KING'S DAUGHTERS' CONCERT.

Attended by a Large and Good Natured Audience.

The concert at the opera house last evening, in aid of the King's Daughters, was attended by a large and representative audience, nearly every seat being taken. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was present in the capacity of patron, and was given a very cordial reception by the audience. The program consisted of vocal solos by Misses Nan Thompson and Chandler, violin solos and comic society sketches by Lieut. Du Domaine, piano solos by Miss Beatrice Fenety and selections by the band of the R. C. R. It is needless to say that all acquitted themselves well and the audience was kept in the best of good humor throughout.

Much to the regret of all, Mrs. Black, Mr. Ley and Miss Riley, who had places on the program, were prevented from taking part on account of illness.

The concert was under the able management of the gallant Lieut. Du Domaine, who made a decided hit as a violinist, comedian and all round entertainer.

The Students' Case.

Two witnesses for the defence were examined by Col. Marsh at the police court this morning in the case against the University students. They were Gordon, Warman and Royal Mowatt, both pupils of the Normal school. Their evidence was to the effect that the U. N. B. students who visited the Normal school, had not behaved in a disorderly manner as alleged, but had conducted themselves the same as ordinary visitors usually do, and had not disturbed the exercises of the school in the least. The case is being continued this afternoon. Mr. H. F. McLeod, counsel for the defense, expects to get through with his witnesses tomorrow.

Big Game Plentiful.

Mr. William Griffin, the well known guide of Green Hill, was among the visitors to the city yesterday. Mr. Griffin has lately returned from a visit to his sporting camps at McKeill Lake, Taxis River and Hayden Brook, and reports having seen a great many moose, caribou and deer. He says that notwithstanding the great depth of snow the animals seem to be wintering well, and as far as he knows there has been no illegal hunting in the Stanley region. Mr. Griffin thinks that the people are gradually becoming educated to the fact that the moose are too valuable an asset to the province to be ruthlessly slaughtered out of season.

The Late Mrs. Waycott.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Richard Waycott took place at three o'clock this afternoon from the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. W. B. Cuthard, Waterloo Row, and was largely attended. An impressive service was conducted at the house by Rev. Dean Partridge, members of the Methodist choir singing appropriate hymns. Interment was made in the Rural cemetery. The chief mourners were: F. H. Waycott, Albert Waycott, W. B. Cuthard and Richard Waycott. Undertaker George W. Adams was funeral director.

The Opera House.

The city hall committee of the city council held a meeting last evening and dealt with the proposition of Mr. W. T. H. Eenety in regard to leasing the opera house for \$800 per annum. The matter was fully discussed and the committee arrived at the conclusion that it would not be in the public interest to grant a lease on the terms stated, and will so report to the city council. The chairman, A. D. Scott, was authorized to order a car load of coal for the city hall.

It is likely some more games in the married vs. single competition will be played this evening. There are still six rinks on each side to play, and the single men so far are seven points ahead.
