

MAY BE TROUBLE

Italians Expected to Make Disturbance

AT ONTARIO MINING CAMP

Militia Ready to Quell Any Demonstration.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Jan. 15.—The Sudbury militiamen are in readiness to turn out to quell a riot among Italian laborers at Copper Cliff, where trouble is expected tomorrow, and 500 rounds of ammunition has been shipped thither.

A few days ago a dozen or more Italians were arrested in connection with the disturbance following a reduction in wages. They will be tried tomorrow when it is thought they will make a demonstration. Italians have bought up all the fire arms and knives in the neighborhood, vowing vengeance.

A company of the 97th regiment is also ready to go to Copper Cliff from here if necessary.

SERIOUS CONFLICT.

Between French Government and Pope Over Appointment of Bishops.

Rome, Jan. 15.—The French government has presented the Vatican with a note in the nature of an ultimatum regarding the appointment of bishops to the five vacant French sees, substantially saying that either the Pope must approve of the selections of the French government or they will be officially announced without the approbation of the Holy See.

In addition the Papal nuncio will be asked to leave Paris and the clergy be forbidden to collect Peter's Pence in churches, but the concordat will not yet be denounced.

The rumor that the Pope has decided to approve of the appointments is incorrect. The Vatican hopes to be able to continue negotiations.

BOISTEROUS PASSAGE.

St. John, Jan. 15.—The Steamer Orinoco arrived this morning from the West Indies. The passage from Bermuda was very stormy, continuous heavy gales with high seas being encountered. Partridge Island was made last night but the weather was quite thick and the steamer ran off again until this morning when she came into port. She only brought two passengers.

WHEAT FOR JAPAN.
