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DEATH OF MAD MACK.

The Passing of an Eccentric Resident of Paris.

AN ENGLISHMAN WHOSE MIND WAS AFFECTED BY FLIGHT OF HIS BRIDE WITH FORMER ADMIRER.

New York, May 30.—The Herald has the following from London:—There recently died in his room in the Avenue Victor Hugo, Paris, says The Daily Mail, an eccentric Englishman, known to his intimate friends by the nickname of "Mad Mack." For the past seven years he had aimlessly wandered about the streets of the capital, attracting attention by his odd dress and appearance. He gave largely to those who knew how to exploit his readiness to help his needy compatriots. His real name was John Whalley, and he came from Bowden, a suburb of Manchester. In 1897 he and his young bride arrived in Paris on the evening of their wedding day, but the honeymoon was rudely interrupted by the sudden appearance of his eighteen-year-old wife a week after the marriage with a former admirer. She never came back to Paris, but she and the man she fled with were traced to South America some months later.

When at last Mr. Whalley's relatives were able to find his whereabouts his mind had suffered irreparable injury from the shock of this misfortune. The best English and French physicians were consulted, but could do no good. To the day of his death his one hope was to see his young wife return again, and his one dread was to come in contact with the members of his family.

No sooner did his relatives cross the channel than he would disappear until their departure, and they determined finally to leave him alone.

Up to the last he occupied the bridal chamber from which his young wife had fled. His once erect figure had recently become bent, and his death was due to decline, doubtless owing to his bohemian existence. Always neatly but peculiarly dressed he was never seen without grey suede gloves four or five sizes too large for him.

"Mad Mack" was believed to be in receipt of an income of at least \$5,000 a year, and it was always a mystery where he took his meals. The only things he was ever seen to eat were English buns, which he always bought at a well known shop in the Rue Cambon.

MISSIONARIES FAREWELL.

Son of Rev. Dr. Mowatt Among Those Going to Foreign Work.

An assembly greater than the church could accommodate, gathered at St. James Methodist church, Montreal, Thursday evening, for the farewell service of the McGill Five—who are going to China and India, to take part in the missionary work among the natives. Each of the young men addressed the meeting, the burden of each being the pressing need for men to preach the gospel to these people and the great

field of labor so little touched by the Christian world.

Rev. A. W. Lockhead, B.A., B.D., was the first of the young men to address the meeting. He is going to Honan next August as after hearing of the need for men in the master's there, he had never been fully satisfied until he made up his mind to go out as a foreign missionary.

Mr. H. J. Keith, M.A., B.D., goes out to Calcutta to take charge of the Bible Study Department of the Y.M.C.A., of the Indian Empire. India is in a most receptive mood, according to Mr. Keith, and if the church takes advantage of the times there may be a great advance movement there. The educated men among the Hindoos have had their faith in their religion destroyed by their studies, but have had nothing to replace it with and here is the opportunity for western religion. Mr. Keith goes to carry on the work of Bible study among these educated classes, who in India have, perhaps a greater influence on their fellow countrymen than anywhere else in the world.

Rev. J. A. Mowatt, B.A., son of Rev. A. J. Mowatt, was the next speaker. He goes to Honan in obedience to the Master's orders. The Saviour laid on the Christians the task of subduing the world for Him, and every man should be a fisher of men—going where most could be caught, regardless of difficulties in the way, and always keeping self in the background.

Mr. Charles S. Patterson, M.Sc., goes to Calcutta as secretary of the Y.M.C.A., for high school boys. Mr. Patterson goes because there he considers the work most urgent and because as a member of the Christian church he felt that the duty of saving the East for Christ, rested partly upon him. Mr. Patterson thought that the great need in the East could be met by the church if the trial were earnestly made.

Mr. G. Irvine, B.A., well known as the secretary of the Y.M.C.A., at McGill, goes to Northern India as travelling secretary for the Y.M.C.A. in Northern India. He claimed that belief in Christ and belief in missions were inseparable. The true reason that the East is in such a backward spiritual condition is because the Christian church has not followed Christ's gospel closely enough.

Mr. Kingman presided at the meeting. He stated that there were really eight McGill students going out as Mr. Keith and Mr. Lockhead will both take their wives, graduates of McGill, out with them, and Dr. Mitchell, another graduate, will also enter the work in the fall.

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GIRL SHAMES A BURGLER.

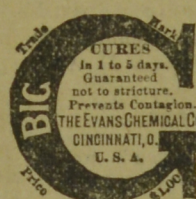
Steps Between Father and Intruder Who Have Guns Levelled.

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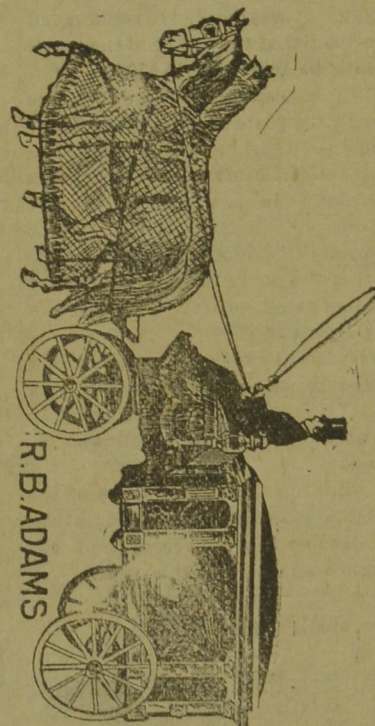
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
