

THE MILITIA BILL.

Subject of Hot Debate
in Parliament.SIR FREDERICK BORDEN
EXPOSED TORY
HYPOCRISY.Canada's Loyalty Does not
Need to be Advertised.

Ottawa, Aug. 2.—The militia bill was taken up in committee of the House yesterday afternoon.

Sir Frederick Borden moved to insert a clause which was taken verbatim from the British act and was as follows:

"Whenever the governor-in-council places the militia or any part thereof on active service anywhere in Canada or beyond Canada for defence thereof, if parliament be then separated by such adjournment or prorogation as will not expire within ten days a proclamation shall be issued for a meeting of parliament within 15 days and parliament shall accordingly meet and sit on the day appointed by such proclamation, and shall continue to sit and act in like manner as if it had been adjourned or prorogued to (the same day.)"

Mr. MacLean (East York) objected to the words "for the defence thereof." He wanted the clause framed so that the government could send the militia to South Africa without consulting parliament. The people had confidence in the government.

Mr. Heyd asked if Mr. MacLean wanted the government to have power to send Canadian volunteers to South Africa.

Mr. MacLean said that he did. The British government would send its army, and navy to the defence of Canada.

Mr. Heyd—But the British government could not send the militia outside of Britain. They volunteered.

Mr. MacLean said that Canada was either a part of the British Empire or it was not. He was a Canadian and nothing but a Canadian. He was a nationalist and nothing but a nationalist and as such he was a believer in strengthening the imperial ties.

Mr. Fitzpatrick pointed out that Mr. MacLean wanted to give powers to the government he refused to give to the people and parliament. The clause provided for the calling of parliament within 15 days. The empire was not going to go to smash in 15 days.

Mr. Gourley (Colchester) wanted the bill amended so that the government could send the militia outside of Canada for the defence of any part of the empire.

Dr. Sproule favored this view. Sir F. W. Borden did not see any necessity for the people of Canada to advertise their loyalty by putting it in the statute book. The people knew full well what the loyalty of Canada is and what it means. It suited some parties at times to talk of loyalty.

Sir Frederick Borden said that there would be no misunderstanding upon this point within the empire. The amendment was exactly the same as that of Australia and the other colonies, and the amendment had also been approved by the imperial defence committee, and the imperial authorities.

Mr. Barker (Hamilton) said that it was not fair that the government could not call out the militia for the defence of Newfoundland. He referred to the sending of the contingents to South Africa, and said that Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues were kicked into sending them. He saw that the member for Montmagny (Lavergne) laughed. He noticed that he always laughed when reference was made to a British subject.

Mr. Lavergne (Montmagny) said that he was just as proud of being a British subject as Mr. Barker was, and he would just remind the member for Hamilton that if this country was preserved to Britain it was because of the stand taken by French-Canadians.

Sir Frederick Borden could not see what good object such a speech as Mr. Barker's would serve. He (Borden) objected to Mr. Barker sneering at the prime minister.

Mr. Barker denied sneering at the premier.

After some further discussion the clause was held over at the suggestion of Mr. Fielding, who pointed out that there was really very little difference between all parties.

FOUND A TOOTH IN CHILD'S NOSE.

A Molar of Babyhood in Hiding for Six Years.

The Chinook.

The Chinook is one of the peculiarities and one of the blessings of Western Assiniboia and Southern Alberta. It affects the broad belt of territory contiguous to the foothills of the Rocky Mountains, blowing down the slopes as genial breezes in the winter time, and in summer tempering the heat as currents of cool and moisture-laden air. The winter climate of these Provinces is very like that of Colorado, a season of bright, cloudless days, infrequent and scanty snowfalls, and frequent and prolonged breaks of warm weather, heralded by the Chinook wind. No doubt the Japan current, which in British Columbia plays the part of the gulf stream in northwestern Europe, contributes to temper these regions.

The Chinook is so called because it blows from the quarter where lies the land once inhabited by the Chinook Indians, on the banks of the lower Columbia River.

When Lord Minto Was Pressed.

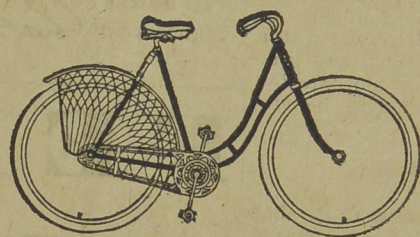

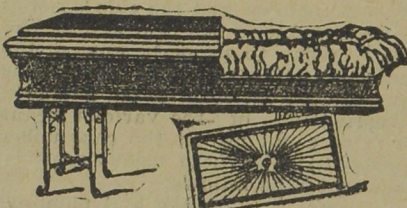
