CITY SCHOOL BOARD.

Regular Monthly Meeting of the Trustees Yesterday.

The regular monthly meeting of the school board was held yesterday afternoon with Mr. Jas. T. Sharkey in the chair. The usual routine business was transacted and the trustees considered an application from the teachers to be allowed to hold school on Saturday of this week, in lieu of the closing day of the term, which falls on Monday, June 25th. It was decided not to grant the application, but it is quite possible that

an arrangement will be made whereby the public closing exercises will be held on the last Saturday in June instead of on the Monday following.

It was proposed to make some changes in the system of grading, but this was not favored by a majority of the trustees.

MR. STAVERT AT HOME.

Stood Journey Well but Will be Some Time Recovering.

E. P. Stavert, the sole survivor of the Oromocto Lake tragedy was taken to St. John on the late train last night under the care of Dr. T. D. Walker, who had gone up to the lake on Tuesday morning and had remained with the unfortunate man during the rest of the time.

Dr. Walker said last night that he did not feel like leaving Mr. Stavert in his serious condition, and as the latter was very anxious to come, he decided to run the risk of bringing him to the city. On the arrival of the train Mr. Stavert was taken to his brother's house on Mount Pleasant, where he was soon resting easily, having stood the journey well. He is still very weak and nervous, but Dr. Walker thinks that his prospects for recovery are bright. He has picked up wonderfully during the past two days, and his total recovery is a matter of only a few weeks.

Victoria Day at Gagetown.

Gagetown, May 25.—A large excursion of people accompanied by a band came here yesterday from St. John whose presence in the village gave it quite a lively appearance. The band played several good selections on the main street during the afternoon which were highly appreciated by the people of the town. Quite a few summer boarders are already here, several of whom are at Mrs. Simpson's whose home is as attractive and well kept as ever. Mrs. Simpson herself is at present quite ill, but her accomplished help leave nothing to be desired in the accommodation to be had at her house.

Mr. J. A. Mowat Ordained.

Montreal Herald.—Mr. J. A. Mowat, son of the Rev. Dr. A. J. Mowat, was Sunday night ordained a minister of the Presbyterian church. The service took place in the presence of the Presbytery at Erskine church. The ordination service was preached by Rev. Dr. Mowat, who dealt with the urgent need for the preaching of Christ's message among the heathen nations of the world. [Mr. Mowat, who leaves shortly for the mission field in Honan, China, is a native of Fredericton, born here when his father was pastor of St. Paul's church.]

No Action Taken.

A special meeting of the Board of Health, called to deal with the analytical report on the Fredericton water supply, lately published, in the papers was held yesterday afternoon. After a brief discussion it was agreed to adjourn until Friday evening at eight o'clock, and in the meantime extend an invitation to the citizens' committee who procured the report on the water, to attend the meeting. It is not improbable that the Board of Health may determine to have a second analysis made.

Painful Accident.

A young man named George Mounts was struck in the stomach by a piece of board while working about a planer in Risteen's factory this morning, and received a very painful injury. He was removed to the Victoria Hospital, where medical aid was rendered. It is impossible as yet to ascertain the extent of his injuries, but the doctor has hopes that they are not of a serious nature.

Passed Away Yesterday After a Brief Illness.

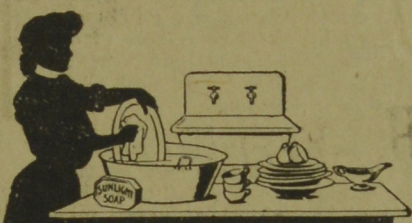
