

Moncton Lady Succumbed to Results of an Operation.

Moncton, May 26.—Word was received here this morning of the death at Montreal of Mrs. J. H. Thompson wife of I. C. R. Brakeman Thompson, who underwent an operation at Victoria Hospital.

Deceased who was forty years old leaves two children. The body will be taken to Sackville for interment.

HEAVILY FINED.

Moncton, May 26.—This morning the policy shop keepers who did business under the name of the Argenteuil Granite Co., were sentenced to fines ranging from \$200 to \$10.

Casimer Beaudry, the organizer, was fined \$200; Telesphore Belair, manager, \$100, and six keepers \$50 each. Several other keepers got off with smaller fines.
