DOMINION BICYCLE MEET.

C. W. A. Championship Races at the Driving Park.

RIDERS FROM ALL CANADA BATTLE FOR SUPREMACY.

McNeill of Charlottetown Carries off the Honors.

FREDERICTON BOYS SHOW UP WELL IN ATHLETIC EVENTS.

About eight hundred people witnessed the C. W. A. Dominion Championship bicycle races at the Driving Park on the afternoon of Dominion Day and thoroughly enjoyed the sport. It was the best race meeting ever held in the Maritime Provinces and no doubt the attendance would have been much larger had the weather been fine instead of cloudy and threatening. The track was in splendid condition and the different events were pulled off without any of those long waits which are so annoying to the spectators.

J. A. McNeill, a Charlottetown man who has been living in Boston for the past year, was the crack-a-jack of the afternoon winning five firsts and one second. William Morton of Toronto, and the McCarthy brothers of Stratford, Ont., made things lively for him all the way through but the company seemed to be a trifle fast for other Maritime Province men and they did not cover themselves with glory.

There were in all thirty entries for the bicycle races and field sports, no less than half of them being from Fredericton. St. John did not have a single competitor in the bicycle races and only two men from that city entered in the athletic sports. St. Stephen was represented by three men, only two of whom took part in the races. In the Victoria day sports at St. Stephen, this city had fourteen entries, and the men from the border town promised to more than even matters on Dominion day, but failed to make good their promise. Probably our boys will not be so keen to make a success of sports at St. Stephen on future occasions.

There were in all fifteen events yesterday, and the competition was keen, though in some of the bicycle races there was altogether too much loading and holding back for some fellow to set the pace. It is that sort of thing that accounts for bicycle racing being less popular as a sport than it should be, but riders, both big and little, will persist in doing it. In most of the events yesterday the racing was all done on the home stretch, and the spectators would probably have been almost as well satisfied had the start been made from the quarter pole. For instance in the championship event the winner's time was 3.20 4-5. Why a horse that could not make a better showing than that on a track would not be considered eligible for a farmer's race; yet the bicyclist who did the mile in that time now holds the championship of all Canada.

In Detail.

The races were called at 2.15 o'clock the first event being the mile novice which had four starters, viz.: H. M. Cochran of Bloomfield, G. T. Gorman of Fredericton, Alex. Reid of St. Stephen and George Colwell of Fredericton. It was claimed that McCarthy had previously won prizes, and was therefore not eligible as a novice. He started in the race under protest, though that did not prevent him from winning first place in 2.59 1/2. Colwell finished second and Reid third.

The 100 yards dash only had three competitors, all Fredericton boys, and was won handily by Thomas Murray in 10 1/2

seconds. Finnemore finished second and Tom Rutter third.

The starters in the first heat of the half mile championship were B. T. Smith of Windsor, N. S.; F. R. McCarthy of Stratford, W. S. Davidson of Moncton, and Chas. Ryder of St. Stephen. The last named made a very pretty spurt on the home stretch and won the heat with McCarthy second, and Davidson third. The time was 1.09 1/2.

In the second heat the starters were C. P. McKinnon, S. L. C. Coleman and E. Inch of this city, W. E. McCarthy of Stratford, W. Morton, and J. A. McNeill of Charlottetown. Morton passed under the wire first, closely followed by McNeill and Inch got third place.

The final heat was run off by the three leaders in the first and second heats and proved very exciting. The men moved rather slowly at first, but spurred up on entering the home stretch and it was nip and tuck between Morton and McNeill right up to the last. Morton won out with a lead of two feet over McNeill and W. E. McCarthy finished third. The time was 1.16 1/2.

The quarter mile run, which was not of a very exciting nature, was won easily by Finnemore in 54 1/2 seconds, with de Olloqui of St. John second and Rutter third.

The running broad jump was won by J. L. S. DesBrisay of St. John, who cleared 22 feet, 1 inch, a remarkably good showing. George Wandlars of this city, was second, coming within about four feet of the winner's best effort.

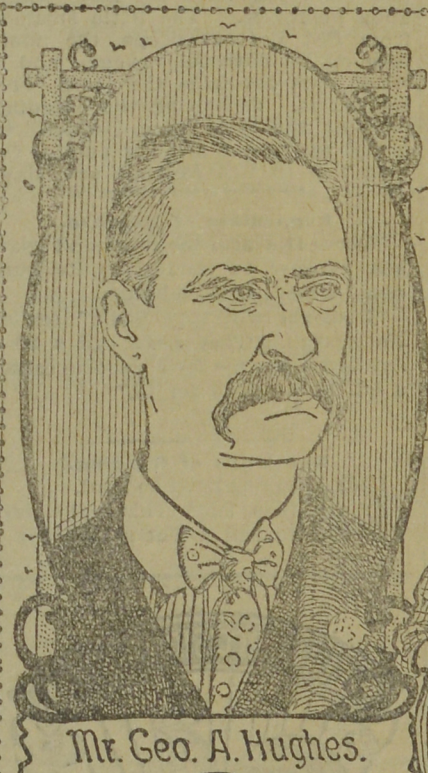

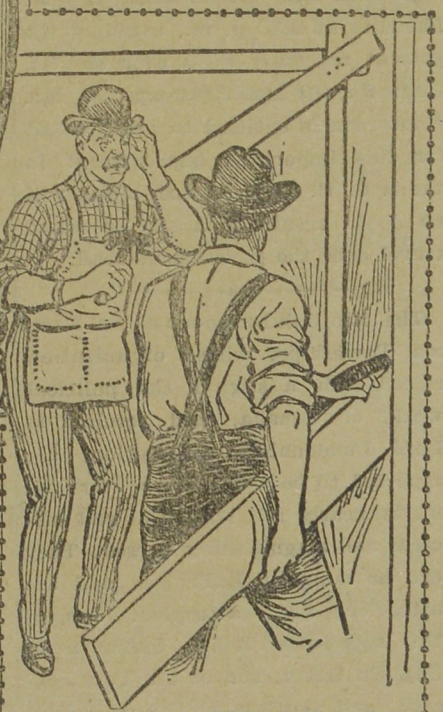
