

BEATEN AGAIN.

Reported Severe Battle in which Russians Were Defeated.

AND COMPELLED TO RETREAT FURTHER NORTH

Japs Dragged Their Guns up Almost Unsurmountable Heights.

RUSSIAN LAND FORCES ABANDONING PORT ARTHUR.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Shankai Kwan, May, 10.—It is reported that the first Japanese army corps, having followed the Russians retreating from the Yalu River, overtook them twenty miles south of Liao Yang yesterday, and a severe engagement ensued.

The Japanese dragged their guns up hills believed to be unsurmountable. And the Russians thereupon continued to retreat north.

A division of the first corps is approaching New Chawng which is now garrisoned by a handful of Russians.

Japanese scouts have been seen six miles from New Chawng. Nineteen women were the last civilians to leave New Chawng for Shanghai Wan. They arrived here today and confirmed the reports of the evacuation of New Chawng.

London, May, 10.—Despatch from Odessa says the Russian admiralty has definitely abandoned its intention of sending a fleet to the far east.

St. Petersburg, May 10.—A despatch from Mukden, dated today, denies the report that the Japanese have captured Dalny.

A report from Mukden that the railroad between Port Arthur and Liao Yang has been repaired and is working, is not given credit here.

It is known that General Kuropatkin is withdrawing his advance posts along Manchurian Littorat to Liao Yang.

The Russian garrison still remains at New Chwang, but the abandonment of that place is only considered to be a question of days.

The Army organ assumes that the Russians are retreating on Liao Yang, leaving temporarily the defense of Port Arthur to the naval squadrons' garrison.

The organ also assumed that the Japanese have already landed at Takushan, thus assuring a junction between Gen. Kuroki's army and the Japanese forces on the Peninsula. It commends the retirement from Feng Wang Chen which is considered of no strategical importance.

Squadron Gut Off.

London, May 10.—The Daily Telegraph's Seoul correspondent says: "It is believed here that a portion of the Russian Vladivostok fleet has been successfully shut out and is now in the Sea of Japan trying to evade the Japanese."

The Daily Telegraph's Tokio correspondent, telegraphing under date of May 9, says:

"The Japanese have requested the United States government to inquire into the fate of forty men who were missing after the blocking of Port Arthur. It is believed that several of them were captured."

"It is reiterated that the Japanese have occupied Dalny."

"I learn from trustworthy sources that the Russians in the battle of the Yalu lost over forty guns, enormous quantities of war material, horses, carts, ammunition and equipment."

London, May 10.—The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says that 15,000 Russians are retreating from Newchwang to Liao Yang.

The correspondent also says that Chinese bandits have destroyed the

road to Tashi Chia and to Hai Cheng.

(Tashi Chia is the junction of the new branch of the Port Arthur-Mukden and Hai Cheng is further north on the main line).

The Russians are making a new road.

The correspondent adds that bandits have attacked and cut other parts of the railway and points out that the capture of Dalny will enable the Japanese to cut off Port Arthur's electric supply.

General Retreat Ordered.

Paris, May 10.—The correspondent at St. Petersburg of the Echo ve Paris telegraphs as follows:

"General Kuropatkin has ordered a general retreat, and no doubt intends to avoid a battle until he has sufficient forces. He actually has at his disposal not more than 150,000 men, exclusive of the garrison at Port Arthur, which consists of 30,000 men and the garrison of Newchwang, of 15,000 men."

"A general who knows the facts of the mobilization tells me the last one thousand men making up the required 500,000 will leave Kasan July 21, adding, 'We will be very sick if the railway is not working well. It is not likely that General Kuropatkin will fatigue his troops unnecessarily. If the Japanese press him he will retire from Liao Yang to Mukden or even Harbin. Retreat certainly is painful, but it now is indispensable.'"

Despatches from Shanghai say that the Tartar general at Mukden has declined to obey Viceroy Alexieff's orders that the Chinese evacuate Mukden.

A CANADIAN WONDER.

Monster Mastodon Will be Exhibited at St. Louis.

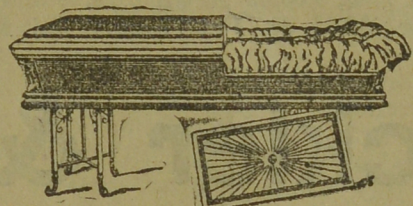
